

S.U. to settle Feud

Council will buy a camera for Student Union use only it was decided unanimously in a Meeting of the Student Union Council Sunday evening.
The camera is to be bought with the condition that one third of the money is to come from the SU and two thirds from other areas. (i.e. The Photography Club)
The camera is to be insured from the day bought.
The decision that a new camera be bought finally represented some formal action in the ongoing feud between the Derwin Banks and the Student Union which began Sept. 25th when beer was thrown onto Banks' camera at a Main Event.
Phillip Brown, President of the Student Union said that a camera could be bought for approximately \$625. One member asked if it would be cheaper to rent one, but Derwin Banks, head of the Photography Club replied that the cost would be in the vicinity of \$50 per week.
John McAleer, treasurer of the SU asked if an alternative method of acquiring a camera could be employed. (e.g. perhaps a camera company could be found to fund part of the camera as beer companies do.) No action was taken on McAleer's suggestion.

Brown also mentioned that an expensive dryer is gathering dust and could possibly be sold. The problem lies in that the dryer is very out dated, and it seems unlikely that anyone will want it.

McAleer reported that \$8000 had been set aside by the SU for investment in the Capital Savings Bond so that future Unions will have money available for capital expenditures. (e.g. A new SU Centre) An Investment Committee of Roger Black, Dept. of Education; Claire Bradley, Board of Governors Representative; G.D. Clough; and John McAleer was approved to invest the money as they see fit.

In other Council news, Neil McKenzie, Comptroller of the SU reported that the canteen in the games room is now open and run by Sandra Warren. In response to a question of why she did not go through the Personnel Board, McKenzie said that Warren was hired by the man who owns the games

The above contract was not brought before Council for approval because signature of the contract was imperative according to Brown. The Speaker, Brendon Bulger, recommended that the new contract which is expected

is expected to replace the old one when it expires the 31st of October, 1980 be brought before Council before renegotiation.

Alumni, Holland College and Nursing students will now be allowed to attend Student Union functions for the same price as UPEI students. They can also get into events with their own School I.D. but still cannot sign others in. All other non-student, excluding those mentioned above, must be signed in by UPEI students and pay an extra

dollar at the door.

In other business, Council on the recommendations of the Personnel Board hired Frances Smits as Assistant Editor of the SUN and Mary Driscoll as a Member of the

Personnel Board. Sue Stephenson was appointed electoral officer and Janet Braam deputy. Tentative dates for the Winter Carnival were set for Feb. 2nd -7th.

CAMERA CONFLICT

Formal action is finally being taken in the feud between Derwin Banks, chairman of the Photography Club and the Student Union.

During the Student Union meeting Sunday evening, the motion was passed that the Student Union would buy a camera for Student Union use only and that it be bought under the condition that one-third of the money come from the Student Union and two-thirds from other areas.

On Sept. 25, beer was thrown on Banks' camera by a non-student during the Main Event "Finnigan".

With the new door policy, the only way to track down the culprit was through his licence number.

The next day, charges had still not been laid, therefore the photographer asked what was to be done with the bill. According to Banks, the S.U. said that the photographer's camera was his own responsibility. The photographer then resigned as student rep. on council and all photography on campus.

The S.U. called their lawyer the following

Monday and the recommendation was a small claims court as was that of Banks' lawyer.

During the first student Union meeting Sept. 28, the matter was brought up but nothing was done.

After the second S.U. meeting, the executive and councillors were under the impression that the matter was being handled and all was going well. However, Banks has not as yet gotten the licence number from the C.P. Chief Bruce Hickey. The licence is needed to get the address of the culprit.

Banks claims that there was no purchase order available at the S.U. office Monday and S.U. president Phillip Brown and S.U. Business manager Mickey Place claim Banks never requested one.

As of yet there are no photos for the yearbook of Fall-Fest, Intercollegiate Harness Racing, soccer, and fall intramurals. Also, the S.U., as of yet, has no camera.
