Tense Eisenhower-Taft Battle Continues

Labor Peer Suggests Proceedings Against Red Dean; Interview Granted

LONDON, July 8 — (Reuters) — The Government will be asked in the House of Lords next week if any legal action can be taken against Dr. Hewlett Johnson, "Red" Dean of Canterbury, for statements "reflecting on the conduct of British troops in Korea."

The Dean was appointed in 1931 by Labour Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald. He cannot be dismissed unless he commits a civil or ecclesiastical offence. The House of Lords question will be put by Lord Ammon, a Labor peer, who says the Dean's statements are "liable to create ill-feeling with other nations and bring the established church into contempt and disrepute."

Senator's Forces Win Victories On Credentials

CHICAGO, July 8 — (AP) — The tense struggle of Senator Robert A. Taft and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower for the Republican presidential nomination had their partisan scrapping at every turn and corner tonight for the needed delegates to win.

They tangled with bitter words before the credentials committee whose first five decisions went to delegates predominantly favoring Taft. Of the 44 delegates given the committee blessing today, 39 are regarded as pro-Taft, two for Eisenhower and three uncommitted.

Tomorrow the frantic pulling and hauling over vital seats will be transferred to the floor of the convention itself. Tonight former President Herbert Hoover arose to bring roar after roar from the assembled Republicans with grim denunciation of the Democrats.

They have "lost the peace" with their foreign policy, he charged, and destroyed "in Fascist fashion" the ramparts of freedom at home.

While the party's elder statesman spoke, partisans of Eisenhower and Taft wooed the uncommitted delegates and those backing the dark horse hopefuls.

There was a report from a prominent member of Pennsylvania's 70-vote delegation that Eisenhower was making progress there. Samuel S. Lewis, delegation secretary, told reporters he believes the state will cast 55 votes for Eisenhower when the roll is called.

Earlier, 35 votes from Pennsylvania had been listed in Eisenhower's column and 25 in Taft's with 10 uncommitted.

Governor John S. Pine of Pennsylvania said he intends to announce his personal preference tomorrow. The scramble for delegates was going on in a hundred hotel rooms in downtown Chicago.

News In Brief

CORNER BROOK, Nfld., July 8 — (CP) — An army of over 200 firefighters, aided by two spotting planes and an array of firefighting equipment, battled tonight to check the advance of a big forest fire which has been burning since Sunday near Hampton in White Bay. The fire was slowed down tonight but was not yet controlled.

FREDERICTON, July 8 — (CP) — Governor-General Vincent Massey will visit New Brunswick next month, Lieutenant-Governor D.L. MacLaren announced today. He is expected to reach Fredericton Aug. 25 and to be in Saint John the following day.

SEOUL, July 9 — (Wednesday) — (AP) — Allied tanks and infantry raided Chinese Communist positions on the East-Central Korean front early Tuesday and at daybreak were holding the area firmly.

LONDON, July 8 — (Reuters) — The Queen, resplendent in a silver brocade dress and an emerald-and-diamond tiara, tonight went to her first dance since the death of her father last February.

OTTAWA, July 8 — (CP) — The army may start recruiting women for its active force next year, it was learned today. At present, the army has the only armed service without women members on active duty.

OTTAWA, July 8 — (CP) — The Air Force today said recruiting was down 20 per cent during the first six months of 1952 compared with the similar period of a year ago. However, the spokesman said recruiting showed signs of picking up during June when recruits were 100 per cent higher than for June last year.

GUELPH, Ont., July 8 — (CP) — Maj. John Fout, Minister of Reform Institutions, said today no decision has been reached regarding punishment of ringleaders in the \$200,000 riot at the Ontario Reformatory Saturday. "We are going to give the whole incident very careful consideration before we take any action," he said.

Pound Sterling Suddenly Shows Burst Of Strength

LONDON, July 8 — (Reuters) — The pound sterling today suddenly turned strong against both the Canadian and United States dollars. Sterling was in demand, and dollars were on offer, in both European and North American markets.

Against the U. S. dollar, sterling at the week-end was down to barely above its lower limit of 2.78 dollars. Today it jumped well above 2.78.

Against the Canadian dollar it jumped from the low marks of 2.675 last Friday and Saturday to 2.70 today. The premium of the Canadian dollar over the U. S. dollar fell to less than 3 1/2 cents. This is still abnormally high, but it compares with a premium of more than four cents at one time yesterday.

Anti-Red Lawyer Snatched En Route To Office

BERLIN, July 8 — (AP) — Aroused by the kidnapping of an anti-Communist lawyer, the West Berlin City Government decided tonight to blockade roads leading into the surrounding Russian zone.

The kidnap victim was Dr. Walter Linse, 48, chief of the Economics Branch of the League of Free Jurists.

Three men abducted him from the United States sector in broad daylight today and raced by automobile into the Soviet zone, firing pistols and strewing nails to slow pursuers.

