Liberal Leader Sees Himself As Detergent

ST. THOMAS, Ont. (CP) — Lester Pearson likened the Liberal party to a detergent ready, come June 18, to clean up Canada after five years of Conservative rule.

At Delhi, heart of the tobacco country, he declared that the Liberal government would help to find new markets to reduce tobacco surpluses. He also told his farming audience at the Ontario Flue-Cured Tobacco-Growers Auction Exchange that Canada has to get back to "the days when we can bring people into Canada from overseas and give them good and rewarding work to do."

Fuel Cell Made For Space Craft

LYNN, Mass. (AP) — A fuel cell, only a foot wide and two feet long, will deliver about 2,000 watts of electric current to power the United States' two-man Gemini space craft, the General Electric Company announced Wednesday.

This started over reports published in Britain and the U.S. that Adenauer had told Berlin senate members during his visit to the divided city earlier this week that Britain should not be allowed to become an associate member of the European Common Market.

Assistant Minister Is Named

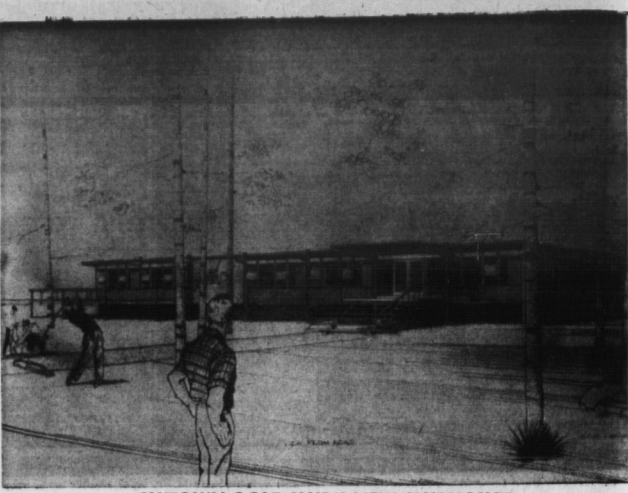

CH'TOWN GOLF CLUB'S NEW CLUBHOUSE

The architect's drawing illustrates the proposed new clubhouse for the Charlottetown Golf Club which is to be built this summer. The picture shows the view of the building that will be seen from the road. The structure is bi-level with general lounge, men's and ladies' lounges, kitchen and dining facilities, and offices on upper level. The lower level shall include lockers and showers, washrooms, golf cart storage, juniors' room, and a self contained apartment for a caretaker. The new building shall be located in the area now occupied by

the parking area adjacent to the present clubhouse, and shall overlook the No. 1 tee and fairway to the southwest and the new No. 17 green to the south. Alfred J. Hemmings is architect for the new structure, that will cost approximately \$100,000.

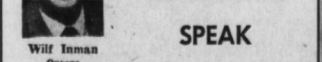
