DIED ABROAD.

"Mrs. Elizabeth J. Brown, wife of Stephen Brown, of this city, was buried from the family residence, 445 Seventeenth street, at 2 p. m. The funeral was one of the largest ever held in this city. The I. O. O. F. and K. O. Foresters, of which Mr. Brown is a prominent member, attended in a body, each bringing appropriate and elegant floral tributes. The interment was at the I. O. O. F. cemetery, where the remains of a most kind and loving wife and friend were laid to rest in a bed of roses."—San Diego Sun, May 9th.

The deceased was well known by a large number of our Island readers, being a daughter of the late Allen McKinley, of Kingston, Lot 31. She left here about six years ago for the State of Washington, where she remained for about two years, when she again moved to San Diego, California. Shortly after reaching the latter place she contracted a severe attack of pneumonia fever, the effects of which never completely left her, and finally resulted in her death. She was beloved by all who knew her, both at home and abroad being of a mild and lovable disposition. While on the Island she took an active part in the cause of temperance, being a member of Kingston Star Division, No. 142, Sons of Temperance, for several years. Her sufferings were long and severe but endured without a murmur and she died trusting in the merits of her Redeemer.

MOLASSES.

Prices at the Island Show Another Advance of One Cent.

New York houses are in receipt of cables which report the market strong at a further advance of 1c per gallon, making first cost 13c, or cost and freight 25 1/2c, and this figure is equal to 31c duty paid here. This, says the Montreal Gazette, means that with not a half crop of Barbadoes molasses this year and not 3,000 puncheons about for Quebec and Montreal as to the present, as against 11,000 puncheons last year the trade that the top mark has not been seen yet. With the short sales that have been made and smaller stocks on spot than any other season the prospects are for much higher prices especially as Porto Rico, Antigua and other ports are entirely shut out. Barbadoes planters have been boiling molasses largely into sugar and offers are out of the question now. The New York Commercial, under date of May 14th, says:—The feature in the molasses market was the receipt of a cable from Barbadoes reporting 1c per gallon advance, making an advance of 5c per gallon in four weeks, and molasses not obtainable. Crop short fully 16,000 to 18,000 puncheons. This was encouraging to local holders of foreign molasses and they continued to show a very strong front. Top prices were realized. At New Orleans conditions are unchanged, but the feeling there is quite as strong as it is here.

Local and Other Items.

ASCENSION THURSDAY.

SONS OF ENGLAND.—The annual church parade of the Sons of England will take place on Sunday next. The service will be in St. Paul's Church, and the Rev. Mr. Bryan will preach on the occasion.

REMEMBER THE DATE.—There will be a big picnic at Kinkora on July 5th in connection with the unveiling of the statue of the late Dr. Wall. Further particulars will be given later on, but in the meantime make a memorandum of the date and place.

ANOTHER NEW CHURCH.—Work upon the new Roman Catholic Church at Fiftenth Point was begun a short time ago, and the foundation is now nearing completion. The church will be large, handsome and commodious, and is being built on a beautiful site. It will cost about \$20,000 when completed.

NATIONAL COUNCIL.—The fifth annual conference of the National Council of Women opened in Ottawa on Tuesday. Lady Aberdeen presided, and a good deal of business, mostly of a routine character, was transacted. Mrs. Alexander Anderson represented the Prince Edward Island Council, and read the report of that branch.

A PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—The Farmer reports that Mr. Richard Cudmore, of Muddy Creek, fell from his barn loft a short time ago and displaced several ribs. Mr. Cudmore was on the upper loft when he lost his footing. In falling he first struck on the middle left beam and then fell to the floor among the harrows and other farm machinery. He was unconscious when picked up.

ISLANDER MISSING.—Charles Robblee, of Haverhill, Mass., has been missing from that place for upwards of a week. Mr. Robblee left his home for the City Farm where he was employed on Tuesday 10th inst., and that was the last seen of him. A diligent search has been made for him, but so far without success. The missing man is a son of Mr. Alexander Robblee, of Tryon, and has resided at Haverhill, Mass., for several years.

FOR THE KLONDIKE.—Another letter has been received from Mr. Geo. A. Dixon, dated Lake Tagish, April 24. Mr. Dixon says: It took us one month to get here, sixty miles from Skaguay. We had to work fifteen hours a day. We travelled twenty-four miles every day, but went over the same trail ten or twelve times. All the party are well, but played out to a certain extent. We will start to build our boats about thirty miles down the lake. Henderson has gone by the Lake Bennett route.

ABSENT IN A DORY.—We learn that on Monday, the 31st inst., a five-years-old son of Mr. Francis Gallant, of Fifteen Point, went drift out into the straits in a small light dory and the men in a boat who went out to save him had considerable difficulty in the rough sea in doing so. The dory had drifted out quite a distance before it was regained. This accident occurred the same day and about the same place as the recent sad drowning event.—Summerside Farmer.

THEATRICAL.—The Frost Dramatic Company played "Kathleen Mavourneen" last night. The presentation was up to the average, and the audience was generous with its applause. Between the acts there were specialties by different members of the company, and Vinnicombe's orchestra supplied the music. To-night "Paradise Regained" will be put upon the boards, and the management promise a good performance. There will also be specialties between the acts.

SKULL FOUND.—One of the laborers on the farm of Mr. James Clow, at Murray Harbor (North), made an interesting find recently, in the shape of a human skull, in a good state of preservation. The skull was found in the bank which fringes the shore at the bottom of the farm, where many years ago there was a French settlement. No doubt the skull, which has some excellent "bumps," is the memento of some doughty habitant of the long ago, the remainder of whose skeleton is likely also embedded in the bank. There is a probability that a graveyard existed nearby, as the locality, which yet bears the name of French Marsh, is said to have once had a numerous French population.
