HALIFAX (CP)—The weather office says a generally sunny but cold day is expected in the Maritimes today.

Regional forecasts: Halifax and vicinity, Northern Nova Scotia, Eastern Shore, Cape Breton; Prince Edward Island, Eastern N.B. Counties, and Lower St. John River Valley, and South Shore of N.S. except Yarmouth County: sunny and cold; light westerly winds. Low-high at Halifax 5 and 20, New Glasgow and Goshen 2 below and 15 above, Sydney and Charlottetown 5 below and 15 above, Moncton 10 below and 15 above, Fredericton 15 below and 10 above, Saint John 10 below and 15 above, Liverpool 5 and 20.

Yarmouth County, Annapolis Valley: Cloudy with a few clear intervals and a few snowflurries; cold; light westerly winds. Low-high at Yarmouth 10 and 25, Kentville 5 and 15.

Upper St. John River Valley, Bay of Chaleur: Clear with a few cloudy intervals; a few snowflurries during morning; cold; light westerly winds. Low-high at Edmundston and Campbellton 20 below and 10 above.

FLU CLOSES SCHOOLS SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont. (CP)—An outbreak of influenza forced the closing of two public schools here Tuesday and officials said others may close later. Parents were advised to continue sending their children to school unless the children are affected.

**Prison Farm Proposal Is Slated For Session**

Attorney-General Melvin McQuaid said yesterday that he expects to have a proposal to put before the Legislature at its next session relative to the establishment of a prison farm in the province.

He said that the treasury board had completed its study of the estimates for his department but declined to say whether or not he had included a sum to cover the construction of the farm.

As provincial treasurer, Mr. McQuaid said that most department estimates have been dealt with by the treasury board but a few are still to be considered. The board was in session yesterday.

On other matters relative to the next session of the Legislature, it was learned yesterday that work on the Speech from the Throne has begun.

Most cabinet members have said that they do not foresee much legislation of a major nature to come up at the session. However, the Civil Service Act, now under consideration for revision, is expected to provide for a civil service commission; Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter is expected to submit legislation that will set up a company, similar to Nova Scotia's Industrial Estates, for the promotion of industrial development.