May-Gen. Lemuel Mathewson, the United States commandant in Berlin, sent a sharp protest to the Russians against the kidnapping. He said it was outrageous and intolerable and demanded the immediate release of Dr. Linse.

The League of Free Jurists has been a thorn in the Communist side for about three years. The league is composed of almost 1,000 lawyers and judges who fled to West Berlin from the Soviet zone. Its primary work is to record violations by East Germany's Red Government of basic German law.

1,000 Canadians Arrive At Seattle From Korea

SEATTLE, Wash., July 8 — (CP) — Nearly 1,000 members of Canada's 25th Infantry Brigade arrived here today from Korea aboard the U. S. navy transport Gen. Hugh J. Gaffey.

Before nightfall they will be on their way by special trains to homes in Eastern and Western Canada.

After a dockside welcome, the troops were taken to a nearby army base where they will be processed for leave, the first time this has occurred here. Other Canadian arrivals were returned to Canada before leave process—a pay parade and the issuance of transportation warrants — was completed.

Mrs. Eva Morissette and her daughter, Rachel, 5, were on hand here after travelling more than 3,000 miles from Montreal. They met Rachel's uncle, Pie, Rudolph Morissette.

"We drove all the way from Montreal to be here, and we sure were lucky," Mrs. Morissette said. "We just got here."

Alberta Coal Mine Closes

EDMONTON, July 8 — (CP) — Recent extensive flood damage and the state of the Canadian coal market has forced the closing of the \$1,000,000 Cadomin Coal Company mine in Cadomin, Alta., 20 miles southwest of Edmonton. The announcement was made today by Colin Campbell, executive vice-president.

Herbert Hoover Makes Farewell Address To The Republican Party

CHICAGO, July 8 — (AP) — Herbert Hoover, in a farewell address to the Republican Party he once headed, tonight labelled as largely a "phantom" the European army, until recently commanded by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

In a major address to the Republican national convention, he warned the United States to look to its aerial strength and be ready to strike back like a "rattlesnake" at any Communist aggression.

The only living former U. S. President raked the Democrats with hot fire, accusing them of throwing away the fruits of victory in the Second World War.

Hoover referred to his age—he is 77—and told the convention that in "the inexorable course of nature, this is likely to be the last time I shall attend your conventions."

Born in Russia, he came here in 1912. He is survived by his widow, several daughters and sons, including Reuben, of the Canadian Press, Toronto.

Ontario Brewing Magnate Dies At Summer Home

LONDON, Ont., July 8 — (CP) — John Sackville Labatt, 72, brewing magnate who was the central figure in a spectacular kidnapping case 18 years ago, died today.

He suffered a heart attack at his summer home at nearby Port Stanley. Previously he had had several less severe attacks.

Mr. Labatt was president of the Labatt Brewing Company from 1915 until 1950, when he became a director and brewing consultant to the company. He was succeeded as president by his brother, Hugh.

Since 1900 the brothers had been active in the firm, founded in 1832 by their grandfather.

Born in London, he was educated at Trinity College School, Port Hope, Ont., and McGill University in Montreal. He was proud of his brewmaster's diploma from the National Brewers' Academy in New York. He started with the brewing company as a clerk.

In 1926 he married Elizabeth Anne Lynch of Ottawa, who survives, together with his brother and two sons, John Bridham Labatt and William Arthur Sackville Labatt, and a daughter, Mary Elizabeth Labatt.

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But the company, with large coal holdings, plans to hold a directors meeting soon to consider the development of some of these properties with the hope a market can be developed for lower-cost coal.

Opened 35 years ago, the Cadomin mine has been the sole major industry in the town of Cadomin, which now has a population of 800. The mine employed about 100 men. In its greatest days, before and during the Second World War, Cadomin had a population of more than 2,000.

The funeral will be held in London Thursday.

The kidnapping, Canada's most celebrated abduction for ransom, started when three men waylaid Mr. Labatt as he drove from his summer home near Sarnia to London Aug. 14, 1934. At pistol point, he was transferred to another car and spirited to a cottage in Muskoka.

His abductors demanded \$150,000 ransom for his release but could not collect it. After 48 hours he was released on the outskirts of Toronto.

Three men served penitentiary terms on charges connected with the kidnapping. Jack Bannan of Windsor, Ont., and Russell Knowles of Detroit each was sentenced to 15 years. Michael (three-fingered Abe) McCardell, native of Dublin, Ont., who was arrested in Crown Point, Ind., received a 12-year sentence.

Gerald Nicholson of Windsor was given a suspended sentence on a charge of being an accessory. Evidence was that he drove the car which took Mr. Labatt to Toronto for his release.

David Misner, Cincinnati bookmaker, got a 15-year sentence upon being convicted of abduction, detention and armed robbery. Misner was freed after McCardell confessed that he carried out the kidnapping with Bannan, Knowles and Albert Pegram, who was ever captured.
