THE GEORGIA LYNCHING.

Public opinion throughout Canada has been greatly stirred up, during the past week, in respect to the infernal outrage perpetrated by the lynchers of Georgia. The infidel Ingersoll has uttered perhaps the strongest protest against it. He says—

"I suppose these outrages—these frightful crimes—make the same impression on my mind that they do on the mind of all civilized people. I know of no words strong enough, bitter enough to express my indignation and horror.

"These horrors were perpetrated in the name of justice. The savages who did these things belong to the superior race. They are citizens of the great republic. And yet it does not seem possible that such fiends are human beings. They are a disgrace to our country, our century and the human race.

"Let me say that what I said is flattery compared with what I feel. When I think of the other lynching—the poor man mutilated and burned without the slightest evidence; of the negro who said that these murders would be avenged and who was brutally murdered for the utterance of a natural feeling—I am utterly at a loss for words.

"Are the white people insane—has mercy fled to beasts? Has the United States no power to protect a citizen? A nation that cannot or will not protect its citizens in time of peace has no right to ask its citizens to protect it in time of war."

It is perhaps too much to hope that this and other expressions of horror and detestation will influence such brutish beasts as were guilty of the crime. But we may hope that the law-makers and executive authorities in the States will be moved to take measures to stop lynching and provide for the lawful punishment of all lawfully convicted criminals.

Big Tunnel Planned

LONDON, April 27.—The project for a tunnel from England or Scotland to Ireland is very much to the fore just now. It is announced that no fewer than five separate projects are under consideration. The difficulties in the way are great, the depth necessitating steep gradients for the distance traversed. The shallowest sounding is 75 fathoms, and the distance, according to one scheme, is 40 miles. The estimates of cost vary from £7,000,000 to £16,000,000, but the advantages would be enormous. The journey to America would be shortened, according to the Arnold-Foster map, by 950 miles. It is thought probable that the Irish railways will combine to take up one scheme or another, in the hope of obtaining a Government guaranty.

Spanish Soldier's Trials.

MADRID, April 27.—In spite of all the zeal of the Premier and of the Minister of War, there is an immense amount of mismanagement in connection with the return to Spain of the troops from the colonies. Not only are the unfortunate men left to wander about in a half starved condition without their pay, which is more than a year in arrears, but they have had tobacco which they managed to bring back among their scanty baggage, confiscated by the Customs authorities, upon the demand of the powerful company which farms the tobacco monopoly from the Government. The company claims that nearly 2,000,000 pees as worth of tobacco has been thus seized, and the action of the custom-house officers in several cases led to sanguinary conflicts, especially at Barcelona and a Cañiz, on the part of the soldiers, which were only suppressed with the utmost difficulty.

American Vessels Favoured.

HALIFAX, N. S., April 27.—It is stated that considerable license will be allowed to American fishermen this season, in view of the pending treaty negotiations. For instance, Captain Malone, of the Gloucester schooner, Robin Hood, which arrived from Grand Banks last night, asked permission to sell here 3000 pounds of halibut, and Sir Louis H. Davies promptly wired consent.

Curious Discovery at Cherbourg.

PARIS, April 27.—A curious discovery has just been made at Cherbourg. An oak block used by a tradesman named Worhmer as a chopping block gave away while being used, and was found to contain parchments, money, medals, and portraits of the time of Louis Philippe. It is supposed to have belonged to some ruined building.

A Fatal Cyclone.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 27.—It is reported that a cyclone swept over Kirksville, Mo., early this evening and several persons were killed.

KANSAS CITY, April 27.—The Journal has received a bulletin reporting the killing of 37 persons in a tornado at Newton, Sullivan county. Newton is 40 miles northwest of Kirksville, Mo.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 27.—It is further reported that over 30 dead bodies have been taken from the ruins at Kirksville, Mo.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 27.—A special to the Republican from Kirksville, Mo., says: The eastern part of the city was levelled by the cyclone and the estimate of the dead is now placed at 40. Number injured is not known. The wires are down and communications are very much delayed.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 27.—A bulletin to the Journal from Chillicothe, Mo., reports 15 dead in the cyclone at Newton, Mo. Though the reports are not wholly verified it is believed that the storm has wrought terrible destruction at both Kirksville and Newton.

An Edmonton despatch states that William Roland and Lottie Brunette, disappointed in love, committed suicide together by taking strychnine.

ABOUT "BEES"

SIR.—A modern philosopher of the Josh Billings type has remarked that "a reasonable amount of fl— is good for a dog, just to keep in form broodin' over lein' a dog." This reminds me that we have had perhaps more than a reasonable number of public entertainments the past season, a few of which have been of exceptional merit, but the larger number of quite indifferent quality. In the latter I might include the "Pronouncing Bees" held a few nights ago. I had almost forgotten about it until reminded by an editorial notice which appeared in the Patriot of the 27th instant, in which it was stated that certain words among which were "nephew," "produce," and "zsmith," were pronounced correctly. The judge on the occasion stated that he had chosen word that had no choice of pronunciation. Now I beg to differ with him, as the above quoted words have a choice of pronunciation (see Webster's International Dictionary).

The article also stated that some of the competitors "went down" before certain other words, among which were "suffice," "virile," "silenetic," "nomad". In these also, according to Webster's guide to pronunciation, there is a choice; and as we should incline to the English rather than to the American style, those who were "compelled to sit down" for the latter list of words (with all due deference to the judge) did so unjustly, as they were correct.


If there are to be any future "Bees" of this kind, I would suggest that the authorities be produced and discussed on the spot, as it is misleading to poor ignorant mortals to be told *ex cathedra* that there is only one pronunciation for certain words, that have two, or perhaps three, modes. I would suggest also that the words used in ordinary conversation or public speaking be selected, and not the jawbreakers that one perhaps never hears in a lifetime. I submit that the latter course would be more practical and more conducive to a refined manner of conversation.
