Tignish Resident Fined \$25 On Impaired Driving Charge

John L. MacLennan, Tignish, was fined \$25 and costs of 30 days by Magistrate A.D. Haslem, QC, in City Police Court Saturday morning for driving while impaired.

Three persons were arraigned on charges of disorderly conduct. Garland A. Greer, Fredericton, N.B., Carleton George MacLean, Cape Breton, each received fines of \$20 and costs of 10 days. Ronald E. Pineau, North Rustico, was fined \$20 and costs of 15 days.

Robert W. Peterson, Wheatley River, charged with drunken driving, pleaded guilty to impaired driving, and was remanded to Oct. 5 with bail set at \$200 cash.

Charles Morrison, St. George's, was fined \$50 and costs of 30 days on a charge of false pretences.

David John MacDonald, Charlottetown, charged with theft of a 1953 Chevrolet, was further remanded until this morning.

Arnold James Biso, Charlottetown, was further remanded to Oct. 2. He accused is charged with breaking and entering with intent at the Charlottetown Curling Club.

John Robert Archibald Ryan, Charlottetown, was fined \$10 and costs of five days on a charge of being drunk and disorderly.

Elbert Vernon Waite, New Wilshire, was fined \$25 and costs of 10 days on a charge of possession of liquor in a place other than residence where fined \$10 and costs of 60 days. A third was fined \$20 and costs of 30 days.

Falling to halt at a stop sign and at a red light brought fines of \$5 and costs of two days and \$10 and costs of five days to two accused.

Three drunk and incapable were fined \$20 and costs of 20 days. A fourth, pleading not guilty to the charge was remanded to Oct. 1.

A Halifax resident was found guilty of vagrancy and sentenced to 20 days in jail with commitment held to Saturday noon.

Change Proposed By U.S. In Pacific Fisheries Pact

TOKYO (CP-AP)—The United States has proposed a substitute section to the international Pacific fishery treaty to replace the so-called "abstention principle" that has had Japan at loggerheads with Canada and the U.S. over renewal of the fishing pact.

But there were few signs at negotiations involving the three countries here last week that Japan will be any happier with—or any more ready to accept—the proposed substitution than she was with the abstention principle.

The original 10-year Canada-Japan-U.S. treaty, which expired earlier this year, contained a principle under which Japan voluntarily abstained from taking salmon, halibut and herring in Pacific waters east of 175 degrees west longitude.

PRIVATE DOMAIN
This area—containing the waters surrounding the Alaskan Islands, the Alaskan waters and that section cradled by Alaska's southern coastline and the coast line of the mainland U.S. and Canada—has been considered the private domain of Canada and the U.S. because of the millions of dollars they've spent in conserving the fish in it.

Japan had demanded that the abstention principle be removed from any new agreement and when the three nations failed to reach agreement at meetings in Washington in June new private talks were scheduled here.

U.S. negotiators here have agreed to drop all mention of Japan "abstaining" from fishing for salmon and halibut.

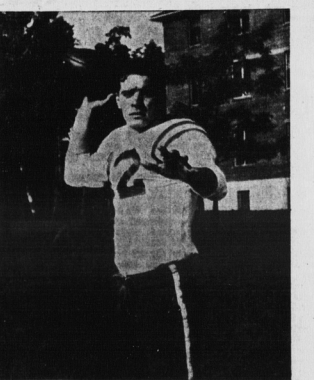
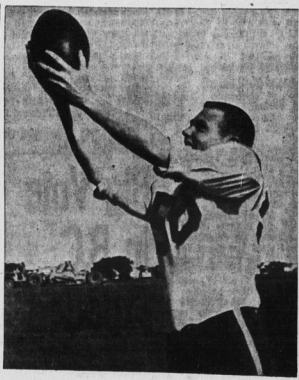
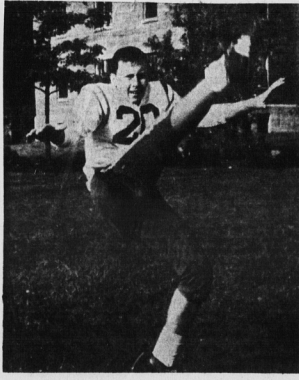

Former Senator Dies In Maine

PORTLAND, Me. (AP)—Former U.S. senator Frederick Hale (Rep. Me.), who served four consecutive terms in the Senate before his retirement in 1941, died at his home Saturday after a long illness. He was 88.

Hale, who was first elected to the Senate in 1916, was the ranking Republican member of that body at the time of his retirement. His 24 years of service also closed out a family dynasty in the Senate dating back to 1838.

Hale's father, Eugene, served 20 years—a record at that time—from 1881 to 1911. His maternal
