## Loss Of Confidence Is Seen Cause Of U.S. Stock Slide

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market has been skidding in the face of good business. Why? The most educated guess on Wall Street is that investors have become overwhelmed by fear. One expert called the present situation "a crisis in confidence." Although there are many opinions, sometimes contradictory, the most common feeling among Wall Streeters is that the investor fears: reeling since the steel-price rollback April 13.

1. The Kennedy administration is anti-business and that the assault on the American steel-price increase may be only the beginning.

2. Business, good as it is now, won't be so brisk later in the year.

3. The cost-price squeeze on industry may damage profits in subsequent quarters.

4. There will be a substantial deficit in the federal budget.

The market has been reeling since the steel-price rollback April 13.

With unloading of stocks increasing, the market, as measured by the popular averages, has sunk to successive lows in the last week.

Wall Street analysts are putting much of the blame on the Kennedy administration's attitude toward business.

But even here many can't agree.

## Encouraging Copper Outlook Is Forecast By Mining Head

The outlook for copper remains encouraging, says J. R. Bradford, president of Noranda Mines Ltd.

"Consumption," he says, "continues to grow and ample supplies are available for years to come, with big ore bodies in reserve. Prices, of course, must be such as will encourage us and, at the same time, permit developers of new mines to proceed with confidence that the return will justify the risk."

Mr. Bradford, who expressed his views at Noranda's recent annual meeting in London, commented that iron world production and consumption last year set new records despite some strikes and troubles in Africa.

Producers' refined stocks currently approximate 400,000 tons or 15 per cent less than a year ago and have not varied significantly for more than six months.

In the last 15 years free world consumption increased by 60 per cent and, Mr. Bradford said, the current outlook is no less encouraging.

Louis E. Wideman, vice-president of Salesperson Inc., Chicago, in an address to the Toronto National Sales Executive Club, predicted the following products for the future:

Electronic devices installed in clothes closets that will dry-clean garments overnight by means of sound waves; home machines to translate foreign languages; purse-size consumer television sets; personal radios the size of a cigarette package enabling the owner to carry on conversations with friends or business associates; dyes that will allow clothes of different colors to be washed together.

**Gov't Planning To Take Over Ceylon's Papers**

COLOMBO (AP)—Finance Minister Felix Dias Bandaranaike told a large May Day rally of the ruling Freedom Party Tuesday that Ceylon's newspapers would be taken over by next month.

Bandaranaike, one of the most influential cabinet members, said that at next year's May Day rally workers would be able to read real government news in government newspapers.

Bandaranaike specifically mentioned the publications of the Associated Newspapers of Ceylon and The Times of Ceylon as takeover victims.

He said he mentioned this subject because of reports that the government was not fulfilling its take-over pledges made when it came into office in July, 1960.

He later criticized "political trade unions" which informed sources interpreted as a blow at the unions run by the left-wing Sama Samaj (social equality) party. This party, a one-time government ally, now sharply criticizes it and Bandaranaike whom it calls dictatorial.

"When it comes to putting down the political trade unions, I shall act as a dictator," Bandaranaike said.

### Safety Council Issues Appeal

OTTAWA (CP)—The deadly season for Canadian motorists began Tuesday with an appeal by the Canadian Highway Safety Council for extra care by highway travellers.

Alan Bryce, executive director of the council, said May marks the annual upswing in traffic deaths as more vehicles take to the road because of better weather, the start of holidaying and the return of outdoors activity.

"Last year in May an average of eight persons died every day in Canadian traffic accidents," he said. "For the first six months of the year the average was seven."

The last six months of 1961 took an average toll of 11 a day.

"We are frankly worried

about an increase in deaths this month and this year," he added. "There appears to be an upturn in the economy and this always leads to increased highway travel."

### Little 8 Talks To Open May 9

LONDON (Reuters)—A constitutional conference on a possible "little eight" eastern Caribbean federation of Barbados and the Leeward and Windward Islands will open here May 9, the colonial office announced Tuesday.

The leaders of the islands—Barbados, Antigua, St. Kitts, Montserrat, St. Vincent, St. Lucia, Grenada and Dominica—put forward their federation plan after the collapse of the original West Indies federation through the secession of Jamaica and Trinidad.
