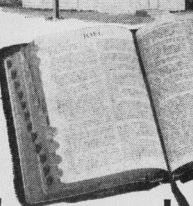
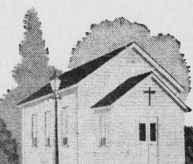

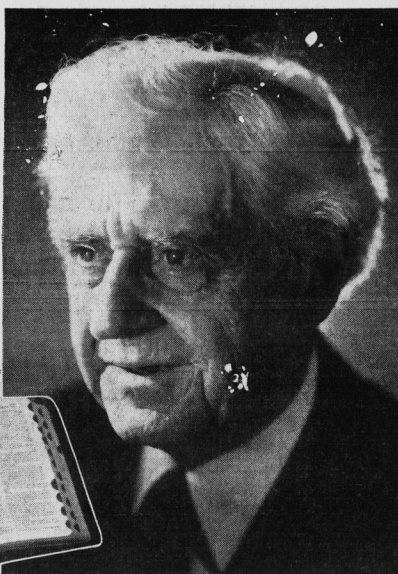
He Helped Me See Life Through . . . The eyes OF GOD

Joseph loved his son Joseph more than his other sons, and made him an spectacle long-sleeved robe which marked him as a superior. When Joseph was 17, Jacob sent him to check on the welfare of his older brothers, who were away, pasturing the flocks.—Genesis 37:1-4.

His brothers hated Joseph because of the father's preference and because of Joseph's bad reports of them to their father. So when he arrived alone to check on them, they stripped him of his robe and threw him in an empty cistern, planning murder.—Genesis 37:15-24.

As they sat eating nearby, a caravan approached on its way to Egypt. One of the brothers, Judah, suggested that they sell Joseph to them as a slave, rather than kill him. So Joseph was sold for 20 shekels and taken to Egypt, where he was sold to an official.—Genesis 37:25-28.

Then the brothers dipped Joseph's coat in goat's blood and returned to their father with it, pretending to know nothing of Joseph. Jacob, as usual, assumed Joseph had been killed by an animal, and mourned deeply.—Genesis 37:29-35.

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His way past finding out!—Romans 11:33.

Joseph's Dreams Fed Jealousy

For the next three weeks we shall be studying the chapters assigned for this week's lesson—a long assignment. This week we shall consider only chapters 37 and 38.

Here we take up the study of Joseph, Jacob's eldest son by his beloved wife, Rachel. Joseph is considered one of the two most perfect characters of the Old Testament about whom we have any real information (the other being Daniel).

These characters, coincidentally lived as captives in a foreign land, where they rose to posts of importance.

Our narrative of Joseph's life really begins when he is a lad of 17. Immediately we are presented with three causes for the hatred which Joseph's brothers bear him—his bearing of bad reports to his father about them; his father's obvious preference for Joseph, which automatically roused their jealousy; and Joseph's foolish revelations of his egotistical dreams to his brothers.

We might stop here to explain the "long-sleeved cloak" (the Hebrew translation) which Joseph's father made for him, and why it was such a hated garment. Normally, the men wore of such a tunic as an undergarment; it was, however, without sleeves and reached only to the knees, permitting freedom of movement for work. Joseph, on the other hand, reached to the ankles and wrists, making it difficult for him to do active work, but rather, suitable for wear by an overseer or dignitary.

It is curious, in the light of the apparently obvious relationship within this peculiarly structured family, that Jacob, a hothead sent Joseph alone on the errand of checking up on his other sons' welfare. It was a move which brought out the worst instincts of the brothers, who undoubtedly fell from previous experience, that Joseph was being sent as a sort of spy for his father.

The first plan of the brothers involves two sins—murder and lying, giving the father a false report of what actually happened to Joseph. The pit into which Joseph was cast was no doubt an artificial cistern used for collecting rain water to frosty drought.

Two of the brothers now try to save Joseph's life—Reuben,

Organization's Working To Open Closed Churches

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)—A small organization dedicated to opening closed churches across the United States is trying to help Canadian clergymen undertake the same task in Canada.

The American Mission for Opening Closed Churches, which claims to have reopened 44 churches since 1940, says ministers in Toronto and other Canadian centres have expressed interest in beginning a church-reopening program.

Rev. Lyle C. Anderson, the mission's general director, who was ordained by the Baptist Church in 1938, says his non-denominational home mission group would not operate in Canada, but would help Canadian clergymen set up their own organization.

The American mission, with headquarters in Buffalo, was an outgrowth of an idea of Mr. Anderson and his wife in 1940 they went into New York's Adirondack Mountains to four reopened churches. Four years later, another clergyman reopened a small church across the state in western New York.

Since then, the mission has reopened churches in Wisconsin, Illinois, Connecticut, New Hampshire, Maine, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and Maryland, as well as many in New York State.

Mr. Anderson says the mission operates this way:

When an interested group in a community asks the mission for assistance in reopening a church, mission supplies missionary pastor. The missionary pastor stays at the church until it is well established and self-supporting, then moves to another community. This sometimes takes from five to six years.

Nearly a score of the reopened churches operate today in the U.S. He says about 20 churches are awaiting reopening by the mission but some must be delayed until the group can recruit additional missionary-pastors.

The missionary pastors usually are persons trained at various Bible schools in the U.S.

Contributions from across the country provide revenue for the mission.

Mr. Anderson says church-closings average approximately 1,000 a year in the U.S. He says about 20 churches are awaiting reopening by the mission but some must be delayed until the group can recruit additional missionary-pastors.
