ILL LUCK AND HARDSHIPS.

The Vivid Tales told by Returning Klondikers.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug 6.—The steamer Amouneuse has arrived from St Michael's, Alaska, with 200 passengers and between \$150,000 and \$200,000 in gold dust. Of the passenger list only 34 were miners who had spent as much as one winter in the mines, the remainder being those who had gone there in the spring and concluded not to remain.

Purser Richards is authority for the statement that the amount of treasure brought down was three million dollars of which one and a quarter million was in gold dust and nuggets.

The passengers all agree in the statement that hundreds of men are arriving in St Michael's from Dawson and vicinity seeking passage to the States. With all there are upwards of a thousand men in that part who have lately come from coast parts and are trying to get up the river. Men are turning back after learning the condition of Dawson and up river points.

The river steamer Monarch is reported around about 250 miles from Dawson.

St. Michael's harbor and the islands present a lively appearance. A forest of masts cover the bay and the seashore is lined with people. Boats come in every day or two from up the river with scores and hundreds of disappointed gold seekers whose stories of ill luck and hardships are vividly told to the multitude that has come here to take passage for the mines. This results in many selling their outfits and returning to the States. The hotels on the shore are nightly taxed to their utmost capacity in accommodating guests and almost every craft in the harbor is utilized as a temporary hostelry. News that no gold has been found on Kottzue and Norton Sound adds to the discouragement of the general multitude.

In the harbor of St. Michaels are 53 steamers and sailing vessels, all heavily laden with passengers, general cargo and river boats. Several steamers have large lists of passengers who purchased tickets direct to Dawson and farther up river points and on arriving learned that arrangements had not been made for the transportation. The steamers insisted on landing passengers on the beach, thus throwing them on their own resources. St Michael's is under military jurisdiction and the commanding officers refuse to allow such passengers to be put ashore. The result is there are four or five steamers in port with several hundred passengers whom they are unable to land.

A BANK'S LIABILITY.

The Tradesmen's National Bank on October 15, 1891, refused to pay on presentation a check drawn by William H. Burroughs against his account kept with it. After five days the bank discovered its error, and the check was paid. A suit brought by Burroughs against the bank for damages for its failure to honor the check was brought to trial in the Supreme Court in Brooklyn. At the end of plaintiff's case the trial judge refused to grant a motion to dismiss the complaint: upon the ground, among others, that the action was based upon contract and not upon tort; no charge of wilful or malicious injury being made. The court then directed a verdict for plaintiff for 34 cents, interest upon the cheque for five days. A judgement of the late General Term of the second department affirming the judgement below has now been affirmed by the Court of Appeals. It was held that the failure of the bank, which had on deposit funds sufficient for the purpose to pay the check of the depositor, rendered it liable either in tort or upon contract. When, however, the depositor brought his action for breach of contract, the failure to pay not being charged to be wilful, and no special damages being alleged or proved, and the cheque having finally being paid, the plaintiff was not entitled to recover more than nominal damages.—New York Times.

Protecting Canadian Goods.

The issue of The Adelaide (South Australia) Advertiser for June 14th, just received, gives the particulars of a trial which proves that even in that far away country the Dr. Williams' Medicine Co., is as active in defending its rights and protecting the public against the schemes of the substitutes and the counterfeiters as it is here at home in Canada. In the trial in question Frank Ashley and William Smith were shown to have been engaged in offering a substitute for Dr. Williams' Pink Pills, claiming that the substitute was the same as that justly celebrated medicine. Both men were put under arrest on a charge of obtaining money under false pretence and conspiring to defraud the public, and evidence was heard before the Chief Justice of the Criminal Court. The defendants' lawyer made a strong fight in their behalf, but in spite of this the jury, after a short absence from the court returned a verdict of guilty in both cases. The Chief Justice deferred sentence until the close of the sittings. In addressing the jury, however, the learned judge spoke very strongly concerning the evils of substitution and the dangers to the victim that may ensue from this nefarious and too common practice.—Toronto Globe.
