

Annual Tag Day Set For May 27

SOURIS—The May meeting of the Souris and Regional Home School Association was held at the High School Library. The trophy for Home and School attendance was won by Mrs. Townshend's class. The president gave a brief re-

sume of the semi-annual meeting held in Charlottetown, in which the keynote address was "School Dropouts" delivered by Rev. E.J. Roche of St. Dunstan's University.

After a brief discussion it was decided that the annual Home and School tag day will be held on Friday, May 27, and Saturday, May 28.

It was proposed that the Home and School donate a sum of money towards defraying expenses of a forthcoming dinner to be held for the 1966 graduates of Souris Regional. It was unanimously agreed that since the Home and School gives a goodly sum in prize money each year for school prizes, it should not, at least this year, present any money for this banquet. It was agreed, also, that the executive decide at a later date on the sum of money to be donated for school prizes.

PROGRAMMED LEARNING
A talk was given on programmed learning by Sister St. Lucius, a member of the staff of Souris Regional. She explained that this new venture in the education is likely here to stay. The first experiment in this field is that being conducted this year at Souris Regional. The grade chosen was ten and the subject geometry. In this experiment there are two groups—the experimental group and the controlled group. These two groups were matched, as closely as possible, according to age, sex, I.Q. and Grade Nine marks. The experimental group uses the programmed learning text, on loan from Encyclopaedia Britannica, and the control group uses the conventional grade ten text. The experimental group is not subjected to conventional classroom teaching. Indeed the teacher is there merely as a supervisor. The control group, on the other hand, is taught according to standard methods. Although the results of this experiment to date are inconclusive, statistics do show that of the two groups, the overall average for the years work to date is slightly higher in the control group. Sister St. Lucius wound up her talk by saying that programmed learning is a bright star on the horizon of education and by saying that she is proud that Souris Regional was the first P.E.I. school to launch this star into orbit.

A question period followed the talk. The many questions from the floor were answered by Sister St. Lucius.

\$50 Fine Is Levied

GEORGETOWN—In Kings County Magistrate's Court held here Wednesday Everett James William MacLeod of Georgetown, charged with joyriding, was found guilty as charged and fined \$50 and costs or 20 days. Provincial Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, presided. The crown was represented by Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGuigan, QC, in all cases.

Two Georgetown residents, Anthony Burke and Percy James Henry both failed to appear in court and summonses were ordered for them. Both are charged with the attempted theft of a truck battery, the property of Irving Oil Company.

June Biggar Gives Outline

June Biggar of the Royal Ontario Museum, last night gave an extensive outline on collections of articles included in Canadiana—the study of Canada's material culture.

Miss Biggar, introduced by Dr. J.H. Maloney, president of the P.E.I. Historical Society, spoke at the concluding lecture of a series of lectures held during the winter months, in the lecture theatre of the Confederation Centre.

The illustrated talk examined some of the rare books of Canadiana, Champlain's drawings and a view of Quebec painted by the governor of Quebec (1804-1812).

Other paintings included a view of Charlottetown, British Garrison Society in Nova Scotia and people of the Upper Canada Society.

Other illustrations showed classes of silver candle sticks, collections of pottery, Canadian textiles, glassware, iron and collections of Canadiana in Canadian museums.

Miss Biggar told about a visit to Newfoundland where she discovered an antique chair. This piece of furniture is unique because it is the only one of its kind in the world, she said.

Eight Witnesses Testify At Trial

The second day in the trial of Sterling Joseph Bernard, Lennox Island, charged on two counts: one of manslaughter and of causing bodily harm with intent to wound Roger Frank Labobe, Lennox Island resumed here yesterday morning.

Mr. Justice R.R. Bell presided. Crown prosecutor is George R. McMahon and defence council is J. Melville Campbell.

A total of eight witnesses testified at yesterday's sessions. John D. MacLeod, Indian agent, told the court that after having been advised of an incident at the Bernard residence by Constable Joe Labobe he proceeded to the Bernard residence where he saw the body of Roger Labobe lying on the ground near the porch. He tried to find Labobe's pulse and couldn't find a pulse. Mr. MacLeod went on to say that he stayed in the area until the police arrived.

AN ARGUMENT

Joan Maloney, sister-in-law of the accused who was baby-sitting at the home of the accused on the night in question told the court of an argument that took place between the accused and his sister, Hazel Peters who was engaged to marry the deceased.

In her evidence she also told of drinking which took place in the Bernard home that evening.

Indian Constable Joe Labobe, who is presently stationed on Lennox Island, told the court that as the result of a visit from Mrs. Catherine Bernard at his residence he went to the residence of Sterling Bernard.

He said that when he arrived in the Bernard yard he checked the body of Roger Labobe and there was no indication of life.

He then proceeded to the Indian agency where he asked Mr. MacLeod to notify the RCMP, priest and doctor.

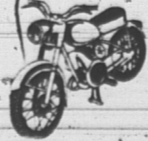
