Sees British Emigrants In For Big Shock In The US

By JAMES F. KING LONDON (AP)—Britons thinking of emigrating to the United States are warned in a national newspaper to prepare for a frightening experience in a country where "anything goes in the dollar chase." The U.S. is depicted as a land of bribery, "sickening frankness" about sex and psychiatrists — though fabulously generous and "refreshing" in willingness to experiment with something new. The report in The People, Sunday newspaper with a circulation of 4,500,000, is written by Len Coulter, an Englishman who has lived in the United States for seven years. "It's a fascinating country," he concludes in advising prospective emigrants to think twice before embarking for New York. "But for someone born and bred in Britain it is sometimes hard to take."
