R. C. M. P. Have Best Facilities

In the new Provincial Headquarters which was completed this summer, the R.C.M.P. have at their disposal an up-to-date scientific laboratory containing a photographic and fingerprinting section as well as other modern aids to investigation.

Police Chief Reports No Major Crime Last Month

Drunk and incapables accounted for the majority of arrests performed by the City Police during the month of September. Out of 76 persons taken into custody 53 were picked up for this offence.

Persons arrested for other offences included 11 charged as drunk and disorderly; one charged with disorderly conduct; four charged with driving whilst impaired; one charged with false pretences, and one charged with possession of stolen goods; and four charged with vagrancy.

Of the 76 arrested in September, 72 were convicted as charged, three were dismissed, and one sent to Riverside Hospital.

An additional 13 persons were brought before the Police Court in September by way of summons. The offences, all of which resulted in convictions, included, failing to stop at red light—3;

failing to stop at a stop sign—5; failing to stop after accident—2; operating M.V. without operator's permit—1; non-resident carrying on trade in city without license—1; speeding—1.

Other duties performed by the local police in September included escorts—44; summonses served—12; transients jailed overnight—20; motor vehicles reported stolen—12; recovered—7; ported stolen and removed—2; bicycles reported stolen—12; recovered—7; motor vehicle accidents reported and checked—28; burials permits issued—29; dogs impounded—11; destroyed—4; on hand—7; telephone complaints received and answered—248.

In addition City Police collected in September \$120.00 from traffic violators, and \$50.00 from the sale of dog licenses, bicycle licenses, and meter rentals.

Will Approach City Council Re Collective Agreement

City Council will be requested to begin negotiations, designed to establish a collective agreement with the local Civic Employees Union.

This was the unanimous decision of local 501, voted on during a meeting of the organization held at union headquarters Tuesday night.

Council will be asked to meet with a negotiating committee drawn from the members of local union.

At this meeting the membership gave approval to agreements covering wages and working conditions as presented by the committee charged with their preparation. These will be presented to City Council and the Commissioners of Sewerage and Water Supply.

John F. MacMillan, St. John, Maritime representative of the National Union of Public Employees, was present at Tuesday night's meeting, and outlined to the union members the various clauses embodied in the proposed agreement.

With reference to remarks of the City Council meeting Tuesday night regarding wages and working conditions as reported in the press, Mr. MacMillan said, at the time local 501 starts negotiations "the public will be made aware of wages and working conditions of civic employees in cities of like size, and these figures will be presented to City Council."

Orders 700 Cars Within Minutes

LONDON AP)—One man ordered £250,000 (\$1,400,000) worth of cars within minutes of the opening of Britain's annual motor show Wednesday.

John Davy, owner of an English car-hire firm, strolled briefly among the stands and placed the order — for 700 British-made family sedans.

The order, for Austin, Morris and Ford automobiles due to be delivered early next year, was believed the biggest single purchase ever made at the show.

Army Officers Hopping Mad

OTTAWA CP)—Top army officers are reported hopping mad at what they say is the preferential treatment given the navy and RCAF during the Queen's visit.

The Queen inspected an RCAF guard of honor on her arrival here Saturday and a Royal Canadian Navy guard of honor at her departure Wednesday.

The Regiment of Canadian Guards comprised the guard of honor for the opening of Parliament Monday but the Queen did not inspect the unit or take a salute at a march-past.

Army officers said that what is particularly galling to them is that the Queen is colonel-in-chief of the Regiment of Canadian Guards.

The guards also collected money in the regiment to purchase a \$2,000 diamond-and-platinum copy of the unit crest but were afforded no opportunity to present the gift to the Queen.
