### THE STORM

Schooner Onward Wrecked—Steamers Delayed, etc.

A warning was yesterday received at Charlottetown for a strong to a heavy gale, at first from the northeast shifting to the north and northwest. About six o'clock this morning the wind freshened up, and by eight o'clock it was blowing at the rate of thirty miles an hour. The snow and rain makes it very disagreeable under foot as well as overhead.

Between Saturday night and nine o'clock this morning it is computed that the rain-fall, including melted snow, was about an inch-and-a-half on the level.

The schooner Onward, Captain Orr, of French River, was wrecked at Park Corner, about two o'clock this morning. She was in ballast for New London. The crew were saved.

Because of the storm the Northumberland did not leave Sumner cruise until a quarter after eleven today, and the Princess did not leave Charlottetown until about half-past twelve. Both steamers will return during the night, if possible.

The storm has also interfered with the telegraph and telephone wires in some places. There was no communication with the mainland up to two o'clock.

THE WESTAWAY.—The hull and materials of the brig Westaway, wrecked Oct. 5, at Wallings Island, have been sold at auction for \$113.

AN IRISHMAN ON THE SPOT.—Rev. Anthony Gaughran, Roman Catholic Bishop of Kimberley, says: "The state of things in the Transvaal is a scandal to the nations. I am not an Englishman, as you know, nor are my sympathies in general with England, but in this case I do believe that England will do credit to our common humanity by forcing a small state, call it self a republic, to give equal rights to all."

LAST SUNDAY SERVICES.—The funeral of the late William Boyle, Esq., yesterday, was, notwithstanding the storm, largely attended. Service was conducted at the house by Rev. J. J. Teasdale. At the church an impressive service was held by Rev. J. J. Teasdale, assisted by Rev. J. W. McConnell, in the presence of a large number of people and the Sunday School pupils.
