LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Letter From Rev James Simpson

Sir,—In the Morning Guardian's report of a sermon preached by Rev. Mr. Brewer last Sunday, the following statement appears:

"No historian who values his reputation will say that the Church in England had any existence before the coming of St. Augustine."

I have waited several days, expecting that the rev. gentleman would disclaim this statement, but as no correction has been made, I think I may justly conclude that the report is accurate. Therefore, while it is against my principles to enter into a religious controversy in the newspapers, I cannot allow such a glaring historical inaccuracy to pass unchallenged. St. Augustine landed in England A. D. 596. Here are quotations from four standard English historians:

Bede, in his Ecclesiastical History (B. h's Library, London, 1870) Book I, caps. vi, vii, and x. A. D. 286-394, treats of portions of the early history of the British Church. Again: "In the meantime (A. D. 429) the apostolical priests filled the island of Britain with the fame of their preaching and virtues; and the word of God was by them daily administered, not only in the churches, but even in the streets and fields." (Bk. I, cap. xvii, p. 27). And, "In the meantime, Augustine, the man of God, repaired to Arles and was ordained Archbishop of the English nation by Athanasius, Archbishop of that city." (Cap. xxvii, p. 40).

But it may be said that as Bede was a priest of the Church himself, his statements are not to be relied on. I, therefore, quote Green and Knight, neither of whom can be accused of shewing any favor to the Church of England in his work: J. R. Green, Short Hist. of Eng. People (Harpers, 1886): 450 A. D. "For the rage of the English seems to have burned fiercest against the clergy. The priests were slain at the altar, the churches fired, &c.—Cap. I, Sec. II, The English Conquest, p. 47.

"The New England was a heathen country. The religion of Woden and Thunder triumphed over the religion of Christ.—Id. p. 49.

"To understand, however, the true meaning of the change, we must remember that before the landing of the British (449 A. D.) the Christian Church comprised every country save Germany, in western Europe, as far as Ireland itself.—Cap. I, Sec. III, p. 57.

Knights' Popular History of England (Funk & Co., N. Y., 1880): "There is ample evidence that a Christian Church of some importance was established in Britain at the beginning of the fourth century. At the first Council of Arles, in 314 A. D. three British bishops are recorded to have been present," etc. Vol. I, Cap. iv, p. 16. 303 A. D.—"To this period of fiery trial (the Diocletian persecution) belongs the history of the British proto-martyr, Alban. Among them here who suffered gloriously, Aron and Julius of Caerleon-upon-Usk, but chiefly Alban of Verulam, were most renowned," etc. Id., p. 17.

"And yet Augustine, in a conference with some of the ecclesiastics of the original British Church, demanded so authoritative, etc. Cap. v, p. 32.

But perhaps Green and Knight being Christians may have been biased in favor of Christianity; so I now quote what Hume says, and surely no unprejudiced person would maintain that he would give any willing testimony to the cause in hand.

Hume's History of England (Boston, Phillips Sampson & Co., 1849)—About 430 A. D.: "To this discussion of councils were also added the dispute of theology; and the disciples of Pelagius, who was himself a native of Britain, having increased to a great multitude, gave alarm to the clergy who seem to have been more intent on suppressing them, than on opposing the public enemy, Laboring under these domestic evils, and menaced with a foreign invasion, the Britons attended only to the suggestions of their present fears," etc.—Vol. I, Cap. I, p. 12.

"At last in 547, Ida, a Saxon prince, entirely subdued the county now called Northumberland, the bishopric of Durham," etc.—Vol. I, Cap. I, p. 20.

About 550, A. D.: "Perhaps the Britons were not over-fond of communicating to their cruel invaders the doctrine of eternal life and salvation."—Id., p. 24.

Beginning of 7th century: "Adelfrid, king of Bernicia, having laid siege to Chester, the Britons marched out with all their forces to engage him; and they were attended by a body of 1250 monks from the monastery of Bangor," etc.—Id., p. 31.

These extracts require no comment. At the proper time and place I shall show that Mr. Brewer's theological statements are as unreliable as his historical ones.

Canada is all Right.

Sir Joseph Hickson, who for so many years has been prominently identified with the Grand Trunk Railway of Canada, is just now in England, where, according to the Railway News, he has been receiving many attentions. It is natural, of course, that Sir Joseph should talk about Canadian affairs. He speaks of the lumber trade and the live stock trade, predicting that slaughtering establishments would in course of time be erected in this country and dead meat from the North-West shipped to England. Aiked what had been the effect of the McKinley tariff on Canadian trade, Sir Joseph said:—

"The McKinley tariff had two effects. In the first place it led to strenuous efforts being made to get barley and similar commodities which were to be affected by the tariff into the States in somewhat abnormal quantities. Then, when the law came into operation, it undoubtedly checked exports from Canada to the States, and led Canadian merchants to look for markets for some of their goods elsewhere. It seems to me from my observation that they are succeeding fairly well in so doing, and the probabilities are further that some of the commodities which Canadians have been in the habit of exporting to the United States, and which it was supposed the tariff would stop, will go there still, the producer sacrificing something and the consumer paying something more than before. An important result of the tariff ought to be an increase of trade between Canada and the Mother Country, and that leads up to a question of vast importance to the Empire, namely, the development of commerce between Great Britain and her dependencies. If for my part, do not consider that the ultimate effect of the new law will be so detrimental to Canada as many people anticipated."
