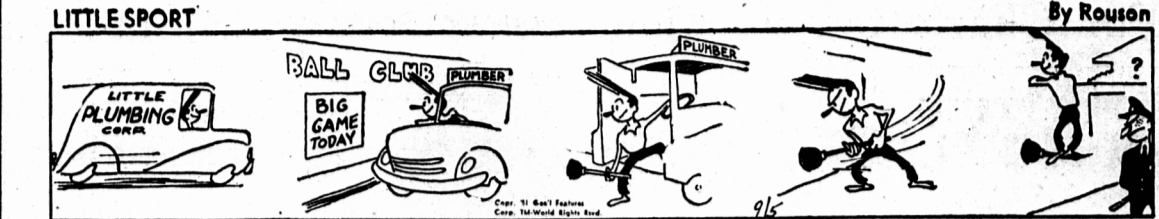

"Mud" Bruneteau To Coach St. Louis Flyers

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 4 (AP)—Modere (Mud) Bruneteau, coach of the Omaha club in the United States Hockey League for the last five years, today was named coach of St. Louis Flyers of the American Hockey League.

Johnny Mitchell, Flyers coach last year, still has a year to run on a two-year contract but under the arrangement he will move to Chicago Black Hawks of the National Hockey League to help with player personnel of the Hawk farm system.

It was also announced that a working agreement between the Flyers and Black Hawks would be renewed. At least five players and possibly more of last year's Hawks would be sent to the Flyers.

Three of the present Flyers have been sold to Detroit Red Wings for their Edmonton farm club in the Pacific Coast League. They are Vic Grigg, Johnny Raynak and Henry Backer. Paul Lamirande has been released at his request and Ernie Trigg has been placed on the voluntarily retired list.

Bruneteau played with the Red Wings 11 seasons. At Omaha he won the regular season scoring title five times and last year took that honor and the playoff championship.

Don Bellringer Signs With Islanders Club; Is Fifth This Season

Don Bellringer, a high scoring forward with the North Sydney Victorias last season, has been signed to play with the Islanders this year, it was announced yesterday by coach Leo Lamoureux.

A 21 year old hockey product of Kingston, Ontario, the youthful Bellringer was the second highest scorer on the North Sydney team last year. He picked up 38 goals and 22 assists for a total of 60 points in 76 games.

A fleet winger, Bellringer showed great ability to score goals as shown by the fact that he picked up 38 markers last year which was fourth high in the Cape Breton League. Ahead of him were Bob Bonness with 46, Dunc McIntyre with 41 and team-mate Laurie Peterson with 40.

Frank Sedgman Wins U.S. Tennis Ch'ship

FOREST HILLS, N.Y., Sept. 4 (AP)—Frank Sedgman of Australia, long overdue, finally took his place among the fine tennis champions today when he brought his big game to its absolute peak and slaughtered Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, 6-4, 6-1, 6-1, in the final of the U.S. national championship.

It took the big, fleet Aussie only 45 minutes to become the first foreigner to lift the cup since Fred Perry of England took it home in 1926, and the first Australian ever to win it. He took Seixas airt as 12,000 marvelled at his mastery of every stroke.

In addition to seeing the 23-year-old Sedgman finally occupy the niche which the experts began prophesying for him several years ago, the throng also had the electrifying experience of seeing a new star born — one who likely will dominate women's tennis for many years.

That was little Maureen Connolly, a cheery, ball-walloping 16-year-old from San Diego, Calif., who handed her way into the women's final with a 6-4, 6-4 upset victory over Doris Hart of Miami, Fla., the Wimbledon champion and overwhelming tournament favorite.

If Maureen defeats Shirley Fry of Akron, Ohio, in tomorrow's final she will become the youngest net queen in the nation's history. She will not be 17 until Sept. 17. Helen Wills was 17, a little more than a month short of 18, when she won the first of her seven titles by defeating Molla Bjurstedt Mallory in the 1923 final.

Maureen had won the first set from Miss Hart before rain interrupted their match yesterday. Some wondered if the child might get the shakes overnight and have less than her usual court composure today. She didn't. She ran up a 5-1 lead with her blazing, flat drives, faltered for a brief stretch as Doris pulled up to a 4-5, then poured it on again to clinch her victory.

There was no question that Sedgman was blazing, but some faint hope had been held out that Seixas would be able to extend him. The Philadelphia had, after all, knocked out Ken McGregor of Australia, Herbie Flam of Beverly Hills and Savitt in spectacular succession. But against such a game as Sedgman's today he virtually was unarmed.

Several times on important points Seixas appeared to have a winner in his grasp, to have hit a shot Sedgman could not possibly reach. But at the last split second the Aussie would stretch about 15 feet and flick the pellet into an unoccupied section of grass.

Villemain To Retire After Tour Of The U. S.

PARIS, Sept. 4 (AP)—French middleweight Robert Villemain today announced he will retire from boxing after an eight-month campaign in the United States. He will sail for New York late in October with his wife and his manager Jean Brettonel for a series of matches.

