When we on the Island begin to err on the side of radical procedure in any phase of human endeavour, that will be something to remember. We are conservative in thought and deed, and are more likely to lag a little behind the "middle of the road" course than to be guilty of following madcap, untried schemes such as may be practised in sections of the United States.

While admitting that educational reform may have got a bit out of hand in some of the larger urban centres of the new world, we must not forget that progress in any field involves change. It is absurd for anyone to state that the good old methods are best, and not subject to improvement or change of any kind. No one but the complacent old stand-patters, in love with the dear dead past, and refusing to face the inevitable challenge of the future, could preach such a gospel.

The emphasis being placed on the evils of educational progress, pseudo or otherwise, can quite easily give our teachers and educators a false security in the status quo. We should mix this tirade against progressivism with some suggestions as to how our present educational picture may be brightened by introducing "new" (a blasphemous word to the old guard) methods through the years. Without believing that the past has everything we need, let us gather up what we consider is best in the past, and proceed along the road of progress to incorporate in our system the discoveries which will naturally come in the future. Let us not forget: progress involves change. Water that does not run is called stagnant. Progress comes from the Latin which means "to advance."

IN MEMORIAM
MR. C. W. CROKEN

Thursday evening, Feb. 11, brought deep sorrow to the family, relatives and friends of Mr. C. W. Croken of Emerald, when they received the news of his sudden death in Charlottetown.

Mr. Croken's death was a great shock to everyone because he had been enjoying excellent health. On Wednesday Mr. Croken had gone to Charlottetown on business and that afternoon, among other calls, he had spent about an hour with his daughter, Sister Mary Corneila, at the Nurses' Residence of the Charlottetown Hospital. The next morning he had attended to other matters and planned to return home on the afternoon train. As he left the home of his sister-in-law, Mrs. R. MacDonald for the station, he was in his usual good spirits and gave no indication of not being well. On the way, however he collapsed and was immediately taken by ambulance to the Charlottetown Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival. He received the last rites of the Catholic Church at the hands of a former and much esteemed pastor of the deceased, Rev. Phelan McKenna.

Mr. Croken led an active life as a prosperous farmer of Prince County. Through reading and conversation, he was ever alert to become more proficient in his occupation and a brief glance at his past life will attest to his success in this regard. Because of his long and varied experience, his opinion on many subjects was highly respected, while at the same time he retained a great respect for the opinions of others. In all his dealings with the public, his practice of charity was most prominent as he was ever willing to assist those in need as far as was in his power. But it was in the intimacy of the family circle where the virtues of his good man shone forth with true brilliance. Being the father of nine children, he was everything one could wish for in an exemplary Christian husband and father. It is the members of his immediate family who can verify in a very real sense the comment made by so many that his life was just one long preparation for the hour of death.

On the subjects of Feb. 12, the remains were transferred from the Monaghan Funeral Home, Kinkora, to his late residence where, for the next two days, people came from far and near to pay their respects to the departed. Mr. Croken's largely attended funeral was held on the following Monday morning with the remains leaving the house at 9.30 a.m. The Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated at Summerside Church by the nephew of the deceased, Rev. H. J. Croken, Rev. Eugene Murray was deacon, Rev. Preston Hammill, sub-deacon and Rev. William Simpson, master of ceremonies. Present in the Sanctuary were: Rt. Rev. R. V. MacKenzie, Rev. T. Butler, Rev. F. Alyward, and Rev. Claude Shea. The services at the grave were also conducted by Rev. Harold Croken. The pallbearers were six neighbors of the deceased: Walter McCourt, Elmer McCourt, James Murphy, Ambrose Curley, Walter Curley and John L. Murphy.

Besides his sorrowing wife, the former Margaret Jane Hammill, Mr. Croken leaves to mourn one brother, Mr. Emmett Croken of Kensington, and the following children: Mary R.M., Toronto, Ont.; Sister Mary Corneila, C.S.M., Charlottetown; Gladys (Mrs. Stanley Sexton), Moncton, N.B.; Pius, on the farm at home; Maurice, farmer at Emerald; Helen, (Mrs. Robert Haggarty), Summerside; Louis, pilot with T.C.A., Montreal, Quebec; Robert, novice of the Society of Jesus, Guelpih, Ontario; Clara at home and also eight grand-children.

May his soul, having returned to the source whence it came, rest in eternal peace.
