THE SOUTH SHORE RAILWAY.

Mr. TARTE delivered a speech at Sorel, (Quebec) a few days ago, in the course of which he said:

"During the session before last Mr. Bruneau, your young and intelligent representative, and doctor Mignault, came to see me. They asked me what I thought about the South Shore Railway. I told them that, speaking for myself, I would do all I could to complete the line. My word is as good as gold. Speaking for myself, without engaging the responsibility of my colleagues, which I have not the right to engage, I say that the South Shore Railway shall be built. It is because the country needs it. the town of Sorel is no doubt, a town of great importance, but works of this magnitude cannot be undertaken for considerations purely local. We have already, it is true, between Montreal and the East, the Intercolonial. But I do not fear to make this prophesy, that before two years are over we shall have to carry from the port of Montreal a hundred million bushels of wheat, and, of this immense traffic, the South Shore Railway will carry its share."

The South Shore Railway, referred to by Mr. Tarte, will, when constructed, be the fourth line extending eastwards out of Montreal. There are now the C. P. R., the Grand Trunk and the Drummond County railways—and besides there is the great river St. Lawrence with the numerous steamships and sailing vessels plying upon it—all carrying the products of the west towards the sea and the products of the east into Montreal. Yet, in the face of this strong competition, the Minister of Public Works has promised an additional line of railway at a time when not a dollar can be obtained for the construction of the projected Belfast and Murray Harbor railway. A fourth railway out of Montreal is not needed. In 1896 the Toronto Globe declared that the traffic over the then line (the Grand Trunk) was not "more than sufficient for the profitable maintenance of the present service," adding that, "were the line duplicated and the traffic divided by the extension of the Intercolonial, the increase of business would not counterbalance the cost of the double service and management."

Despite the Globe's declaration a large amount of public money has been expended by the Liberal Party on the opening of the Drummond County railway while many thousands of dollars will every year be required for its maintenance and to make up the difference between its expenditures and receipts. These heavy obligations have been imposed for the furtherance of the political purposes of Mr. Tarte and his Liberal friends. With the same Liberal motive, the Minister of Public Works now promises to double them by the construction of a fourth railway and a fifth means of conveyance east of Montreal which is as much needed as the fifth wheel of a coach. This is Mr. Tarte's way of uniting the electorate of Quebec and obtaining a French contingent to vote for the Liberal party in the House of Commons. It operates unfairly towards the rest of Canada, and particularly towards districts like Belfast and Murray Harbor, which really need railway accommodation. But so long as we have the Liberals in office it will be maintained.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—While the earth out of the sewer excavations has for the most part been apparently clean and pure, a remarkable exception has we are informed, been found on Water Street. An intolerable stench caused by organic matters in a state of putrefaction burst out there on Saturday, indicating proximity to a blind well. ADDRESS TO GOVERNOR HOWLAN.

Copy of the Address Presented by the People of Tignish.

The following is a copy of the address presented to his Honour Lieut. Governor Howlan at Tignish on Friday, to which reference was made in our issue of Saturday:—

To His Honor the Honorable George William Howlan, Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island. May it please Your Honor:

The undersigned, on behalf of the inhabitants of Tignish and vicinity, a district dear to you by years of confidence freely bestowed, beg to welcome you here a second time during your incumbency of the highest position in our Province.

The office of Lieutenant Governor must necessarily fall vacant; but seldom in the lifetime of even an octogenarian and the fact that our gracious sovereign's mandate has been confided to you in the capacity is an ample tribute to our foresight, and that of our fathers, who picked you out when a small boy to represent this division in our old colonial Legislature during a history-making epoch—an epoch replete with many benefits to us—which saw under your guiding of great local public works, notable among them being the Branch railway the North Cape lighthouse, and the breakwater at Tignish. A further gratification to us is the fact that your occupancy of the Governorial chair has been of great material benefit to the province, as you were no sooner installed than you at once put yourself in touch in the agricultural interests, always for us the most important, and to-day every body of advanced agriculturists are ready to rise and you blessed. Need we assure you that we tell you that the name of Howlan will be remembered and held up as that of an ideal Governor long after your subscribers will have passed to their eternal reward.

This address would be of too great a length were we to recite even a few of the many national achievements of which you formed so large a part. We would only express, then, in conclusion, our regrets that your amiable lady, for whom we all entertain the highest regard, could not have seen fit to accompany you today, whilst we beg that you will convey to her our best wishes for her health and happiness.

As the pioneer harbor maker of this place, we would ask you, if time should permit, to visit the site of our new public work, for which you laid the foundation, and note the progress time has wrought. We now formally bid you welcome and wish you a pleasant stay in our midst.
