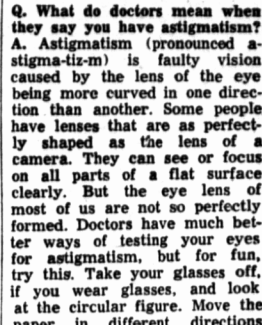
Cornwall 4-H Achievement Day

Medical Mirror

Q. What do doctors mean when they say you have astigmatism?
A. Astigmatism (pronounced a-stigma-tiz-m) is faulty vision caused by the lens of the eye being more curved in one direction than another. Some people have lenses that are as perfectly shaped as the lens of a camera. They can see or focus on all parts of a flat surface clearly. But the eye lens of most of us are not so perfectly formed. Doctors have much better ways of testing your eyes for astigmatism, but for fun try this: Take your glasses off, if you wear glasses, and look at the circular figure. Move the paper in different directions and then in small circles. If you have very much astigmatism a fan-shaped fuzz will appear over the picture. You see some parts of the lines clearly but other parts are out of focus. Astigmatism is not a disease. Many people have the condition to some degree. If it is enough to cause eyestrain and headache your doctor will prescribe corrective glasses.
