**Cameron Rink Leaving Today**

Charlottetown's Dougie Cameron curling foursome will be leaving the province this morning via air on their journey to Saskatoon as Prince Edward Island's representative in the 1965 Dominion curling championships.

Cameron's rink obtained this honor by going through the men's provincial tournament, which was staged at the Charlottetown Curling Club, without suffering a single defeat in the double knock-out tourney.

We had a chat with Dougie yesterday afternoon and when asked what his rink has been doing during the past couple of weeks in preparation for the Dominion championships, Dougie said, "We have been keeping our game sharp with a couple of games and several practice sessions, but we haven't been working extremely hard as we didn't want to run the risk of being over-trained when it came time to play the cream of Canada's curling teams."

This columnist inquired as to whether Dougie thought his team could 'take all the marbles' this season; and Cameron replied that he wouldn't put too much money on himself if he was betting, but added that the team that gets 'hot' is the one that is, going to represent Canada in the Scotch Cup and if his team is right they stand as good a chance as anybody of copping the championship.

Cameron explained that curling is a game where the mental condition of the players plays an extremely big part in the success of the team and Dougie said: "The only thing that may be against our team is that this is the first year we have curled together and we will have to be patient with each other throughout the tournament if we are going to take top honors."

Dougie was quick to add, at this point in our conversation, that he would sooner take the three boys he has in front of him this season to the Brier than any other three curlers who will be taking part in the tournament.

The Charlottetown skip said that he thinks the biggest threats to be faced in the Brier will be the Harold Worth rink from Saskatchewan and the Terry Braunstein rink from some representing Manitoba. Dougie said that in order to have a good chance of winning the championship you have to eliminate two of the three western rinks which are three of the supposed powerhouses in the Dominion spiel.

The members of the Charlottetown rink include: Douglas Cameron, skip; Alan Smith, mate; George Dilke, second; and Bob Dillon, lead.

Dougie said one of the biggest things he is looking forward to on the trip is the possibility of meeting Max Bentley who was his first hockey hero and since Bentley lives close to Saskatoon, Dougie said there is a good chance he will come to see some of the matches.

The Cameron foursome is considered by many of the local curlers to be perhaps the strongest team to ever represent this province in the annual Canadian curling classic and the best of back-to-a fine group of boys from the pen of the author of Sports Front. The competition gets underway March 1 and will be concluded on March 15.
