O'Neill, of the Half-Way House, Verdun, River, has forwarded to THE EXAMINER some stalks of white oats, taken at random by his son, from a four-acre field, which are almost six feet high. The sample sent is full of grain. Mr. O'Neill says the growth all over is something extraordinary, and that he could easily have sent a better sample than that forwarded.

OATS EXTRAORDINARY.—Captain J. J. Marchison, of Point Prim, left at the office of THE EXAMINER to-day a head of Egyptian white oats which contains 192 grains to the one straw, besides many which have decayed. It was picked from a field of oats in which the smallest head picked held about 55 grains. This is an exceptionally good crop, as the average yield is only about 50 grains to the straw.

ACCIDENT.—We are sorry to hear that Mr. W. W. Clarke was thrown from his wagon at the corner of Lower Water and Queen Streets, early last evening, and hurt about the head and body. There were three persons in the wagon at the time all sitting on the one seat. The horse shied at the corner, and Mr. Clarke, who was sitting on the end of the seat, was thrown off upon some stones. When picked up he was unconscious, in which condition he was removed to Peake Bros. & Co's store, where medical assistance was called in. About half an hour later he was able to drive home. Today, however, he is reported "all right again."

NEW STEAMSHIP LINE.—A new line of steamships will be running to Montreal next season, the first boat of which, steamship Main, is now in Montreal loading deals, grain and cattle. The deals and cattle are for Newcastle and the grain for Hamburg. The boats are those of the old North German line and have been withdrawn from the passenger trade to go into the cattle and general business. There are five boats in all, three of which are at present in London being altered for the St. Lawrence trade. The intention is to have the steamers at Montreal in summer and New Orleans in winter.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. The Quebec Disgrace. Cartwright and the French. New Stealings Every Day. Simple as Picking Pockets or Blowing a Safe. Where the Money Went.

(The following telegram was received by THE EXAMINER at five o'clock yesterday.)

OTTAWA, Aug. 18. The Bay Chaleur railway steal absorbs all public interest, and arouses great expectations as to what will next come up. It is well known that there has been a row between the Ontario and Quebec Grits, and intense ill feeling between Laurier and Cartwright. Laurier blames Cartwright for inspiring the Globe's editorials which have been very fierce, and it is very evident that Cartwright welcomes the scandal, as it points to a removal of Laurier from the leadership and downfall of Quebec influence. The Globe says, yesterday, that the case against the Mercier government is complete, and that the Lieut. Governor of Quebec must take action. Apart from what he may do, the Globe says the fact remains that Pacaud, Armstrong Langelier and Robidoux—the two latter members of Quebec cabinet—have committed criminal offences and should be arrested. The Globe adds: "The very simplicity of the crime—for it was as simple as picking pockets or blowing a safe—has shocked the public more profoundly than the McGreevy business."

It is felt that Mr. Laurier must speak and declare himself either with the Globe and Cartwright or with the Quebec faction. It is reported that Garneau and Shehyn have resigned from the Quebec cabinet. Pacaud's paper, L'Electeur, attacks the Globe and Farrer bitterly and ascribes their action to hatred of the French. Chaos has come and is ruling the grit ranks. Several grit members have gone home disgusted, and will not return. Others are demanding that Laurier shall immediately speak and repudiate his Quebec partners or retire from the leadership. The Quebec men declare that unless Sir Richard Cartwright and Ontario stand by them they will expose the doings of last election and give away the source of the bribery fund.

OTTAWA, Aug. 19. The excitement over the Baie de Chaleur railway scandal is unabated. Every day brings new stealings to light. Messrs. Barwick and Cockburn who were deputed by the Senate committee to go to Quebec and examine the bank accounts, have returned and their evidence to-day promises to be highly interesting. Their examination of the banking accounts will supply all the missing links and show that not only were Mercier's private debts paid out of the stealings, but that other members of the Quebec Government are badly implicated. It is believed that the committee will establish that the stealings amounted to as high as half a million, and that other enterprises were levied on by Pacaud for large connections.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT House of Commons.

Increased Duty on Imported Beer, Ale and Porter.

OTTAWA, Aug. 19. The afternoon and evening was chiefly occupied by the House of Commons in discussing the motion of Mr. Laurier regarding Squatters' claims to mineral rights in British Columbia. The motion was defeated by 101 to 81, thirty members being absent. Hon. Mr. Haggart promised the approximate census returns in a couple of days. Hon. Mr. Foster introduced a resolution raising the duty on imported beer, ale and porter to six cents a gallon all round. The Public Accounts and Tarte-McGreevy committee met this forenoon. Admiral Walsh arrived last evening, and took his seat amid applause.

THE TARTE-McGREEVY CASE

Prompt Action in Respect to Thomas McGreevy.

A Warrant Issued for His Arrest.

OTTAWA, Aug. 19. In the House, yesterday, the Hon. Thomas McGreevy, who was ordered to attend, did not appear. A warrant was issued for his arrest, and the Deputy Sergeant-at-arms left Saturday night for Quebec to execute it. It is reported that McGreevy has written to the Speaker, resigning his seat in the House, and that also he has written stating his intention of not attending again during the present session. Sheldrake and Grand River. The fish seem plentiful at Paspébiac, but bait is not obtainable. Lunenburg good at Thunder River, Long Point, Sheldrake, Seven Islands and Mousie. P. E. I.—Mackerel very scarce at Morningside, but schooling yesterday off Tignish, and reported taking hooks freely today at Alberton and Kildare. A few cod, hake and haddock at Georgetown. Nova Scotia—Cod fair at Whitehead and Port Medway, and good at Lunenburg. Herring very plentiful at Lockport, and hake fair. Squid bait very plentiful at Fox Bay, and herring bait by fishermen's nets at Lockport.
