Anarchist Movements in France

A Threatening Mob at Lyons.

The Anarchists at the Bottom of it.

Riots at Odessa.

PARIS, Oct. 28.

A serious revolutionary movement is spreading over France, and it is momentarily feared that a general outbreak will take place.

Lyons seems to lead in the revolt. Here a mob, yesterday threatened to make an attack on the public buildings and the banks, and the business of the city had to be suspended in consequence.

The mob became so violent towards evening that the authorities were obliged to telegraph to this city for additional troops.

The Government are obliged to take the greatest precautionary measures, in order to avert a most serious revolution.

It is believed here that the present threatening movements in various parts of France are directed by the Anarchist League of Geneva, which has federated branches throughout England, France, Italy, Spain, Germany and Russia.

Seventy-five revolutionists have been arrested at Odessa.

Arabi Pasha's papers, recently seized, show that Derwish Pasha, the Turkish Commissioner at Alexandria, was present at and took part in the Cabinet meeting at which it was decided to give armed resistance to the British in Egypt.

Grevy About to Resign.

In the Dominion election for a member of the House of Commons, to represent the County of Soulanges, in Quebec, Mr. Bain, the Conservative candidate, was elected.

MISCELLANEOUS.

LONDON, Oct. 28.

At the Sub-marine Cable Conference, which will be held at Paris, a draft treaty will be submitted for the protection of all cables by Governments. Representatives of all governments will be in attendance.

Thirteen thousand miners on strike at Wignou have accepted ten per cent advance in wages and have resumed work.

The damage done by floods in Tyrol, amounts to over a million and a half of florins.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

CAIRO, Oct. 26.

The Council of Ministers has decided to instruct the governor of Soudan to hold out at Khartoum until assistance arrives. It is stated that the False Prophet has reached Khordofan. The Council have decided to enlist as many black troops as possible for service against the False Prophet. Ismail Pasha Eyoub will be placed at the head of these forces, with Stone Pasha second in command.

ALEXANDRIA, Oct. 26.

The police have ordered that no natives be allowed on the streets after nine o'clock in the evening without special permission.

PARIS, Oct. 26.

La Paris publishes details of the anarchist conspiracy. It is composed of a small number of staunch supporters in all the towns and manufacturing villages of France. The members are mostly young men, who distribute revolutionary papers. Each

group has a distinctive name. A letter issued by the authorities recommends that the groups should pretend to be trades unions. All groups of a department form a federation, some having a secret symbol, and these federations are a link between the groups and the central committee.

M. Fonquet, prefect of the Department of the Seine, has resigned. It is stated that the members of the Anarchy Federations in Paris and its suburbs alone number 1,229. The Syndicate of Lyons have received a letter in which a threat is made to blow up the bourse in that city.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 26.

To-day is styled "Festival Day." The day's ceremonies was inaugurated by a parade of Knights Templar, a bicycle meet and review and archery contests in Farmington Park, and a Welsh musical festival in bi Centennial Music Hall.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.

Walt Whitman, the poet, is lying seriously ill at his residence, Camden, N.J. Few, if any, hopes are entertained of his recovery. His illness results from Bright's disease.

Brig D. W. Dexter, of Windsor, N. S. captured and sunk in Kill Von Kill Channel during a squall on Thursday night. The captain and family and crew were saved.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 26.

Fire at Hopkinsville, yesterday, destroyed four blocks, containing a large number of stores. Total loss, \$300,000.

LONDON, Oct. 26.

The Times' Cairo correspondent telegraphs that Arabi says he desires to quit Egypt as soon as possible, and will accept sentence of exile in any part of the British dominions. He does not ask to see Egypt again. He thinks Egypt will shortly lose the Soudan unless the English army stops the False Prophet. The correspondent believes that Sir Edward Malet has informed the Government that no interference will be allowed with the sentence if Arabi is proven directly guilty either of abuse of the white flag, incendiarism or massacre.

LONDON, Oct. 26.

The Times says the British Government has informed France that it makes no objection to the establishment of French tribunals, in the honorable conduct of which it has full confidence. Great Britain, however, can permit nothing detrimental to her commercial treaty with Tunis. France has given the fullest assurances on this point, and it is perfectly understood by her that whatever arrangements England may make with Egypt the rights of French citizens shall be respected equally with those of the British.

The Times' Vienna correspondent says the woman Markowitch, who attempted to assassinate King Milan, at Belgrade, on Monday, maintains the deed was entirely her own and that she had it in contemplation for the previous four days.

Mr. Davitt, speaking at Glasgow last night, denied that there were splits in the Irish national forces. He said there were differences of opinion between Parnell and himself, but not a difference of principles.
