Marilyn Bell Will Attempt Juan De Fuca Strait Today

VICTORIA (CP)—The Juan de Fuca swim circle may be completed early today when Marilyn Bell of Toronto wades into the strait to begin her bid to conquer the 18.3 miles of water between here and Port Angeles, Wash. Marilyn will start from Victoria's Horseshoe Bay, the starting point used by Florence Chadwick of the United States when she touched off the swim craze two years ago. Miss Chadwick swam about seven miles in five hours and 11 minutes before surrendering to the chop and tides. She was the first to try the strait since three attempts in 1933. Since Miss Chadwick's effort there have been 53 other attempts—all but one ended in failure.

Top Maritime Pacers To Race At Fredericton

FREDERICTON (CP) — Eight of the Maritimes' fastest pacers were scheduled to go to the post here Thursday night in the two-dash Walter Dale Memorial classic, worth \$1,500 a heat. Leading the parade of horses to the pole were Dave Gratian, whose 2:05 2/5 is the fastest Maritime mile of the season, and Slicker Tass from Fredericton, holder of a 2:05 2/5 mile. Other entries were Josedale Double Hat, Saint John, N.B.; Doubt Maplecroft, Gagetown, N.B.; Ann's Dream, Summerside, P.E.I.; Jerry's Nightmare, Truro; Palming Way, Springhill, N.S. and Bayonne, Fredericton. An added bonus of \$200 was to go to the driver of any entry breaking the 2:05 mark. The \$3,000 classic is named after Walter Dale, a pacer who in 1937 set an unbroken track record here of 2:02 1/2. Joe Glynn of Windsor, Ont., and Ken McReynolds of Montreal ousted seeded players from the Junior men's singles as competition in the 11-day tournament opened with a record entry of more than 250 players from across Canada, the United States and even one from Australia. An Ottawa girl, Carol Steers, turned in the third surprise performance in the first round of the juvenile girls' singles on the courts of the Rideau Lawn Tennis Club. In the juvenile boys' singles, Louis Leprohon of Montreal scored the fourth upset of the day by downing Edmonton's top-seeded Wesley Alexander 6-4, 6-3 in the third round. The tournament was launched earlier Thursday with an East-West contest introduced to the championships meeting this year. The East-West affair replaced the inter-provincial matches that previously had marked the start of the appropriately named tournament. Appropriately enough, the easterners and westerners split the honors. The East won the Junior men's affair by sweeping the three singles matches and thereby eliminating the need for a pair of the best-of-five series.
