## THE CONFERENCE. Methodist Ministers in Council

### IN THE BRICK CHURCH.

AFTER a lapse of six years the Methodist Conference of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island met again in Charlottetown at one o'clock on Tuesday. The ministerial session met in the basement of the Methodist Church, Rev. R. W. Weddall presiding. About fifty ministers answered to their names, a large number not having arrived. All the ministers and probationers were found blameless in life and conduct.

The relations of young men studying as probationers for the ministry was taken up. The following are to be ordained on Sabbath morning: Rev. Josiah B. Champion, who has been stationed at St. Martin's during the past year; Rev. John Dystant, who has been working during the past year at Lindav, in Carleton County; Rev. Levi J. Leard, who has been stationed at Florenceville, also in Carleton County. They are all natives of the Island.

The other probationers who were advanced along on their journey towards ordination were Revs. Geo. A. Ross, Herbert E. Thomas, R. J. Campbell, L. R. McDonald, Robert J. Fulton, Daniel E. Cowan, Harry C. Rice and Jacob Heany. The resignation of William Buchanan was accepted. Conference adjourned at 6 till 10 o'clock this morning.
