**ARE ISLAND FARMERS
WILLING TO BESHORN?**

SIR.—Late issues of THE EXAMINER contain the information that a number of Charlottetown gentlemen who possess more money than good sense, invite us farmers to spend time and cash in eating and drinking at the Hotel Davies. As high charges for eating and drinking are held in contempt by Island farmers, most of us will prefer having our roast beef and plum pudding at less pretentious hotels, even though we may not have the chance to eat "cheek and jowl" with premiers, judges and other potentates. Polished floors, wines and foods with French names are somewhat bewildering to men who are accustomed to attending cattle, horses and sheep, following the plough or handling the hay fork.

But, it appears, Charlottetown gentlemen have at their back the president and secretary of a little club which assumes the title "Maritime Live Stock Breeders' Association" having its membership chiefly in Eastern Nova Scotia and adjoining districts of New Brunswick, with a dozen or so in P. E. Island.

The president of this little society holds the position of Superintendent of the cattle department in the Halifax Exhibition, for which he is handsomely paid. The secretary of the association is also nominally assistant, but really is acting "secretary manager" of the St. John Exhibition. Holding positions of emolument in city associations how can these gentlemen be of use to country exhibitors in curtailing the various objectionable features of shows such as ten days hold up of live stock, etc.

Neither gentleman can be complimented for the consideration extended to Island live stock exhibitors. At Halifax some of our pure bred registered cattle were placed in an obscure part of the cattle building among grades, butchers' stock and working oxen, the effect being that some of the best of the breed in Canada were, in the eyes of the public, only butchers' stock. The cattle of the same breed owned by Nova Scotia exhibitors was handsomely bunched in the most prominent part of the building.

As a further proof of the love Nova Scotia breeders have for us, it should be known that our most successful breeders of sheep when exhibiting at Halifax get treatment from Nova Scotia exhibitors and men wearing commissioners' badges that only burglars or highway robbers deserve.

At St. John either careless ignorance or contemptuous disregard for Island stock exhibitors' interests is evinced by the rule requiring all stock to be on the ground Tuesday morning, which compelled the numerous exhibits of stock east of Charlottetown to be taken from home the previous Saturday.

These and many other straws tend to show the danger P. E. Island farmers may find lurking in the blandishments of an invitation from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick gentlemen to partake of a costly feed at our own expense.

But what is in the wind anyhow to awake this sudden desire to help Island agriculture?

The suspicion appears to be well grounded that Minister of Agriculture Fisher is still on "economy bent" in his dealing with the Island province. So far his only outlay for us has been for fattening a few chickens, which would have been no outlay had he not bungled in his cold storage outfit. Oh! besides he pays a queer fellow to go round

with a bucket squirt to get out dirt among our cattle, and to give us a sum total of \$1000 for Island farmers.

Now it is reported he proposes to throw away our province as a separate province, and unite with Nova Scotia and New Brunswick in some sort of an agricultural union which we are to pay all and do nothing, while the advantage, if any, will be with the larger provinces. Of course fat offices and little work are looming up, hence the zeal of the gentlemen from across the straits. We do not forget the huge sum the Minister of Agriculture spends on that absurd institution, the Nappan Experimental Farm. That expenditure is lost to us. The same result is certain to follow any sort of entangling partnership, through farmers' institutes or any other association in which government money is to be spent.

It is quite right that our Provincial Exhibition should be open to exhibitors from the neighboring provinces. We are all ready to accept defeat or win as the case may be in open competition, but underhanded intrigue we must guard against.

So far in our history Island agricultural progress, although not quite as rapid as it should have been, shows a much greater advance than that of our neighbors over Northumberland Strait. They envy us and have even much stronger feelings of dislike, for our ability to outdo them in every department of husbandry and live stock. Our competition in their meat and vegetable markets is dreaded. The promise to help us to get better transportation rates is a transparent

While the Provincial registration of live stock in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick is simply rotten in numberless cases the animals on those registers trace to the dung hill. So in the register business their first work is to clean out their own stables.

MILDRED HOLLAND.

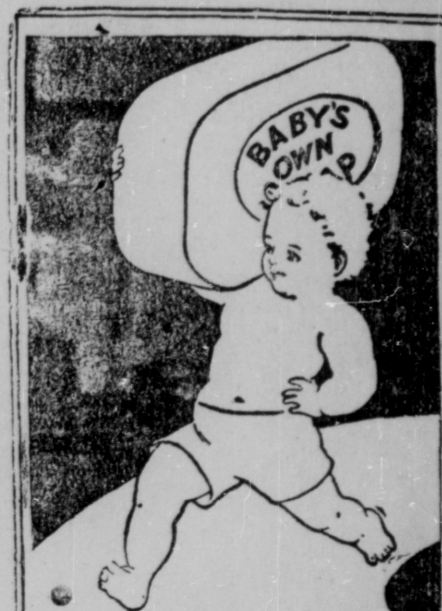
