Roberts Fined \$100; 16 Others Fined \$25

MONTREAL (CP)—Clarence Campbell, National Hockey League president, announced Monday he has fined Jim Roberts of Montreal Canadiens an extra \$100 for his part in last Wednesday's brawl during a Canadiens-Maple Leaf game in Toronto.

He also fined 10 more Canadians and six Leafs an extra \$25.

Campbell said in a statement Roberts jumped off his bench while officials were getting control of a fight between Frank Mahovlich of Toronto and Ted Harris of Montreal.

He said Roberts' action was followed by 10 more Canadians leaving the bench along with six Leafs - an exodus which resulted in "the continuance of the fighting which was already in progress and produced many more fights and scuffling to the point where game officials were unable to handle the situation."

Campbell said Roberts left his stick and gloves behind when he left the bench and that while it is "not certain that his action necessarily caused the subsequent exodus from both benches, it is reasonable to assume it did because no one had moved during the four or five minutes of the fighting among the players who were legally on the ice at the time.

"He must, therefore, be held primarily responsible for the subsequent developments including the expanded fighting and the intolerable delay of the game."

The game, won 6-2 by Toronto was held up from 15 to 20 minutes by the brawl.

Campbell exonerated Montreal coach Toe Blake and Toronto coach Punch Imlach.
