Another Islander Abroad.

REV. MR. MOBBS' ELOQUENT FUNERAL SERMON. (Sprague, Lincoln Co., Washington, paper, March 9).

The funeral of Theodore Moeler was largely attended yesterday. The burial services were held at the Methodist Church. Rev. H. M. Mobbs delivered a most imposing sermon, and one which impressed itself deeply upon all who heard him, although he was entirely unacquainted with the deceased. Rev. Mr. Mobbs spoke as follows:—

"Brethren, we have met this morning to pay the last act of respect to a fellow-citizen, and drop a tear with the bereft family, who have been called upon to pass through the fires of so great an affliction, and I ask that this audience and the entire community will join with me in this pending duty. "That the whole human family are bound together by one silver chain, known by the name of sympathy, is apparent, from the fact that there are many here this morning, though they have never known the deceased in his lifetime, yet, when grim death makes him his prey, and leaves the thousand streams of loving affection to flow back in alpine torrent upon the stricken hearts. They are ready and waiting to extend words of sympathy and perform acts of self-sacrifice and love.

"Upon such occasions it is not necessary to explain that the deceased was white or black, rich or poor, good or bad. All I need say is, two eyes have gently closed, two hands are folded over the breast, two feet have ceased to walk, one heart is still. A man is dead, children are orphans, a wife and mother is suddenly left a widow, and that is enough to assure help and sympathy from this entire community.

"God has not made me a judge of mankind. He alone has the power to search the hearts and to try the reins of the children of men. The destiny of the human race is not placed in the hands of men nor angels, much less to any church or organizations among men. 'Judgment is mine, I will repay,' saith the Lord. Then, if God is my judge, and not man, I must answer to God and not to men. We must all appear before the judgment seat of God to render an account of the things done in the body, whether they be good or evil. I would that every man would consider him self responsible to the God of all the earth for his life and conduct, and bow to Him alone, and no other God besides him, and that every ecclesiastical power or representative would adopt the words of the angel in the Apocalypse: 'See thou do it not, for I am thy fellow-servant and of thy brethren, the prophets, and of them that bear the sayings of this book worship God.'

"I am not here to commendate upon the life of the deceased. I never knew him in life. I know nothing of him, only that he was a man, and that is enough. And I know that the same fire that warms me, warmed him; the same pains that enter my soul, exasperated him; the same God that made me for his glory, made him for his glory also; the same Heavenly Father that made you and me, loved him; the same Christ that died for me, died for him also; the same blood that was shed for my poor soul, was also shed for his. He was a man, a man. He came from God, and unto God he has returned.

"Some narrow-minded bigots would have us believe that only a few, yes, very few, of the millions who have inhabited the world through all ages, shall be saved. He must belong to this church, or that denomination, or God cannot extend mercy and salvation to him. The Bible don't teach any such doctrine, if I understand it right. It declares that Heaven is a vast realm. John went up on one mountain of inspiration and looked upon the multitudes and said: "Thousands of thousands." He ascended again, and said: "Ten thousand times ten thousand," and another time said, "A hundred and forty and four thousand, of thousands and thousands." And again he ascended, and declared that he saw a great multitude, that no man could number. "And from whence came they?" asked John. Of one church, of one denomination, of one color? Nay, verily, but from every nation, and kindred, and tribe, and tongue; from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south they have come "to sit down with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, in the Kingdom of God." And then John beheld that "their robes were white, so white that no fuller could whiten them," and John asked from whence they came. John was told that these were they who had come up out of great tribulations, and had washed their robes, and made them white. In the Methodist church? No. In the Baptist church? No. In the Episcopal church? No. In the Catholic church? No. But have washed their robes in the blood of the lamb.

Now, all that is left for me to do is to commend this body to the dust, and commend his spirit to God, who gave it. To the bereaved ones, I commend you to Jesus Christ. He can speak words of sympathy that none other can. He can pour into wounded spirits the balm of consolation, until they can look up from the rick of their fondest expectations, and say, "Father, not my will, but thine be done."

Parnell and the Liberals.

THE DETHRONED IRISH LEADER MAKES A SPEECH AT PHOENIX PARK.

Notwithstanding the rain, says a Dublin despatch, fully 2,000 people assembled at Phoenix Park, on Sunday, to assist in the demonstration of the Amnesty Association and protest against the continued imprisonment and alleged inhuman treatment of Irish and Irish-American political prisoners by the British Government. After speeches had been made by Messrs. Kenny, Parnell and others, resolutions were passed calling upon Irishmen at home and abroad to put forth every effort to secure the release of friends, and demanding that the Government hasten the unconditional surrender of prisoners. Parnell's speech was a tirade against the liberals, whom he accused of always making political prisoners, while the Conservatives released them. Parnell declared that the Irish party never made conditions with the government. The prisoners, he said, would rather rot in jail than accept anything but an unconditional release.

News Notes.

The phosphate beds in South Carolina have proved mines of wealth. The Cosaw Mining Co., which gets its ores from under water, has been paying the State at the rate of \$500 a day for its privilege. Gov. Tillman demands a doubling of this rate, and the company resists, closing its doors and throwing 800 men out of employment. In the meantime the state is losing its \$500 a day.

There is a human balloon on one of the hospitals in New York City. Although weighing but 120 pounds, he is so inflated that he has the appearance of weighing 300. In an accident one of his ribs was broken and the fractured bone penetrated his lungs, letting air into his tissues and puffing him up like a balloon. Such accidents are rare, but it is claimed that they are subject to successful treatment, and the unfortunate man may yet be reduced to his normal shape.

Agricultural Notes.

Common stock of any kind never pays. The man who can show even a fine brood of blooded fowls does it with a pride that stimulates him. They cost no more to keep, and poultry and eggs of superior quality are always in demand at extra prices. The poor farmer can never get rich so long as he wastes his energies and his feed upon poor grades of horses and cattle. Get a start with blooded stock, and thereafter the expense will be no greater than in raising that for which there is no market. —Texas Stockman.

BOSTON PRICES.—From an official circular of the 3rd, to hand yesterday, we learn that a further advance was made immediately following the last report, and for a day or two it was difficult finding any good stock at much less than \$1.15, but since Monday the demand has fallen off somewhat and the market has been ruling a little more in buyers favor. At the close, Canada Rose, Hebrons and Burbanks were steady at \$1.05 to \$1.10 per bushel. The egg market is firm, with Eastern extras selling at 22 cents and Eastern firsts at 21 cents. There is no notable change in the prices of fish, but the demand for mackerel is a little more active than it was. The provision market is very firm for all kinds and dealers are buying freely in anticipation of a further advance.

THEY WERE APRIL FOOLED.—There was much excitement among the liquor sellers of Toronto on the evening of April 1st over the following announcement in an evening paper:—

The License Commissioners have decided that all the saloons of the city must be closed on the Queen's Birthday and the 12th of July.

Prominent liquor dealers ran hither and thither to find the Commissioners and ascertain why the decision had been come to until some genius consulted a calendar and discovered that both dates fall on Sunday. He also discovered that the day was April 1.

A COWARDLY ACT.—An elderly lady, a passenger on Saturday's Halifax express from St. John, narrowly escaped being seriously injured between Bedford and Halifax. A stone weighing about ten pounds was hurled by some cowardly hand through the window by which she was sitting, just grazing her face.
