

Development Of Life Savers Said Purpose Of Royal Soc.

Rear Admiral H. Pullen, RCN, retired, arrived in the city last week and will be in the city today to address a meeting of the Prince Edward Island Life Saving Society at Montgomery Hall.

Accompanying Admiral Pullen from Halifax was Canon J.R. Davies of Charlottetown, and both men described their trip to the Island as somewhat hectic, particularly when travelling the highway in New Brunswick to Cape Tormentine.

Pointing out the aims of the society, Admiral Pullen said that it is intended to educate every swimmer to become life savers on a standard according to their age and skill.

He stated that it is the belief of the society that not only the swimmers but also the non-swimmers should display a certain standard of life saving ability. He emphasized the mouth-to-mouth process of artificial respiration, which he declared everybody use the beaches throughout the country should learn to apply.

MORE ADVANCED

He pointed out that a life saver or guard who is qualified under the required standards of the society, receives training which is far in advance of that given by the Red Cross.

Admiral Pullen stated that he did not want to attract attention to the training and qualifications gained by lifeguards from the Red Cross. "They can be considered first class," he said.

"From the very beginning there was never any justification in reports published that the airport was going to be taken away," Solicitor General J. Winterton told members of the East Prince Liberal Association at the annual meeting here last night.

ALBERTON — One of Canada's top Red Cross first aid teams was in Alberton Friday evening. Its members are Sinclair Cutcliffe, Bruce Morrison and Norman MacLeod, all of Charlottetown. Accompanying them was Mrs. Harry Cudmore, director of the Red Cross first aid programs in this province.

Together they gave leadership to a workshop on emergency care of the injured. Present to participate and to learn were a number of adults and a representation from the regional high school Junior Red Cross.

Owen Oliver, president of the Junior Red Cross and L. A. McDougall volunteered to take the part of accident victims in a demonstration.

Supposedly, they were a 40-year-old man and his son, pedestrians who had been struck down by a hit-and-run driver at Alberton's main intersection. The son was lying on the street, unharmed except for a bleeding nose. The father had been thrown across his son's body, was unconscious. There was a gash in his forehead, one arm appeared to be fractured and his face has an abrasion.

Ferry Report To Be Studied

As a result of a study carried out by the departments of Industry of Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick assisted by the Maritime Transportation Commission, Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter has received copy of the traffic potential findings in connection with the proposed West Point Ferry service.

Mr. Rossiter said he will meet Monday with representatives of the West Point Ferry company to study the report, preparatory to a meeting with the New Brunswick government, scheduled for Dec. 6 or 7. At the latter meeting, Mr. Rossiter said, a decision may be made to approach the federal government for assistance in further research on the proposed ferry service.

"The traffic potential report," he said, "shows the western part of the province has a definite potential for increased production and general growth which would be greatly assisted by the proposed ferry service. The report shows there is a definite traffic potential."

Ottawa had not recognized the difficulty facing Canada's smallest province in striving for a reasonable standard of public services.

GORDON DISAGREES

Finance Minister Gordon, speaking for the federal government, said he did not think Mr. Shaw's criticism valid.

Under the existing arrangement, he thought, New Brunswick's payments are too low and P.E.I.'s too high. "When you look at the whole picture of total payments to us, are you now I think you'll find Prince Edward Island still right up near the top."

About one-fifth of Nova Scotia's revenue increase will come from a larger share of death duties, the provincial share being raised to 75 per cent from 70. This change is estimated to be worth \$1,161,000 to the province next year, twice the revenue from that source in the next highest Atlantic province, New Brunswick.

Asked to explain the difference, Mr. Stanfield attributed it to "the frisky habits of our people" and the fact that many Nova Scotians living elsewhere resist their own province when they retire.
