## St. Eleanors Asks Sanitary Survey

A sanitary survey of St. Eleanors is being made by the division of sanitary engineering of the department of health to learn what conditions are there in relation of water and sewage.

Worried by reports of conditions in other sections, notably Glover's Shore, near Summerside, the village commissioners scouted the department of health to make the survey to acquaint them with conditions they are facing.

No survey has ever been made there before and citizens want to learn what conditions are like in their area.

It is not believed things will prove serious as they were in Kensington which recently installed a new sewage system as the community is more spread out. However, there are sections, notably close to the main highway at the corner, where some congestion exists.

## Anniversary Services Held At Cascumpec And Alberton

ALBERTON — Rev. Robert S. Latimer, assistant minister of Trinity Church, Charlottetown, was guest preacher at anniversary services in Alberton and Cascumpec United Churches yesterday.

The need for Evangelism, said the speaker, is seen in the mission field, in modern materialism, in the lack of moral standards of the present age, and in the sense of purposelessness in society.

"God does not ask the impossible of people: He asks only what we can do. As in an earthly realm, so in the realm of the Heavenly Kingdom there must be a king and one law. The way of Jesus Christ," he said, "is the only way to escape our fears and frustrations. An anniversary is a time for introspection, for evaluation, and for being born anew."

Both services of worship were conducted by Mr. Elmer MacLean.

At both services there was special music. In Cascumpec Rev. Mr. Latimer sang, "Just As I Am" and Mrs. Burtop, Rayner sang, "I Will Pilot Thee."
