ONDON (CP)—In England, cricket is taken as a shade more seriously than politics, club officials occasionally share the lot of cabinet ministers consulted with the necessity of examining the inexplicable.

It was probably inevitable that a committee member should be followed up by Yorkshire's dismissal of its only established arm spin bowler with the comment: "We have got to get on to realities and build a team that one of these days will win the championship."

Who anyone but a Yorkshire committee member, the release Johnny Wardle at the end of the summer would appear to get the club down to the reality that it will start next season with only one man—fast-bowler Freddie Trueman—who can be counted on to get opposing batsmen out with any degree of regularity.

Durelle Still Waiting For Moore's Decision On Bout

MONCTON (CP)—British Empire-light heavyweight boxing champion Yvon Durelle and his manager Chris Shaban are still waiting for world champion Archie Moore to make the next move for a title fight.

"We'll just have to wait and see if Moore will agree to terms," Shaban said Friday after an announcement by International Boxing Club President Truman K. Gibson that he hoped to match the two Oct. 22 in Montreal.

Moore is asking for a \$100,000 guarantee for the title match. Montreal and Vancouver have been mentioned as probable sites. Shaban said he was talking with Myer, Durelle's New York manager, Friday.

"He told me Gibson conferred with Moore's manager Jack Kearns Friday but nothing definite resulted."

Durelle is agreeable to 20 per cent of the gate for a Montreal fight, Shaban said. Vancouver promoter Earl Kalani has offered the Baie Ste. Anne, N. B. fisherman 12 1/2 per cent of the gross gate of a fight in Vancouver.

Durelle has been fishing at his home since a successful defence of his title against Mike Holt of South Africa. His weight has ballooned to 190 pounds. He weighed 175 1/2 against Holt.

Shaban is optimistic that A. Moore-Durelle fight will materialize.

"My boy is the only fighter who will draw against Moore" he said.

SASKATOON (CP)—Sensational putting that twice saved her from defeat put Mary Gay of Calgary into the Canadian women's open golf final with a 22nd-hole victory Friday over Mrs. Hazel Jamison of Edmonton in the longest and most exciting match of the week-long competition.

The 26-year-old Calgary secretary now will meet Mrs. Marlene Stewart of Toronto in today's 36-hole final over the par-76 Saskatoon Golf and Country Club course.

Marlene knocked out Donna Patton of Winnipeg 6 and 5 in Friday's other semi-final played in 35-degree heat.

Both Miss Gay and Mrs. Jamison putted with excellence but two sensational strokes on the 18th and 21st greens saved the match for Miss Gay, who now meets Marlene for a third time in the open final.

Mary dropped a 25-foot putt from just off the edge of the hole to gain a half on the hole and force extra play. She had been trapped off tee and blasted out far over the green. Her pitch shot back was short, but the putt sent her down in par four and forced the saw-off with Mrs. Jamison, who was on in two and two-putted for a par.

At the 21st green, the Edmonton housewife sunk a 20-foot downhill putt for a birdie four and placed the pressure squarely on Miss Gay's shoulders. Mary stroked the ball boldly from eight feet and dropped it for a birdie and a half on the hole.

On the 22nd, Mrs. Jamison hit her tee shot into the rough behind a clump of trees. Her second shot went into the trees, but bounced back to the fairway and she was within 40 feet of the green with her third.

Mary was on in three and two-putted for a par five, one better than Hazel who missed a long putt that would have halved the hole.

Mrs. E. J. Roberts of Moncton, N.B. won at the 19th over Mrs. Joe Tachan of Winnipeg in the second night consolation final.

Rita Lohnes of Lunenburg, N.S. and JoAnn Percy of Winnipeg, both juniors, are finalists in the championship consolation.

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Maritime friends of Ingham Palmer, former Maritime race official, will be glad to know that he is now located at Old Woodbine race track, Toronto where he is handling the announcing duties for the harness racing. Later on, when the track is taken over by the "runners" he will act in a similar capacity.

Old Woodbine is a three-quarter mile track, quite different from our half-milers, and in order to see the horses well enough to call them, field glasses are a must. The track is rated at 2.06 although a lot of the miles are stepped better quite a number being in 2.05.

The best to date was Governor G's performance when he paced a mile in 2.03 4/5, the fastest ever on this track. Three nights later he came back to pace in 2.03 1/5, after which he was sold for \$15,000 and will be placed in the stable of Buddy Gilmour, who last year, was 152 times first, 127 times second, and 106 times third with winning of \$182,866. Of course he made a lot of starts—the total number being 787.

Altogether there are 450 horses stabled at Woodbine, and the grounds are carefully kept and are constantly being improved. A new grandstand was erected last year at a cost of \$750,000, and they plan adding more sections from time to time. Stables have been improved, and two new, fireproof barns were built last winter, with more to come.

"I don't think we'll have any trouble settling terms, said Gibson. "earns will check with Archie and report back to us."

In his last defence Moore knocked out Tony Anthony in the seventh round at Los Angeles, Sept. 20, 1957.

Durelle holds the Canadian and British Empire light heavyweight titles. He stopped South Africa's Mike Holt in the ninth round of title defence at Montreal, last July 15.

Is Ordered To Explain Charge

CHICAGO (AP)—The Illinois State Athletic Commission has ordered Frank Vone, co-manager of heavyweight Wayne Bethea, to appear Sept. 17 to explain his charge Wednesday night's Chicago Stadium feature bout "was in the bag."
