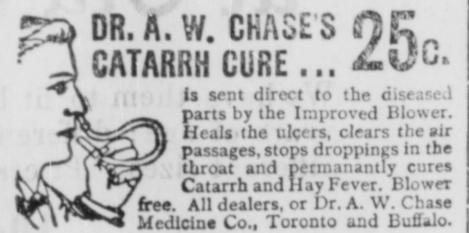

CAPE BRETON AFFAIRS.

NORTH SYDNEY, July 14.—The case of young Cameron, who by his coolness saved the incoming fast express the other evening near George's River, deserves a substantial reward from the government. He was walking along the track shortly before the train was due, when he noticed a broken rail. Quickly lighting a fire and securing some tree branches, he warned the train with the burning torch.

The rush of people to the Sydneys still continues, and the hotels are crowded in both towns. That North Sydney will, in a year or two, rival, if not eclipse, Sydney is a foregone conclusion. Bonds to the amount of a million and a half pounds sterling have been floated in London. This amount secures the General Mining Association's property at Sydney Mines and North Sydney. The transfer to the Nova Scotia Steel Company will be completed in a very few days. The latter company will largely increase the output of the mine, the coal of which is acknowledged to be unexcelled in the making of coke. The balance of the twenty million dollars necessary to erect plant, etc., will be raised as soon as the present stringency of the money market relaxes.

Building operations both here and at Sydney are retarded by the scarcity of lumber.

The Peary Arctic Steamer Windward, which is taking supplies to the far North for that explorer, is now at Sydney for bunker coal. Mrs. Peary and child accompany the ship on the hazardous journey. The steamer will sail north on Wednesday.

HOW THEY DIED.

Published accounts, says the Army and Navy Gazette, show that Lord Airlie, Lieut. Wright, and the non-commissioned officers and men of the 12th Prince of Wales' Royal lancers, returned as killed in the fighting near Pretoria, lost their lives in a splendid charge. Some guns of the Royal Horse artillery were found to be in danger, and the regiment received the order to press forward and rescue them. The order was no sooner given than the horses were at full gallop. The work was admirably done. The Boers retired before the rush of the lancers, and having got well out of danger suddenly dismounted and opened a terrible fire under which Lord Airlie and Lieutenant Wright fell. Capt. Egerton-Green, who was reported missing after the engagement, was captured by the enemy, and is now a prisoner in their hands. He was slightly wounded.

SERGEANT BEATTIE'S BRAVE ACT.

Asked by a Windsor Recorder, reporter 'What was the bravest deed you saw done in South Africa?' Private Ernie Craig, who has returned from the war, said: 'I think it was that of Sergt. Bert. Beattie, of Toronto. When Color-Sergeant Shrive was wounded twice in the arm, Beattie was brave enough to carry his comrade across the firing line. Both crossed without receiving further harm. It was one of those lucky escapes: but, nevertheless, a brave deed. Sergt. Beattie, the hero, afterwards died at Bloemfontein. He was the son of Mr. Wm. Beattie, Canadian representative of the Scottish-American.'

The Fantal of Shantung, the highest legal official of the province, and next in rank to governor, has issued to his subordinates the magistrates of the province an anti-Christian letter, says a Chifu special to the 'Herald.' It purports to be addressed to and record a conversation between the governor and the Fantal, but that is possibly a subterfuge to impose on the magistrate. The Fantal is notoriously anti-Christian and his letter cannot fail to have evil consequence. It exhorts the governor to authorize all magistrates to compel native Christians to return to their former religion and make them give security that they will not again enter a Christian church. All furniture of churches and Christians is to be confiscated and proclamations are to be issued exhorting the people to abstain from robbing Christian who renounce their faith.

Burn Murdoch, agent of Pritchard Morgan, M. P., in Korea, who has just reached London after a sixtydays journey by way of Vladivostok, over the Trans-Siberian railway to Moscow, says that Russia, even before he left was actively mobilizing troops in Central, East and West Siberia. The Trans-Siberian railway was conveying close on 300,000 men towards Manchuria.

Prohibitionists and Government.

TORONTO, July 20.—The Council of the Dominion Alliance has fully debated the question to be taken in the forthcoming general elections by prohibitionists. Major Bond, of Montreal, spoke at some length on the attitude of Quebec towards prohibition. Sir Wilfrid Laurier had been quoted as stating that the people of Quebec were in practice prohibitionists. The fact was that the people of Lower Canada were not so much prohibitionists as they were temperate and frugal. Except in the Eastern Townships, there was little demand for prohibition. They could reach the French-Canadians on this question either through literature or through the Roman Catholic Church. As it was, a better result would have been shown in Quebec in the plebiscite, had it not been that there were gross frauds at the polls, and misrepresentations made to the people by Messrs. Tarte and Joly. He believed that between 30,000 and 40,000 votes were recorded improperly. He did not place much reliance upon what Sir Wilfrid said. When it was represented to him that there was corruption at the polls, he replied that one must expect certain practices of that sort at every election. This statement came home to him when the recent election frauds were exposed, which did the Government so much harm.

Torture in China.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 20.—Details received here tell of the awful tortures inflicted on Rev. V. G. Norman, a missionary killed by the Boxers. A Tien Tsin correspondent, writing on July 7, says he fell into the hands of Li, the head man of a town near by, who had vowed vengeance on missionaries. Li had him stripped, bound to a post and an iron collar placed around his neck. He was prodded and stabbed. Then after molten lead had been poured on his naked body he was hacked to pieces.

Mrs. Daly, whose husband is the keeper at the hospital near Chang, has arrived here by the Empress of India. She said she and forty-five missionaries were saved by the Russian warship O vogue, which is guarding New Chang. She says soon after she reached the ship the Chinese soldiers near there tried to wreck a train carrying Russians. The train was derailed, but not much injured. She says she does not see how the missionaries in Manchuria can escape.

Cordiality Prevails.

LONDON, July 20.—A despatch to the Central News' from Tientsin, dated July 10, says that the statement sent out by some correspondents of Chinese reports that dissensions prevail among the commanders of the allied forces is unfounded. On the contrary, there has been the greatest cordiality so far. Admiral Seymour, the British commander, returned to his ship because of his wound. In the fighting at Tientsin, on July 9, the British had two killed and four wounded, and the Japanese five killed and twelve wounded. The Americans and Russians suffered no losses. A despatch to the 'Central News' from Vienna says that Russia has addressed a note to the powers declaring that she never desired to prevent action by Japan for the re-establishment of order in China. Russia's opposition was solely directed against the giving of a European mandate to Japan. The note states further that Russia is now preparing for a great military operation through Manchuria against Peking.

A Diamond Swallowed.

TORONTO, July 20.—A. Warner, an 18-year-old lad in the employ of J. J. Zuck and Co., jewellery manufacturers, swallowed a large diamond worth \$160, while fooling with the gem yesterday afternoon. He was taken to the emergency hospital, where emetics were administered. The young man took the affair as a good joke until the emetics were brought into play. But half an hour's vomiting did not bring the jewel to light. Warner is still the possessor of one large diamond, on which he cannot immediately realize.
