

# First Hungarians Arrive From Dutch Refugee Camps

**EASTERN FIRST HUNGARIANS**  
**HALIFAX (CP)** — The first of 2,000 Hungarians from Dutch refugee camps arrived here Monday on the Dutch ship Zuiderkruis after a stormy voyage interrupted by a mid-Atlantic collision.

The group of 311 sailed from Rotterdam March 11 on the Dutch ship Waterman. Three days later the Waterman collided with an Italian freighter in mid-ocean and had to return to Brest, France. The Zuiderkruis picked them up there.

The ship also brought 250 Dutch immigrants and will take another 200 to New York.

Most of the Hungarians had never seen the sea or ships before. The collision and rough seas added to the terrors of their first voyage. Many sighed with relief when they stepped on Canadian soil.

Fear and seasickness after the collision drove many Hungarians to spend bleak nights on wet, chilly decks rather than return to their cabins, passengers said.

**NO CASUALTIES**  
 There were no casualties in the

accident. The refugees spent most of the winter in Dutch transit camps, of which there are 18. They received food and accommodation under a co-operative arrangement between the Canadian and Netherlands governments.

Seventeen Canadian teachers and two social workers gave courses in basic English. Dressed dolls showed the women the type of clothes they and their children will wear here. Miniature supermarkets demonstrated how Canadians buy groceries.

Transfer of Hungarians from Holland to Canada is expected to continue until June. They will travel in Dutch ships along with an expected 12,000 Dutch immigrants. The Zuiderkruis was the first ship to carry both Dutch and Hungarians.

Passengers said despite the language barrier Dutch and Hungarians fraternized over such inter-national games as chess and cards.

Men outnumbered women among the Hungarians. About 70 per cent are young laborers, the balance mainly white collar work-

ers, teachers and artists.

Among them was a Budapest art photographer with his wife and three daughters. He declined to give his name for fear harm would come to his son still in Hungary. He said the son, a member of the revolutionary group, had to stay behind lest the whole family be shot.

Other arrivals were several engineers, a bookkeeper and a printer, with their wives and children. Many have friends and relatives in Canada, whom they expect to help them.

Nel Ellis, Associated Press correspondent at The Hague, was among the passengers for New York. She said the Hungarians were orderly aboard ship but showed a suspicious attitude to anything smacking of discipline and authority.

"Only the intellectuals among them have any knowledge of the English language," she said, "but they have great zeal to learn it."

"Equipped with English dictionaries they looked assiduously for words and made an effort to speak English among themselves."

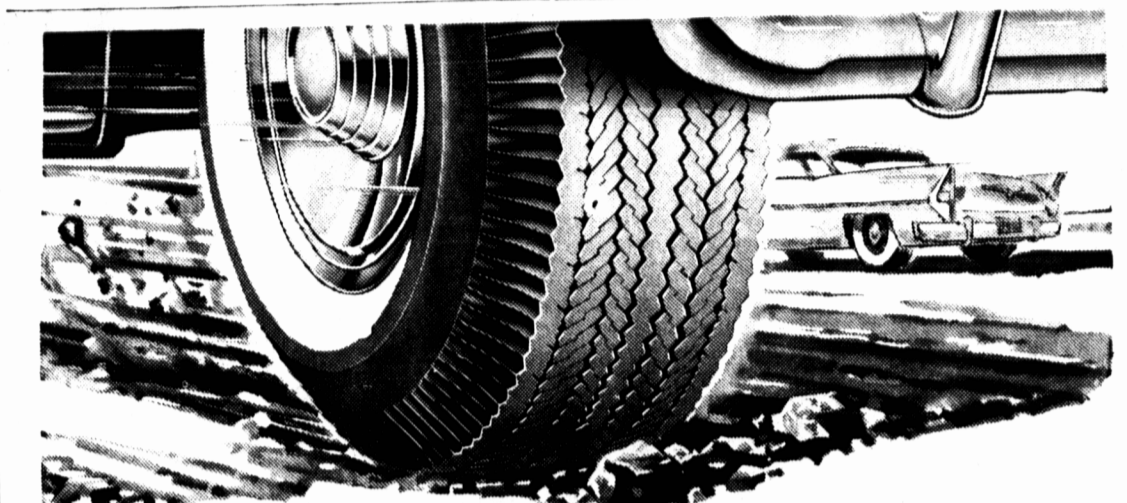
## WOULD PROTECT OUTER HEBRIDES

OTTAWA (CP) Common member A. J. MacEachen called Friday for a campaign by all Canadian highlanders to protect the Outer Hebrides — "the last bastion of Gaelic culture" — from a British rocket range.

The Liberal representative of Inverness - Richmond constituency in Nova Scotia referred to reports that inhabitants of South Uist island in the Hebrides are thinking of emigrating to Canada because their island will be converted to a rocket range.

Instead of doing that, said Mr. MacEachen, "all highlanders here should band together to ask the British government to move their rocket range somewhere else in the world."

He suggested that Fisheries Minister Sinclair, a native of Banff, Scotland, should lead the movement.
