GENERAL FRENCH AGAIN OPERATING

After the Boers East of Bloemfontein.

ANXIETY REGARDING SAFETY OF MAFEKING.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

VIEWED FROM LONDON.

LONDON, March 24, 4.15 a. m.—
Lord Roberts' main army continues wait-
ing at Bloemfontein.

The sentimental interest in the fate of
Mafeking has intensified with Colonel
Plumer's forced retirement to Crocodile
Pools where he was two months ago.
Relief from the north dwindles down to
improbabilities.

Lord Methuen is skirmishing with the
Boers at Warren's, 16 miles away. Al-
though seemingly in force sufficient to do
pretty much as he liked, he has not ad-
vanced these five days. It is hoped that
his military administration has a pleasant
surprise in preparation for Britishers by
raising the siege with a strong column
of cavalry and artillery detouring to Mafek-
ing, while Commandant Snyman is
drawn off to engage Colonel Plumer.

General French's cavalry and mounted
infantry, according to rumor, are fighting
somewhere east of Bloemfontein.

This suggests more Boer bad news, as
Commandant Olivier's commando, with
2,000 wagons, is reported on the Basuto-
land frontier toiling northward toward
Kroonstadt via Ladybrand.

This enormous wagon train is supposed
to be moving 25 miles a day.

General French's cavalry posts stretch
from Bloemfontein eastward to the moun-
tains.

General Buller has not yet moved in
 Natal.

The eighth division will go direct to
Bloemfontein.

Lord Roberts' effective disposal at the
front in ten days hence will be, it is esti-
mated, 70,000, with a probability of mov-
ing eastward, forcing the Boers to evacu-
ate Biggarsberg Range and joining hands
with General Buller before continuing the
promenade to Pretoria.

BOER REPORT.

LONDON, March 24.—A despatch to the
Daily News, from Lorenzo Marques, dated
Friday, says: "It is reported here from
Pretoria that Commandant Floff is iso-
lating Colonel Plumer's forces near
Gaberones.

REBELLION SUPPRESSED.

BLOEMFONTEIN, March 24.—The rebel-
lion in the Prieska districts has been sup-
pressed and Kitchener is returning here.

STEYN DEPOSED.

SPRINGFONTEIN, March 24.—It is re-
ported here that Mr. Steyn has been de-
posed from the Presidency of the Free
State and that the public affairs of the
Free State are being administered by a
committee at Kroonstadt.

RETREATING BOERS.

LONDON, March 24.—Five thousand
Boers with 16 guns, on retreat along the
Basutoland border, are in imminent
danger of being hemmed in and meeting
the same fate as Cronje's army.

It is believed that a force especially
despatched by Lord Roberts is chasing
them, and that General French will head
them off.

News of the fleeing burghers
who are making their way
northward from Norvalds point and Bethulia
for the purpose of eluding Lord Roberts
is in this paper.

and joining the Boers at Kroonstad, has
been received from different points in their
progress.

Yesterday General French was reported
to have located them south-eastward of
Bloemfontein.

To-day word comes from Springfontein
that they were in retreat north
of Smithfield, and the mounted scouts
are harassing them. It is be-
lieved at Springfontein that the
column sent out by Lord Roberts
from Bloemfontein will be able to catch
up with them and round them up with
the help of General French.

TROUBLE IN GUIANA.

British Subjects Brutally Treated.

KINGSTON, Ja., March 24.—Advices re-
ceived here from Ciudad Bolivar, Venez-
uela, say that a fortnight ago, James
Lyall, the Acting British Consul there,
was fatally stabbed while leaving the
consulate.

Despatches from Surinam, Dutch
Guiana, say that the feeling of the Dutch
there is strongly antagonistic to the British,
and that British subjects in person have
been so brutally treated that they recently
revolted and shot one of the keepers. The
British residents of Surinam are said to
be suffering from the same grievances as
were complained of by the Outlanders of
South Africa.

THE BUDGET SPEECH.

Little Change in Tariff—Taxes Kept
High—A Big Surplus Expected

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA March 24.—Mr. Fielding made
his budget speech yesterday. He began by
reviewing the statements of revenue and
expenditure which have already been made
public in the blue books.

After explaining the three millions of
increased expenditures and referring to the
surplus of \$4,837,000, Mr. Fielding affirm-
ed that the current and capital accounts
were kept the same as in former years. He
admitted that the increase of the debt was
larger than he had anticipated last year,
but contended that the increase under the
present Government has been slower
during the past three years than during
eighteen years of Tory rule and showed
the artful purposes to which borrowed
money was applied.

Passing on to the current year, Mr.
Fielding estimates that the current
revenue will pass the \$50,000,000 mark.

He estimated that the expenditure
would be \$43,175,900. The surplus is
thus expected to reach \$7,500,000.

The capital expenditure during the
eight months past was over \$5,000,000,
and the Minister estimated a total capital
expenditure for the current year at \$9,-
675,000.

The preference in favor of Great Bri-
tain has, he said, been further extended,
on and after July 1, next. British goods
will be given a preference of 33 1-3 per
cent at all the Customs ports of entry of
Canada. He announced that the Govern-
ment had submitted a proposal of reci-
procity to the Island of Trinidad and that
the only tariff change is an addition to the
free list of machinery such as is made
in Canada for the manufacture of beet
sugar.
