France Carefully Ponders Each American Investment

WASHINGTON (CP) — Canadians react when three American-owned mills in Canada avoid Cuba-bound flour orders from fear of exposing their American parent companies to United States penalties for trading with the enemy.

France carefully ponders each new case of American investment and West Germany rejects a U.S. bid to obtain interest in the only German aircraft company where it had none.

But there's an opposite side of the coin arousing concern here.

Who is going to control the steadily enlarging international corporation giants, American or otherwise?

"If harmful practices by the large international corporations are going to be avoided, stronger European rules are needed and ultimately a joint Atlantic anti-trust policy between a European competition and the anti-trust authorities in the U.S.," says a recent Atlantic Institute study of transatlantic investment.

It adds that such a policy would protect against "dumping, discriminatory pricing, take-overs and mergers that seriously diminish competition; and price-rings and market-sharing arrangements."

POSE QUESTION
A recent AFL-CIO study by Elizabeth Jager, noting that U.S. private investment abroad now totals about \$75,000,000, asks this question:

"Are U.S. corporate holdings really U.S. investments, or do international corporate giants, the new multi-national corporations, hold power which makes them private governments?"

The AFL-CIO is concerned about the export of American production and jobs.

Another worry is voiced by Richard Barber, special counsel for a Senate anti-trust subcommittee, who wrote recently that about 900 international alliances will control three-quarters of all industrial assets by 1975 unless special new laws are applied.

U.S. companies have about \$50,000,000 of the \$75,000,000 American overseas investment stake and most of it is in Canada and Europe.

The infusion of such direct investment has been growing most quickly in Europe in recent years. President de Gaulle now is manoeuvring to reduce American influence in France and Europe generally.

Company Will Insure Anything

TORONTO (CP) — Lloyds of London will insure anything. Well, almost anything.

Vince Bagnato, manager of Toronto heavyweight Bob (Pretty Boy) Felstein, says he was turned down by Lloyds of London when he tried to insure his fighter's face.

"I know it was a long shot, but I had heard they would insure almost anything," says Bagnato.

He said he had sent a letter to Lloyds through a Toronto broker and they had replied that they would consider it.

"I just received another letter the other day and they regretted that they couldn't do it. They said they would insure his hands or his feet outside the ring. But because a fighter is bound to take punches about the face and head, they couldn't do it."

Bagnato said he is thinking about Felstein's face in relation to the boxer's activities after his career as a fighter ends.

"The contract we have with Bobby runs beyond his boxing career. We have plans for him to make television commercials and movies where his good looks will be an asset."

Felstein is scheduled to box a 10-round co-feature main event against Mike Lanum of Houston, Tex., in Houston Aug. 9. It will be the first 10-round bout for the Canadian heavyweight.

Felstein's record is 12-2-1.

Frank Sutton Gives Advice

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Frank Sutton's advice to performers who go to Viet Nam to entertain troops is: Keep it clean.

"Legends of barracks ribaldry notwithstanding," Sutton says, "Don't use blue material. They don't like it. It's a form of talking down to them."

Sutton, the gravel-voiced,

bulldog-faced sergeant who harasses Jim Nabors on television's Gomer Pyle, USMC, went to Viet Nam during the show's summer recess from filming.

He paid his own way to Saigon by commercial airliner. Then he did 56 one-man shows

in eight days for marina crowds ranging from 16 to 1,000 men.
