Policeman Is Appointed At Kensington

KENSINGTON — A Summerside man, Fred McCormick, has been appointed police officer for the Town of Kensington.

He succeeds Joseph Flynn whose dismissal became effective following a special meeting of the town council Tuesday night of his duties on Wednesday.

Mr. McCormick had been under notice of dismissal which would have come into effect Saturday. However, a break at the store of Athol Cotton in which a safe was cracked and \$1,300 in cheques and cash stolen last weekend, speeded up the dismissal.

R.C.M.P. officers are continuing to investigate the case.

The council cited dissatisfaction with the work assigned to him as the reason for Flynn's dismissal.

Constable McCormick together with his wife and five children has taken up residence in Kensington. Prior to his appointment he was employed with A.E. MacLellan Ltd. of Summerside.

Impaired Charge Brings Stiff Fine

SUMMERSIDE — A fine of \$100 and costs or 14 days in jail was levied on a driver whose car was found with a blood alcohol content of .08.

Officers elected were: Elmer Waugh, president; Raeford Locke, O'Leary, first vice-president and Robert Shaw, Bloomfield, second-vice-president.

CONDEMNNS FASTTIME

Strongly condemning daylight saving time Mr. Waugh said he failed to understand why town and city people want to go against the wishes of the rural people.

"Some would have us believe that P.E.I. is one of the only places in the world where daylight saving time," he said, but a large number of places in Canada and the States, including whole provinces and states, remain on standard time or have returned to it after a try at daylight time.

In writing support for the federation, Mr. Waugh said that all other groups are organized for their own good and protection.

In his annual report J.L. Dewar, secretary of the P.E.I. Federation, said the organization is receiving encouraging support from farm-encouraging support from farmers in O'Leary area. Mr. Dewar traced the history of the federation from 1941. "Although we have a 100 per cent increase in membership this year more advice, interest and participation is required," the secretary stated. There are over 3,000 individual members besides affiliation with the Women's Institutes, Swine Breeders Association and other livestock groups.

FREIGHT RATES

The proposed freight rate increase came under strong criticism from Dr. L.G. Dewar, M.L.A. An increase in wages is not justified, he said, when it means an increase in the cost of consumer goods. "We are not getting away with only 17 per cent" he maintained, but 25 to 30 per cent eventually, 40 per cent of which will be borne by agriculture although agriculture does not receive 40 per cent of the nation's income.

Several other speakers commented bitterly on the freight rate and daylight time problems.

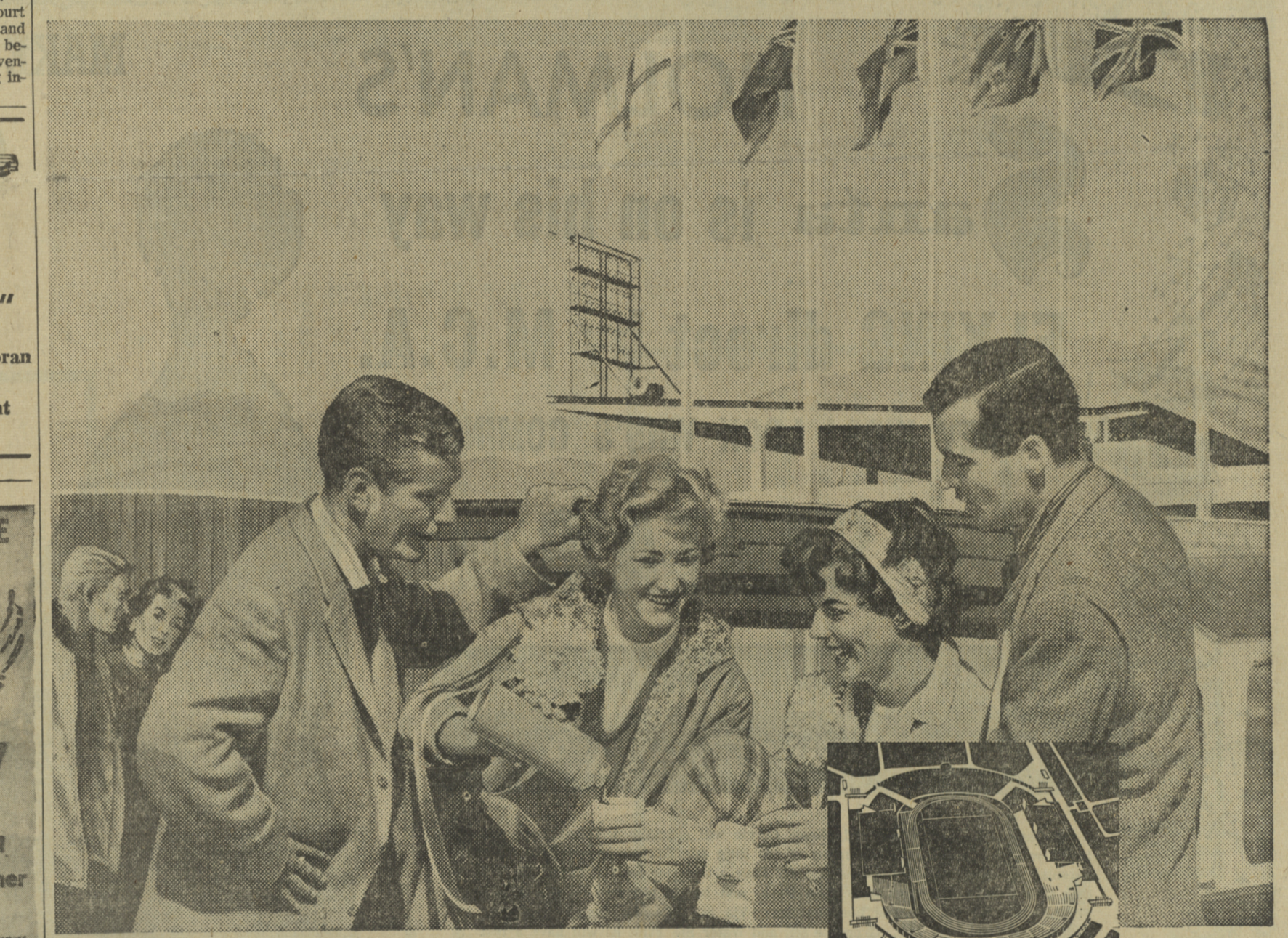
