

# Coal Demand In Canada Is Outstripping Supplies

MONTREAL (CP) — Demand for coal continues to outstrip supplies available from Canadian mines, says C.L. O'Brien, chairman of the Dominion Coal Board.

Consumption, particularly by thermal generating plants, continues to grow and imports to increase, says Mr. O'Brien in an article published today in the Montreal Gazette's annual commodity review and forecast.

Production of mines in the Maritimes dropped in 1965 and the decline probably will continue temporarily while new steps are taken to help the industry. Production in Western Canada likely will continue to increase.

Mr. O'Brien said exports fell off slightly due to the loss of a market in Maine for New Brunswick coal. New Brunswick production dropped to 969,000 tons from 1,003,000 tons in 1964. Nova Scotia's production declined to 4,143,000 tons from 4,293,000 with a substantial part of this caused by the slowing down of operations in No. 18 mine of the Dominion Coal Co., prior to closing because of exhausted reserves.

Mr. O'Brien added: "The Nova Scotia mines are in an unhealthy financial state and have been unable to accumulate capital over the past 15 years or so in the amount necessary to provide for full maintenance and replacement of worn-out equipment. The government has been approached and the Hon. Allen MacEachen, on Oct. 9, advised that 'the government will make large-scale investments in the Cape Breton coal industry... and that the opening of a new mine at Lingan will constitute an essential part of this program... These measures will take time to develop and meanwhile one mine will close almost immediately and another closure will occur in the not too distant future."

He did not name the mines about to close.

### UP NATIONALLY

Looking at the Canadian picture as a whole, Mr. O'Brien said consumption in 1965 would amount to 26,500,000 tons compared with 24,600,000 in 1964. This increase carried forward the trend of annual growth in consumption since the low point of 21,600,000 tons in 1961. Total Canadian production was 11,500,000 tons compared with 11,319,000 in 1964.

"Each of the three major consumers—industry, thermal electric plants and coke plants—showed an increase in requirements but as has been the previous pattern, the thermal generating plants show the most spectacular growth," said Mr. O'Brien.

The thermal plants used 7,858,000 tons in 1965, continuing the steady growth since 1961 when only 2,251,000 tons were used. Mr. O'Brien said most of the coal for coke manufacturing is processed in four large iron and steel plants with the coke being used in blast furnaces and for smelting.

"In spite of the increasing use of gas and oil as supplementary fuels in blast furnace operation, coal demands at 5,950,000 tons are some 85,000 tons over last year. The recent announcement of increased capacity at one of the Hamilton plants should call for more coal

in the near future, while the proposed Quebec iron and steel producer will provide outlet for a substantial increase in the total tonnage required."

### PRAIRIE OUTPUT UP

Production was up substantially in Saskatchewan and Alberta but down slightly in British Columbia. Saskatchewan produced 2,087,000 tons of coal in 1965 compared with 1,994,000 in 1964. Alberta's increased to 3,340,000 tons from 2,971,000. British Columbia's dropped to 961,000 from 1,058,000 tons.

Canada imported 15,490,000 tons of bituminous coal and 595,000 tons of anthracite in 1965 compared with 14,111,000 and 627,000 tons respectively in 1964. Mr. O'Brien said Japanese steel mills are anxious to secure more Canadian coking coal and negotiations are under way that may lead to a long-term contract for 2,000,000 tons annually.

### Doctor From Tatamagouche Is Selected

TORONTO (CP)—Dr. Charles L. Gass, a 78-year-old retired physician of Tatamagouche, N.S., has been selected as the first winner of the W. Victor Johnston Oration lectureship, the College of General Practice of Canada announced here.

The lectureship, financed by the Pfizer Co. Ltd. carries a \$1,000 honorarium, believed to be the highest for an annual medical paper presented in Canada.

Dr. Gass will deliver a paper at the college's annual scientific assembly aboard the Empress of Canada March 19 to 29. The college said in a statement the lectureship was set up to honor "both the Canadian concept of general practice and a distinguished Canadian doctor."

### STUDIED IN HALIFAX

Dr. Gass, who was instrumental in establishing the college 12 years ago and was one of its early presidents, graduated from Dalhousie University at Halifax in 1914. He served with the medical corps during the First World War. He settled in Sackville, N.B. in 1919 and carried on general practice until he retired in 1954.

He was campus physician and lecturer at Mount Allison University in Sackville for 30 years, and for several years served on the executive council of the Canadian Medical Association.

### OFFICIALS SET TONE

BANGUI, Central African Republic (AP)—The new ruling revolutionary council here decreed an austerity program. Government officials are barred from bars and dance-halls and tomtom drumming is forbidden in the daytime except on weekends and holidays.

## Mediator Role In Viet Nam Is Refused By Soviet Union

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union has refused to try to bring North Viet Nam to a negotiating table with the United States.

Japanese Foreign Minister Etsusaburo Shiina asked Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin to use his influence in Hanoi to get negotiations started.

But the reply was that "the Soviet Union is not directly involved and therefore is not going to be a mediator," Shiina told a press conference.

"We could not reach any common opinion," Shiina said of his talks about Viet Nam with Kosygin and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko.

The Soviet refusal to become publicly involved in Viet Nam peace-making efforts has continued many months. The last similar effort to break through the refusal, by British Foreign Minister Michael Stewart met with a similar response.

Diplomatic observers here have seen two probable reasons for this Soviet attitude. One is Moscow might simply lack enough influence in Hanoi to get results. The second is vulnerability to Chinese propaganda attacks.

Peking has accused Moscow of trying to arrange a peace in Viet Nam which would sell out the Communist cause there to the United States as part of a deal for Soviet-American control of the world.

Some diplomatic observers believe harsh Soviet denunciations of U.S. policy in Viet Nam are at least partly designed to offset such attacks and the Soviet Union would, in fact, like to see a settlement in Viet Nam.
