A Chinese Horror.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Feb. 14.—The steamer 'Olympia,' has arrived from the Orient bringing late advices as follows: The city of New Chwang is in a state of terror, occasioned by the appearance of thousands of mounted bandits. Outrages have been committed on residents. The merchants have moved their goods to a treaty port, twenty miles south of the invaded districts. Grave fears are entertained that the bandits contemplate a raid on the latter place, which is being fortified.

By the breaking of the ice on a river leading to Tien-Tsin two hundred people were precipitated into the water. A hundred and six were drowned.

A report has reached official circles at Peking that an assassin was despatched to Japan to take the life of the Emperor of Japan. Great excitement was caused by the rumor, and a thorough investigation has been ordered.

Dreyfus in Good Health.

LONDON, Feb. 14.—The Daily Telegraph publishes the following despatch from Cayenne, capital of French Guiana: The judicial officer who has just returned here from a visit to Dreyfus on the Ile du Diable, informs me that the prisoner is in good health, but declines to reply to the written interrogations of the Court of Cassation on the ground that his answers are inaccurately transmitted to Paris.

The Panama Canal.

LONDON, Feb. 16.—The Paris correspondent of the Morning Post says that in financial circles it is persistently rumored that negotiations between the Panama Company and the Washington Government, whereby the latter is to complete the canal, are in a fair way to being successfully concluded. It is said that the Panama Company would receive a large percentage of the canal receipts and that the Nicaragua route would be abandoned.

Senator Perley, speaking at Moose Jaw, made this statement with reference to the action of the Senate on the Yukon deal: "After the Commons had passed that bill Liberal members came over to the Senate and begged of the Senators to kill the bill for which they have voted. That showed that owing to the number of men looking for situations, and to other causes which gave a Prime Minister tremendous power over his followers, the House of Commons was often not an independent Parliament." It was a rather mean thing, as the Mal and Empire remarks, for those Liberal M. P.'s to vote for the bill because they were afraid to offend the Government by voting against it. And it was ungracious after asking the Senate to do their work, to turn round and demand that the Upper House be assassinated for protecting the people.

LANTY.

Disension has arisen over a portion of the estate of the late Empress of Austria between the Austro-Hungarian embassy at London, the British estate of administration and the Bank of England. It appears that the Empress had \$2,000,000 deposited in the bank. Last November, when the heirs were arranging the division of her property, they asked payment for this deposit. But the bank refused to pay the sum in its entirety, asserting its right to deduct a certain amount for succession fees, and in support of this claim quoted the law which was recently enacted, to the effect that all property of foreigners not living in Great Britain should be subject to taxation in the event of a settlement on the death of the foreign client. Count Franz Deym, the Austro-Hungarian ambassador, disputes the equity of this ruling, declaring that as the British Government has never imposed succession taxes on property of foreign ambassadors who have died at London, the same privilege should be extended to foreign sovereigns. The question will be decided by the chancellor of the exchequer.
