

Detroit Shuts Out Habs; Leafs Down Bruins 6-2

MONTREAL, Jan. 20 (CP)—Detroit Red Wings, primed with power on both attack and defence, blanked Montreal Canadiens 4-0 Saturday night before a National Hockey League crowd of 14,443.

It was the ninth shutout of the season for goalie Terry Sawchuk, who handled 46 shots in a spectacular display.

Gordie Howe, Detroit's ace, scored his 24th goal of the season to put him in a tie with Maurice Richard of Canadiens for the goal-scoring leadership.

Richard was absent from Canadiens' line-up because of an aggravated groin injury.

Howe also took over the lead for total points, with 41, supplanting Elmer Lach of Montreal who has 40.

The other Detroit marksmen were Alex Delvecchio, Metro Prystal and Marcel Pronovost.

Elmer Lach suffered a cut forehead in the second period and did not play in the third. Floyd Curry took over Richard's right-wing spot, and Cliff Malone, brought up on lend-lease from Montreal Royals of the Quebec Senior League, played on the third line.

TORONTO, Jan. 20 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs broke out of a 2-2 second-period tie Saturday night and went on to wallop Boston Bruins 6-2 before 13,000 National Hockey League fans.

The Bruins, winless in two seasons of schedule play here, stayed with the Leafs for the first half of the game, then wilted. The score was 1-1 at the end of the first period and 2-2 in the middle of the second. Then Leafs caught fire for two tallies in the remainder of the frame and added couple more in the final 20 minutes.

Little Howie Meeker, Progressive Conservative member of Parliament for Ontario's Waterloo South riding, sparked Toronto with two goals—his second one was the winner. The right winger has been out of action with injuries much of the season.

The other Leaf marksmen were Joe Klukay, Sid Smith, Teeder Kennedy and Harry Watson.

For the Bruins, it was bespectacled Hal Laycoe and Milt Schmidt.

Schmidt—given the Hart Trophy last season for being the most valuable player to his team—showed he's still at it.

Playing with a swollen right ankle that made him coast along on one skate most of the night, the veteran centre picked up an assist on Laycoe's counter and polished off a play with rookie linemates Real Chevrefils and Leo Labine to give Bruins their 2-2 tie early in the second period.

King Clancy's Team Headed For Calder Cup

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 19 (AP)—King Clancy's Pittsburgh Hornets appear a shoo-in for their first American Hockey League division title in 13 years and its all the result of constant practice.

Clancy, kicking around professional hockey for 31 years as a player, referee and coach, got generous for the first time this week. He gave the boys a 24-hour breathing spell after they twice thumped the Calder Cup champion Cleveland Barons.

"It's practice that counts," said the 49-year-old mentor who is the last man in the Hornet organization to toss adjectives around with reckless abandon.

"We left the training camp in A-1 physical and mental shape and opened the season in high spirits. The team has come along in great style and it's only because of practice, practice and more practice.

"We've got the best defensive team in the league and all we've got to do to win the title is apply the talents of our trade."

The Hornets took the sting out of the western division by winning their first eight games. They now ride the league table with a 16-point advantage over the challenging Cleveland Barons.

Clancy figures the Hornets need at least a dozen more victories in the remaining 24 games for a cushion to the divisional title and the Calder Cup playoffs.
