IN England the Canadian cattle trade is extremely good. The market prices have been high for the last three weeks, and the profits have been very large.

CETEWAYO has refused to accede to the terms insisted on by Lord Chelmsford, so that the last hope of peace is removed and the war will go on.

ON Friday night last Thomas Atkins, while engaged in a row in South Brunswick street, Halifax, had one leg broken in two places and an ankle dislocated.

REV. FATHER MCGILVERY, P. P., of Antigonish, N. S., is in the city. He preached an eloquent sermon in St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday.

THE Halifax *Herald* is informed that the scheme for starting a sugar refinery is progressing favorably. Of the \$200,000 capital required, \$190,000 has been subscribed.

A HALIFAX despatch says:—The arrivals of fish this week have been large. The prices of dry fish are certain to go down, as the catch is good, and our fishermen will make more out of the low rates than out of prices affected by scarcity. Dry fish receipts, 13,103 quintals, including arrival of 1841 quintals from Boston. Shipments in same period last year were 4,733 quintals. Mackerel receipts are, for the week ending July 8th, 2,169 bbls.; shipments 1,795 bbls., of which 1,577 bbls. went in West Indian.

MANITOBA MARINE SAFETY.—The Montreal *Witness* says:—"We learn from an Ottawa correspondent that the Deputy Minister of Marine, Mr. William Smith, will, on Thursday next, leave for Manitoba on an official tour. Among other purposes of his visit will be that of fixing the sites for lighthouses, &c., along the several rivers and lake coasts. The prompt action of the Hon. Minister of Marine in caring so early for the necessities of navigation in the new province proves the interest he takes in the Department."

A WHIRLWIND.—About 4 p. m. on Saturday last, a quantity of hay (about 100 lbs. in weight) lying in front of the residence of Hon. L. E. Baker, Yarmouth, was caught by a whirlwind and lifted in the air over 200 feet. After being whirled about in the air, the hay separated into small bunches, some descending to the southward of the jail, and others falling near the spot whence they were carried aloft. Outside the limited area of the whirlwind—a few yards in diameter—there was only a light air from the N. W.—*Hx. Herald.*

THE Hon. Mr. Langevin is expected in Ottawa, on his return from his successful mission to England, this week. He will be met at Rimouski by several leading public men, who will accompany him to Quebec, where he will doubtless receive a hearty reception from his friends and admirers. On his arrival in Ottawa he will be presented with the handsome oil portrait of himself, recently painted by Forbes, of Toronto, which was subscribed for by the Conservative members of the last Parliament, and he will likewise be tendered a public banquet.

THE KEELEY MOTOR AGAIN.—It appears that our City Fathers have discovered a new motive power which bids fair to eclipse the celebrated Keeley Motor, while at the same time it will work a revolution in the prices of agricultural produce, more particularly in that of STRAW. The details of the invention have not yet been made public, but from what we have so far learned, we are enabled to state that it will undoubtedly prove a blessing to the truckmen of this city, many of whom find it difficult to make even a meagre living during the present depressed times, as they will be enabled to dispense with horses during the winter season, and thus will be saved the necessity of providing straw or hay for their hitherto not over-well fed nags. The only facts of which the public are yet in possession may be gleaned from section 13 of "A Law respecting truckmen and truckage" (passed 13th June, 1879) which enacts that "Every licensed truckman shall have affixed to his harness, for the purpose of drawing his sled or sleigh, at least one good and sufficient open bell. It may be seen, at a glance, that no provender will be required, not even the very small amount of fuel supplied the Keeley motor—the only condition to be implicitly observed being that the bell be open mouthed. It has been suggested to us, but we will not do the City Fathers the injustice of supposing that they were unallant enough to mean "an open-mouthed Belle."

Canadian Inshore Fisheries.

DEPARTMENT OF MARINE AND FISHERIES, FISHERIES BRANCH.

OTTAWA, 6th June, 1879.

PUBLIC NOTICE, and particularly the attention of DEEP SEA and INSHORE FISHERMEN, is directed to the following provisions of the Statute, 31 Vic. Cap. 60 known as the "Fisheries Act," passed on the 22nd May, 1868:—

1. Section 14: Prohibits the throwing overboard or leaving of dead or decaying fish, or remains of offal of fish, or other marine animals, within any water where fishing is carried on, or upon any fishing bank; also forbids leaving the same in any net or other fishing apparatus.

2. Section 14, Sub-section 2: Provides that dead or decaying fish, or any other deleterious substance, shall not be drawn into, or allowed to pass into, or be left, or remain in any water frequented by any kinds of fish mentioned in the fishery laws.

3. Section 13, Sub-section 7: Bag-nets and Rab-nets and fish-ponds are prohibited, excepting under special license.

Besides the fines imposed by said Statute, any offender against the Fishery Laws is liable to the forfeiture of the nets, material, implements or appliances used in connection with the offence.

Fishery Officers may seize upon their own view, or on complaint, any fishing gear subject to confiscation, and fine offenders forthwith.

British and foreign fishermen alike are required to conform to the Canadian fishery laws.

It having been established in evidence that certain kinds of nets used for mackerel and other fish are fished in contravention of the fishery laws, by destroying quantities of small fish, besides mature fishes which are thrown away dead or dying, or are left to decay on the fishing grounds, or within the inshore waters; the fishery officers are instructed to strictly enforce the fishery laws passed to prevent such illegal and injurious practices.

They are also instructed that British subjects, when fishing in British waters, are bound to conform in every respect to the Canadian fishery laws, and that foreigners fishing within three miles of the coasts of Canada, under treaties, in common with British subjects, are required to do so in conformity with the fishery laws which govern the operations of British fishermen.
