We And Our Neighbours

WORDS, IDLE WORDS

Few parents (and teachers) realize how many unnecessary and ineffective words they use in dealing with their children.

"Eddie, mother calls in accents neither low nor sweet, 'be sure to hang up your hat and coat.'"

"Mary," she cries, "don't leave your books strewn around the room."

In a family "gripe session" (of which more will be said next week) I heard a ten year old girl complain, "Mom keeps asking me to do this, did you do that? Why doesn't she look first before she says anything. Lots of times I've done what she wants."

The smaller child is bombarded by the words, "Don't" and "Stop" until they become meaningless, very often.

We have or another of an older sister who was told by her mother to, "go see what Johnnie is doing and tell him to stop."

There was a cartoon of a little girl telling her teacher her name was "Mary Stop". Instead of words, a better way is to take the dangerous object from the child, or to lead him out of danger.

Then there are the many abrupt commands. "Put your tops away!" "Come to the table at once!" "Hurry and get on your sweater!" etc.

In themselves, these orders are composed of few words, but since they seldom bring the required result, they are followed up usually, by arguments and threats and punishment.

This leads to confusion and resentment and sometimes to deliberate disobedience.

There is a factor that grown-ups do not always take into account. Words are not grasped as quickly by children, and they cannot "get organized" as rapidly as adults.

It has been suggested that giving a child a few minutes' notice will prove helpful. "Tommy, we'll be eating supper in a little while. You'd better start putting your toys away" is more likely to bring Tommy to the table promptly, than, "Come at once. Do you hear me!"

There are the chronic sore spots in every family, that had better be written off. "I've told that door - or wipe off the wash-bowl - or put the knife where it belongs - or what not," should not be topped by the thousand and one time! Small chance of changing matters now!

What would happen if parents (or teachers) were forced to guide their children without using words at all? An appealing little article in a back copy April issue of a well-known publication, deals with just this situation.

The author, a woman, has been told by her doctor that she must not use her voice for six weeks. She finds it her surprise that the device she is forced to think out work far better than the former method of pouring out unplanned words.

"Come to dinner," she says, "was an admonition invariably ignored. - The more I scolded, the less they listened. Now I ring a dinner bell twice. The first peal is a signal that in five minutes it will sound again. When it does, there is action in a hurry!"

(Ever watch the children race to the dining hall at a summer camp when the bell rings?)

Some of this co-operation, I believe was the result of the child's knowledge of his mother's condition. Children are loving and sympathetic when their help is enlisted. But direct action, and no explanations, are often best where the child has no alternative.

Another suggestion, similar to the ringing of the dinner bell, is blowing a whistle to call the young child. The author states, "By rearrangement two blasts on a whistle bring my toddler promptly home. Strange how much more effective this is than the dulcet tones of Mother's voice, yodeling down the street!"

These devices are worth trying. Others can be worked out with the time and energy saved on words - too often, idle - words.

Farmers Get Into Less Trouble

OTTAWA, (CP) - Farmers get into less trouble with the law than city folk, J. Angus MacLean PC-Queens told the Commons Monday night.

Mr. MacLean said he agrees with Otto, Roman philosopher, that the agricultural population produces the "bravest of all men, the most valiant soldiers and the class of citizens the least given of all to evil designs."

Mr. MacLean observed that Prince Edward Island and Saskatchewan are more dependent on agriculture than the other provinces. And a look at the Canada Book will show these two provinces are lowest in those characteristics which are least desirable and highest in those characteristics which are most desirable among the general population.

The number of adults charged with indictable offences in the two provinces, he said, is 19 per 10,000 population, the lowest in Canada. The number of motor vehicle accidents was also the lowest at 19 per 10,000 motor vehicles.
