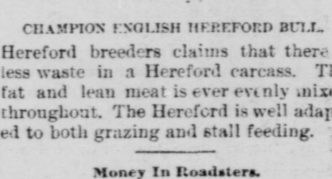
These Were the Champion Beef Herefords at the British Fair.
