The clinic was under the direction of Dr. Potter and the nurse in charge was Mrs. Wilcox. They were assisted by six nurses' assistants, a laboratory technician and three drivers. Assistance in loading equipment was given by members of the Alberton Branch of the Canadian Legion who also provided cars for transportation of donors.

Mr. C. W. Hayes, Mrs. J. A. Callaghan and Miss Barbara Smith, all registered nurses were in charge of the rest beds. Refreshments were served by members of the Women's Institutes of Alberton, Alberton South, and The Dock.

Anti-Congestion Move

Those responsible for the building of Summerside's new post-office are to be commended on the fact that, in providing more living and working space within the building (the original reason for erecting the new structure), they have not forgotten to make allowance also for more working space outside the edifice. Congestion of motor traffic at rush hours outside the old post-office has been quite a problem though we have never heard of any serious collisions in that area. The widening of Central Church and Fitzroy streets in the vicinity of the new Federal building should help traffic manipulation, considerably.

Watch Out For The Children!

Prominent signs asking motorists to be careful have been placed on the streets bounding the Summerside High School and this should lessen the danger of accident to school children. We believe, however, there is still a crying need for the construction of a sidewalk along Green Street. As long as children walk in the street there will be danger of accident. Certainly the safety patrol recently established at the High School has been a boon to drivers in that vicinity who have to be constantly on the alert to avoid accident.
