

Couture Suspended By Black Hawks

CHICAGO, (AP)—Gerald (Doc) Couture, veteran right winger, was suspended Saturday by Chicago Black Hawks of the National Hockey League for refusing to report to Quebec Aces of the Que-

bec Hockey League. Couture, 29, said the suspension resulted from an effort by the Hawks to use him in a trade with Montreal Canadiens. Couture was tabbed for a minor league assignment by the Canadiens in the deal but had a preference for Calgary of the Western League and this caused negotiations to collapse. Hawk president Bill Tobin then ordered Couture to report to Quebec but he refused to do. Couture, who broke into pro hockey in 1944-45 with Detroit Red Wings, is from Saskatoon.

Cardinals Obtain New Pitcher

ST. LOUIS, (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals Thursday bought right-hander Jim Walsh, top pitcher last season for Hollywood Stars in the Pacific Coast League. The purchase price was not announced but the deal hinges on whether the Cards keep him. Manager Eddie Stanky said he would go off the Cardinals' active list to make room for Walsh. Stanky, an infielder, started his major league career with Chicago Cubs in 1943. Walsh had 16 victories and nine defeats in 1953.

Wings, Leafs, Rangers Win Saturday NHL Games

DETROIT, (CP)—The league-leading Detroit Red Wings picked up a three-goal lead in the first two periods and then withstood a late Chicago surge to defeat the Black Hawks 4-2 in a National Hockey League game here Saturday night. Ted Lindsay scored a first-period goal and Alex Delvecchio and Marcel Pronovost added another two for the Red Wings in the second period to send them into the final frame leading 3-0. The Hawks managed to click twice, Bill Mosenko and Pete Conacher scoring with Larry Wilson in a final attempt to tie the score the Hawks pulled goalie Al Rollins. Glen Skov snuffed the rally by sliding the puck into the empty net from about 60 feet out.

TORONTO, (CP)—Held scoreless for two games, Toronto Maple Leafs broke out Saturday night for a 4-2 decision over Boston Bruins before 12,715 fans. The third-place Leafs, beaten by 2-0 margins by Detroit and Montreal in their last two starts, opened the scoring late in the first period and were never headed. Harry Watson got Toronto's first goal at 17:01 of the first frame, tipping Jim Morrison's 40-foot slapshot into the net. Dave Creighton of the Bruins made it 1-1 near the eight-minute mark of the second, stealing the puck from Tim Horton in the Toronto defence zone and beating goalie Harry Lumley from alongside the boards. Eric Nesterenko sent Leafs into the lead again eight minutes later on an unusual play. Bob Bailey was centring off with Milt Schmidt of Boston in the Bruin end. After the faceoff, their raised sticks became entangled and Bailey spun free and kicked the loose puck about 10 feet across to Nesterenko, in the clear for a perfect set-up. Ron Stewart trapped Sid Smith's rink-wide pass at the blue-line and streaked in to beat goalie Sugar Jim Henry with a close-in drive at 8:29 of the final period. About two minutes later rookie Doug Mohns took the puck off Morrison's stick and fired a knee-high blast past Lumley. That made it 3-2 and Boston coach Lynn Patrick yanked Henry from the net in the final 45 seconds in search for the equalizer. The move backfired as Rudy Migay of Leafs snared the puck in the Boston zone and fired into the open cage during the final second.

MONTREAL, (CP)—The up-and-up coming New York Rangers, currently about the hottest team in the National Hockey League, edged Montreal Canadiens 2-1 Saturday night for Rangers' first victory on Montreal ice in nearly four years. Dean Prentice and Paul Ronty scored second-period goals, enough to give Rangers their ninth victory in 13 starts—against three defeats and one tie—since New Year's.

Floyd Curry scored Canadiens' single goal later in the middle period and from there on the hustling Rangers stalled one Montreal drive after another. Rangers' victory, before a crowd of 14,464, was their first in Montreal since the playoffs in April 1950, and their first in regular season play since February of the same year. Canadiens loss was their third at home this season, against 23 wins and a tie. They played without Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion, suspended for remaining games against Rangers because of his stick-swinging affair last month in New York. Goalie Johnny Bower was outstanding for the New Yorkers, kicking out 32 shots compared with 15 saves by Gerry McNeil of Montreal.

Qualified voters, subject to above are: (a) Owners or joint owners (for three months previous to election day) of real estate in the City to the extent of \$500.00 assessed value. (b) Wife or husband of such an owner if the owner be entitled to vote. (c) Men renting premises in the City of a yearly rental of at least \$100.00 and having rented such in the City for the three months previous to Election Day. (d) Women renting premises as in (c) above, and who have been assessed for Civic Taxes for 1953, and not in arrears as above. (e) Residents of the City who have paid Poll Tax for the year 1953. (f) Non-residents of the City if otherwise qualified as above and doing business and occupying business premises in the City.

MULTIPLE VOTING—Persons voting on (a) (b) (c) (d) or (f) above may vote in each Ward in which they are so qualified. Persons voting on (e) above may vote only in the Ward of which they are a resident. Property or rental qualifications having removed to another Ward within three months next preceding date of election, entitles vote in former Ward only.
