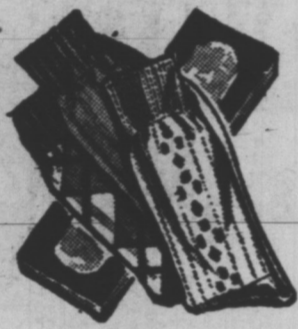

Student Workers Are Curtailed

OTTAWA (CP) — Only United Kingdom students who obtain jobs beforehand will be allowed to come and work in Canada this summer, Prime Minister Diefenbaker said Tuesday in the Commons.

He was replying to Jean-Paul Racine (L-Beauce), who asked for assurance that needy Canadian college and university students would have priority in summer jobs over students from Britain.

Mr. Racine referred to a Canadian Press report about plans of 500 British students to visit Canada and the United States this summer.

Mr. Diefenbaker said only 70 of these plan to come to Canada.

"While it is not proposed to do away completely with the exchange of students, it has been pointed out that only those may come who have available summer employment in advance of their arrival here."

Canada Losing In Tourist Mart

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada is losing out in a highly competitive tourist market, the Canadian Tourist Association said Tuesday. The country's big travel deficit of \$192,000,000—Canadians spent

that much more abroad last year than visitors spent here—has to be lowered by getting more visitors who stay longer and by encouraging Canadians to travel at home, an association brief said.

It was presented to the Commons mines committee now studying operations of the Canadian government travel bureau. The brief said that about

\$1,200,000,000 is spent by visitors in Canada and Canadians who travel inside the country.

But at the same time, the \$309,000,000 spent in Canada last year by Americans, while the second highest on record, showed that Canada's slice of the American tourist spending is still declining. The brief said Canadian tourist facilities have to be improved and

it urged government-backed bank loans at reasonable interest rates.

It said tourist facilities personnel—waitresses, maids and the like—need training and that the Canadian Tourist Association should be supported by federal assistance to provide that training.

The brief, presented by association President James M. McAvity of Montreal and Executive Director John Fisher, said only 19 per cent of holidaying Canadians now go to another province.
