First Bluefin Tuna of Season Landed

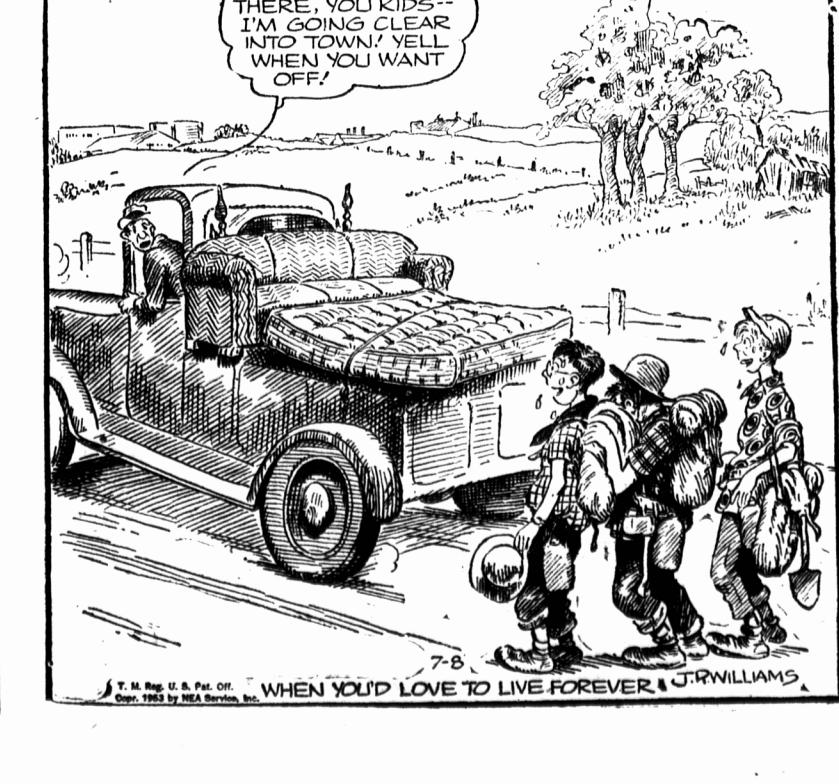
WEDGEPORT, N. S. (CP)—Three United States fishermen have landed the first bluefin tuna taken by rod and reel from Nova Scotia waters this season.
