A Treacherous Stab at Clow.

To the Editor of the Examiner. Sir,—I noticed in the Weekly Patriot of the 9th inst., a communication headed "The Presbyterian and the Electors of Murray Harbor," and signed by "Templar." This article may be classed among the meanest, most treacherous and contemptible, that ever came from the pen of any scribbler. The writer says the people of this district should not vote for Clow, because forsooth he once sold liquor. Twenty years ago, or even not so long a time, it was the custom of nearly all merchants to sell liquor. A man doing any business at all did not deem it complete unless liquor formed a part of his merchandise. Perhaps as large a number of the people, as ninety out of every hundred, used or contemplated the use of liquor. It was not then as it is now, by many, thought a crime to take a glass. The best men in our land, including the clergymen, officers and members of the Churches of all denominations were among those who aided, abetted and countenanced the traffic in liquor. Were these people all hypocrites and vagabonds? Were they all criminals? Were the men who were engaged in this traffic disreputable and disrespected? No; a thousand times no. They were as sincere in their professions, as honest in their intentions, and as respectable as the people are at the present day. The only difference between then and now is that the times and opinions have changed. The people are beginning to see more clearly the evil effects of this traffic, and are earnestly working for its suppression. This is an age of progress and improvement, and it is not strange that our opinions should advance with the times. Again, we should not judge the actions of people in the past by the age in which we live. Then it was not considered a disreputable business—now it is. I think it is certainly very unjust and very unreasonable to charge a man for doing an act thirty years ago, which was not then, but is now, considered questionable. Why not say do not vote for Clow because when a child he stole a spoonful of sugar when his mother's back was turned? Perhaps he threw the nursing bottle from his hands and broke it. Why not mention this as well? Such childishness is despicable in the extreme. Such low, unmanly utterances are unworthy of any gentleman, are unworthy of the press, and greatly tend to poison the intellect and degrade the minds of the people. Mr. Clow sold liquor twenty-five years ago. He abandoned the business, I believe, because he disliked it; and instead of giving this as a reason why we should not, it is a good strong reason why we should vote for him. He stands, to-day, a man, whose character for integrity is unimpaired, whose probity is above suspicion, honoured and respected, wherever and by whomsoever he is known; and whose word is taken without a moment's hesitation. I care not where this manner of attack originated, whether with the Presbyterian or with "Templar." It is as unworthy of one as the other. It is a treacherous stab in the dark, a stone thrown from ambush for purely political motives; but instead of having the desired effect, it will rebound with redoubled force upon those who gave it. QUICK WORK.—The steamer "Worcester," which arrived from Boston on Friday evening at 6 o'clock, discharged her inward freight, loaded a full cargo of produce, and sailed on return at 12 o'clock on Saturday evening. This quick work reflects credit on the energy of Capt. Hallett.

By cable to L. C. Owen, Nov. 13, we learn that the brig "Lady Milton," McRae, master, arrived at Liverpool from Charlottetown, 16 days. Brig "Fanny," Murchison, master, sailed from Liverpool for Rosario, South America. The brig "Lauretta," Christie, master, sailed from Liverpool for Buenos Ayres.

THE Card of Dr. James Warburton, graduate of Edinburgh University, will be found in another column. His office is on the corner of Great George and Water street, opposite St. Dunstan's Cathedral. Dr. Warburton is, we learn, quite skillful in his profession. We predict for him a large and successful practice in this community.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, James Goodman was arraigned for assaulting his mother, and discharged without fine on promising to take the pledge. The trial of John McKenzie, arrested for cruelty to animals, was postponed. Patrick Loughran, arrested for same offence, was discharged. The McPhersons, arrested for larceny, were again remanded.

THE case of Grant vs. Beaudry, was commenced in the Supreme Court, Ottawa, on Friday last. It is a case involving the question as to the right of Orangemen to parade and is exciting much attention among the members of that Order in the Upper Provinces. It arises out of the arrest by Mayor Beaudry, in Montreal, of Mr. Grant, county master, in July, 1878.

MARSHAL FLYNN is, we are pleased to see, endeavoring to punish truckmen who unfeelingly overload their consumptive looking animals. He is right in doing so. Time and again we see single horses dragging loads past our office which are large enough for double teams. Such cruelty should be severely punished by the Stipendiary Magistrate.

THE LOCOMOTIVE BROTHERHOOD.—The Moncton Transcript says: Mr. M. Phelan has received from the Locomotive Brotherhood of Cleveland, Ohio, a check for the sum of \$2,500, which money is to be distributed among those drivers who were compelled to quit work rather than withdraw their names from the Brotherhood list. Each will receive about \$180. The sum of \$120 is to be paid to the fireman who refused, at the time of the trouble to take an engine, and who subsequently went west.

THE regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening—Mayor, Recorder, and all members of the Board present. The usual number of Bills were passed and ordered to be paid. The appointing of a health delegation to Ottawa was taken up. A profusion of motions were tabled, and irrelevant discussions followed, which were interspersed with crude jokes from the Councilors and followed by loud laughter from the audience. At length separate motions appointing Drs. Taylor, Conroy and Jenkins as delegates were adopted. The Council, after hearing a number of written complaints from citizens, regarding bad streets and sidewalks, adjourned.