Villemain is 27. He lost twice to Ray Robinson.

NEW YORK, Sept. 4 (AP)—The District Attorney's Office today opened an official inquiry into the death of boxer George Flores, who died yesterday as the result of a knockout in Madison Square Garden.

Assistant District Attorney Alexander Herman in charge of the Homicide Bureau questioned Roger Donoghue, who knocked out Flores last Wednesday night; Referee Barney Felix and others.

The inquiry was a routine one that normally follows such an accidental death.

District Attorney Frank Hogan yesterday ordered a grand jury investigation of the death and the State Athletic Commission announced it planned to hold a public hearing on the matter.

Donoghue, who had maintained a long vigil at St. Clare's Hospital where Flores had been taken, appeared pale and tired.

Fain Continues Narrow A. L. Batting Lead

CHICAGO, Sept. 4 (AP)—Ferris Fain, Philadelphia first sacker, added a point to his eyelash margin over Detroit third baseman George Kell in the close American League batting race last week.

Official statistics including Monday's games credited Fain with a pace-setting mark of .331, compared with .329 for Kell. Fain dropped a point with eight hits in 25 trips, while Kell slipped two with 11 for 35.

Fain, seeking Philadelphia's first individual batting crown since Jimmy Fox won in 1933 with .356, has been far less active than Kell this season. But although Fain has only 344 at bats, against 507 for Kell, the injury-slowed Athletic star should hit the 400-times-at-bat minimum for claiming the American loop title.

In third spot and still slipping was Orestes Mino, Chicago's erstwhile league leader, who fell four points to .324. Fourth with .322 was Boston's Ted Williams.

Dom DiMaggio became a double leader in the specialized departments. DiMaggio, remaining ahead in hits with 169, took the two-batter leadership from Washington's Irv Noren with 32.

Mino continued to lead in runs with 101, and triples with 14, but had to share the stolen bases leadership with White Sox team-mate Jim Busby, who overhauled him at 25.

Philadelphia's Gus Zernial kept ahead in home runs with 29, but was matched in RBI's by Williams at 112.

In the pitching department, Ellis Kinder of Boston had the best percentage, .800, on an 8-2 record, while New York's Vic Raschi remained tops in strikeouts with 135.

Musial Adds To Lead In Batting Race

NEW YORK, Sept. 4 (AP)—St. Louis Cardinals' seven-game winning streak last week came close to being a one-man show for Stan Musial.

Stan, with the 1951 batting championship almost in his grasp, made five hits in the Labor Day doubleheader against Cincinnati to bring his production for eight days to 15 blows in 33 times at bat. That raised his batting average six points to a comfortable .368.

Musial also leads the National League in triples with 11.

Richie Ashburn of the Phillies regained second place in batting by improving his average by four points to .341 while Brooklyn's Jackie Robinson lost seven, falling to .333. Ashburn, league leader in hits with 188, knocked out 15 of 37 times at bat during the eight days ending Monday.

Kincaid hit his 37th home run of the season to stay one ahead of Brooklyn's Gil Hodges and also leads in runs scored with 111. Sid Gordon of Boston leads in runs batted in with 98, and Alvin Dark, New York, leads in two-base hits with 33. Boston's Sam Jethroe tops the base stealers with 31.

Preacher Roe of Brooklyn and Sal Maglie of New York still are one-two in pitching. Roe has won 18 games and lost only two for a .900 average. Maglie's record is 18-5 for .783. Lefty Warren Spahn of Boston leads in strikeouts with 142.

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Abbies Planning Strong Rugby Teams This Year

The Charlottetown Abbies, who last year came close to winning the McCurdy Cup, emblematic of Maritime rugby supremacy, are getting geared for another rugby season with their sights set on the McCurdy Cup, the Island senior and intermediate titles.

With the fall air beginning to sweep across the Province, the boys are preparing to get back to the football field this week and take up where they left off last year in their attempt to put Charlottetown back on the football map.

About 40 football prospects have been lined up for work-outs with the teams and it is expected that more will volunteer to play on either the senior or intermediate teams which it is planned to form.

Three Prince of Wales College men, with well known football background will be handling the players. They are Messrs. Gordon Bennett, W. J. MacDonald and James Coyle. Mr. Coyle is a former star of Saint Dunstan's University and Abegweit football team.

Practice sessions will get underway on Thursday evening at Victoria Park. It was stated last night by Elmer Blanchard, Chairman of the Football Committee. The first week will be spent in light exercising in order to get in shape for the more strenuous scrimmages. Time of practice will be 4:30.

Last year the Abbies made an auspicious start to gain Maritime football recognition. They went to the Maritime semi-finals where they were defeated by a Caledonia team 3-2 under dubious circumstances. The Caledonians then went on to win the McCurdy cup by defeating Acadia University 13-8. Acadia won the Maritime inter-collegiate title.

This year, with most of last season's squad around and a number of new players available the Abbies plan to venture into both the Senior and Intermediate fields. In the Intermediate class they will stack up against the second Saints and Prince of Wales.
