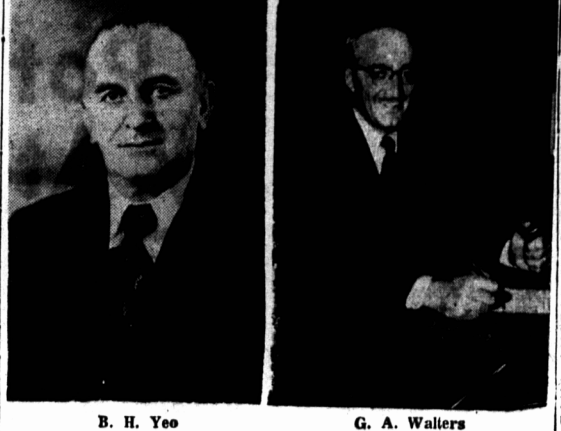

**Says Movie Theatres Aid Merchants Of Area**

Among the many motion picture exhibitors attending the annual meeting of the Maritime Motion Picture Exhibitors Association at Saint John on Wednesday, were Mayor B. H. Yeo, of Montague, who was re-elected Vice-President and G. A. Walters, Charlottetown who was re-elected to his seventh term of office as Secretary of the Association.

Other officers include: J. McDonough, executive secretary, Halifax; F. M. Gregor, vice-president for Nova Scotia, New Waterford; W. G. Fenety, treasurer, Fredericton; A. J. Gordon, president, Springhill; F. Gordon Spencer, vice-president for New Brunswick, Saint John.

Other provincial exhibitors attending were H. Gaudet and R. Pope, both of Summerside.

Arch. H. Jolly, Toronto, executive director of the Motion Pictures Industries Council of Canada, addressed the luncheon session in the hotel.

"Movie theatres are an asset to any business community and are big morale builders" he said in noting there should be greater co-operation between motion picture exhibitors and merchants.

"These theatres are a magnet of any main street, drawing thousands of persons weekly to the heart of any community," he said. "Because of this, merchants must become more fully aware of the fact and make the most of countless trends started annually through use in movies."

He then recounted instances where various clothing manufacturers had found large demands for certain styles of clothing worn by different actors in a movie. There was a strong link between the two industries which could be forged even stronger to the advantage of each group, he said.

In relating the history of the council, he said it was formed in Ottawa in 1949 to better public relations between the industry and the public, to increase motion picture theatre patronage, and to defeat unjust legislation and discriminating taxes.

A banquet in the evening and the installation of new officers closed the one-day meeting.

Mr. Donald A. MacDonald, manager of Producer's Co-operative Association in a statement yesterday took exception to remarks made by Mr. David Gilbert, president of the Canadian Retail Merchants Association, who in a speech at Truro, on Wednesday, said that Manitoba could take a surplus portion of the Maritime potato crop. Mr. Gilbert said that Maritime potatoes could be sold on the Manitoba market at \$1.90 per 100 lbs.

Mr. MacDonald said that a wiser suggestion than that made by Mr. Gilbert would have to be forthcoming if Prince Edward Island potato producers are not to suffer what he terms the greatest loss in the history of the potato industry.

Mr. MacDonald explained that the freight rate to Winnipeg for potatoes in carload lots is \$1.36 per 100 lbs; the cost of the container is 20 cents and the minimum shipping charge ten cents; making a total cost of \$1.66, a net return to the shipper of 24 cents per cwt. or 15 cents a bushel. Mr. MacDonald further observed that the heating costs would amount to five cents a bushel so that after all expenses were deducted the absolute net return would be 10 cents per bushel.

"Mr. Gilbert may be an authority on retail merchandising, but he apparently knows very little about potato marketing", observed Mr. MacDonald.
