NEWS NOTES.

The navigation of the upper Hudson is
closed on account of ice.

The decrease of the United States debt
during December was nearly \$13,000,000.

A Quebec despatch announces the sus-
pension of the "Times," a new venture in
journalism.

The annual sale of pews in Plymouth
church, Brooklyn, realized \$38,000, a de-
crease of \$4,000.

The French Academy of Medicine lately
had their attention called to the case of a
girl of six weighing 124 pounds.

They are burning the straw after thrash-
ing, in Southern Manitoba, lest it should
encumber the ground in the spring.

Law suits are not always expensive.
A out the cheapest a man can get into is
the striped one worn in the penitentiary.

The Toronto World, independent Grit,
propounds the following conundrum: "If
Grits, led by a man of Mr. Blake's ability,
cannot carry an old reform constituency
like West Northumberland, what can they
carry?"

There are three candidates in the field
for the representation of New Westminster
in the House of Commons—that seat hav-
ing been vacated by the elevation of Dr.
McInnes to the Senate. All three candi-
dates are supporters of Sir John Mac-
donald.

The statement that Prince Bismarck in-
tended to propose a Congress of the Powers
to discuss the Pope's position is semi-
officially denied. A proposal to re-estab-
lish the Pope's responsibility has been suggested
semi-officially, but no replies have yet been
received.

The Episcopal church at Hughenden,
which Mr. Deane usually attended, has
been magnificently decorated in his mem-
ory. Two beautifully stained windows
have been erected, and the chancel walls
have been covered with rich paintings of
evangelists, prophets and angels.

The year 1882 is to be an *annus mirabilis*
—so the Latter Day prophets tell us; for it
is 1883, at latest, that the end of this
dispensation is to come, and the long-
kingdomed confederacy of the Latin
nations must be organized some years
before that by the predominance of France.

Besides the Mussulman Messiah is expected
by Mahammadans to appear in Africa
about this time.

Mr. Vennor has not given up yet, after
his signal failure for a number of years.
He predicts for the first week of this month
a severe dip of 10 or 15° below zero, lasting
four days. The thermometer will then
rise abruptly to moderate mildness, and
from snow to rain. The other cold dips
will occur during the month with mild-
ness between.

King Victor Emmanuel has made it
known through the medium of an address
at a New Year's reception, that Italy is
firmly decided not to admit of the slightest
discussion of certain questions touching
internal order. His remarks are said to
have evidently been intended as an allusion
to Bismarck's reported designs on behalf
of the Vatican.

Rev. A. J. Bray came to Canada for a
few years last year. He likes the Dominion
so well that he finds himself unable to again
reside in the mother country. He recently
spent a few months "at home" and pre-
dicts that the present year will see a
number of British capitalists immigrating
to this country, who will invest their money
in Canadian manufactures.

A Quebec paper, without giving its
authority, if it has any, for the statement,
says the archbishop, bishops, and clergy of
the Roman Catholic Church in that province
have withdrawn their opposition to
Mr. Girouard's deceased wife's sister mar-
riage bill, and that it will be introduced
again during the coming session, but in a
new form, that is, not by repealing the
Acts now in force, but by inserting that mar-
riage. The same authority asserts that
the lay members of the Church of England
S and of that Province in end sup-
port of the bill. So far as we have yet ascer-
tained, these statements are entirely unauthor-
ized and unwarrantable.

Appropos of the approaching marriage of
the Duke of Albany, the youngest son of
Queen Victoria, to a German princess, the
question is being raised as to the amount
of money which should be voted to the
junior members of the royal family. "I
presume," says a writer in the London
Truth, "that Parliament will be asked to
vote him the same annual allowance as was
granted to the Duke of Connaught; but it
may well be asked why an English prince
should not live on the same allowance as a
German prince. In this age of shdily, I
think it ought to be laid down that it is by
no means necessary to be rich in order to
be respected. One or two royal princes
living in decent comfort upon an income of
£500 per annum would do more than any-
thing else that can be conceived to shake
the reign of ostentatious nobility."

It is no secret that Mr. Tennyson in his
own person, is far from possessing an ideal
tidiness and poetic elegance of taste and
mien. As he walks on summer afternoons
through Hyde Park, wondering are the
glances which are cast by strangers upon
the dishevelled figure. The London World
presents a spectacle and wild locked caricature
of the poet, with this verse:—
In her ear he whispers gruffly,
"Pork for lunch, for dinner trips;
See that neither's done too roughly—
Bring a match and light my pipe!"
She replies, "Oh! I hated his eyes,
Curse and honour of my life!"
He is our famed Poet Laureate,
She is but the Laureate's wife
Through the Park and Gardens going,
Proudly and the Strand,
All the time his "bees" blowing,
All agree the people stand
"Wants 'n' air out! Run old buffer!
Haged a c'ntry at last!"
Says the Laureate, "This I suffer
From the weary headed booz!"
