

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

COMMITTEE.—Thomas Noonan, charged with stabbing John McNeill, has been committed for trial at the Supreme Court.

RAILWAY ANTAGONISM.—An Ottawa despatch reports:—The Ministerial journals are advocating the amalgamation of the Northern Pacific and Canada Pacific Railways.

PERSONAL.—Colonel McNeill, formerly of Lord Ligart's staff, who was Sir Garnet Wolsey's second in command, and who was severely wounded in a battle with the Ashantee, has the honor of dining with the Queen and Royal Family, a few days ago.

"NO DEAD, BUT SICKENED."—The man Cogswell reported killed at Carleton, on Election day, our reporter says was not dead, but "sickened." Post Hastings News of the Week.

RAILWAY EXTENSION INTO HALIFAX.—The Government awarded the contract for the additional work on the railway to Richmond, Me. & N.S., their tender being the lowest. The work is to be commenced immediately.

EDWARD JENKINS HAS BEEN appointed representative of the Government of Canada, in London, vice late Mr. Dixon, with more extended powers, embracing not only emigration matters, but the transaction of such other business as the Government may require him to attend to.

INTERESTED ALTERATION.—The city Council of St. John, N.B., having attempted extortion in the matter of carrying the railway in the rear of the city to the Ballast Wharf, the government, it is said, intends to alter the route to Rankin's Wharf, with a view to cross the river at that point.

THE ADMINISTRATOR'S LETTER.—As the Legislature will meet in a week or two, and as the correspondence between His Honor the Administrator and the Dominion Government will then be submitted, we have decided to postpone till then our remarks upon the subject of the letter written by His Honor, which appeared in the Patriot of the 14th instant.

WE UNDERSTAND THAT THE Hon. J. C. Pope is building two vessels at Cascopecque Point, the introduction or revival of ship building in that section of the country, by such a man, will tend more to benefit the town of Alberton, in the circulation of money, than all the "trunk" of the Hon. Jas. Yeo, or the efforts of such a man as Stanislaus Perry.

PEACEFUL INTENTIONS.—A St. John's despatch says:—"A dinner was given on Saturday evening by the Car to his visitors. In his speech he said the Emperor of Germany, and the Queen of England, the Emperor of Austria and himself, would preserve the peace of the world. The Prince of Wales as representative of the Queen bowed his thanks and the Emperor Francis Joseph responded, reiterating the sentiments of the Car."

INCENDIARISM.—On Wednesday night last, about one o'clock, a "fire fiend" went to the house of Mr. McLaren, corner of Westmouth and Grafton streets. He deliberately placed some straw in the hatchway, saturated it with kerosene oil and set fire to it.

A GREAT FIRE.—A London despatch Feb 4 reports:—Taylor's furniture repository, Belgrave, covering an acre, was burned last night. The building alone was insured for one million dollars. Total loss, including contents, consisting of pictures, mirrors, carriage and a vast amount of other goods, estimated at \$15,000,000.

AN EXPLANATION. To the Editor of the Examiner. DEAR SIR:—There appeared in the columns of the Herald, of Wednesday last, a notice to the effect that the "City Hardware Store" had been entered by duplicate keys, and some goods and a small sum of money taken therefrom. This is a mistake which would have been explained before now, but my horse running away on Wednesday last, I have been confined to my room from injuries sustained. On Monday night last, having a Ship's Model to make after the shutters were put on, I commenced work, and, being anxious to finish it, I kept working till between one and two o'clock, when I left for home. That morning my wife asked me to send home some of those brushes to the house of my brother, who was unable to come and select for herself. I took some brushes with me that night, as I had neglected to send them through the day. On leaving the store, I had in my arms the brushes and some of the tools with which I was working at the Model. Some time after I left the shop, I noticed a man following me and not knowing his intentions, at that hour of the night, I hurried home, and in my hurry, lost the brushes from under my arm, which were not noticed till I had gone some distance.

I have a perfect right to enter the store at any time, and to take what I require therefrom, either goods or money, by charge myself with the amount taken. I have been informed that the Watchman on the opposite block was the party that followed me. He was justified in the course he pursued in notifying the Police, and in following me, as he naturally supposed that the shop had been broken in, and I was the party who did it.

NORTH CAPE LIGHT HOUSE. A CAPTAIN'S COMPLAINT—NO LIGHT! A VESSEL STRANDED. To the Editor of the Examiner. Sir—At 1 a.m. on the 9th of last December, I sailed from Shediac for Cascopecque. Between the hours of 7 and 8 p.m., rounded the North Cape. But as I saw no light, had to do so much further than I would have done, had a light been visible. At 12 o'clock I saw the light at Cascopecque harbor, but was so far off that I had to anchor where I was exposed to the full blast of a heavy gale of wind. On the following day I lost a valuable chain and anchor, and had my vessel stranded on Cascopecque Sand Island.

I have no wish to find fault with any Light House Keeper, but when life and property is so largely dependent upon their care and faithful discharge of duty, I feel it my duty to lay this fact before the public. The schooner Wauke became round the North Cape one week before I did, and her Captain says, though he saw the Light House yet saw no light. No such complaints are ever heard about the one at Cascopecque, since under the care of the present Keeper; nor do I see why the much more important light on the North Cape cannot be as well kept also. To this cause do I attribute the stranding of my vessel. The night, it is true, was thick, but then there should have been the more care taken to have had a good light up. Had the light been as bright as the one at Cascopecque, I know my vessel would have been anchored in a safe place. But seeing no light at all, I was too far off to make good anchorage ground. Other masters of vessels make the same complaints of the North Cape Light.
