

THE DAILY EXAMINER. AUGUST 31, 1881. The Patriot and Synod's Commission.

THE Patriot in commenting on the commission in the Lawson-Stewart suit, says in its issue of the 27th inst.:

"The Presbytery had virtually, if not technically, made Mr. Stewart what he really was, a party to the suit, and all that we contended for, was that he had a right to occupy the same position before the Synod's Commission."

And because this was not done the Patriot holds the commission as guilty of "the most monstrous injustice." Clearly the Patriot does not know what it is writing about. That the country may not be misled by the Patriot, and may understand how far our over-confident and meddlesome neighbor is astray in his remarks on the commission, we may remind our readers that the particular course of prosecution selected by the Presbytery against Mr. Lawson necessarily and absolutely excluded Mr. Stewart's appearance before it as a party, either "actually or technically."

We think, as far as we can learn, both the Presbytery and Mr. Stewart knew this to be the case. And hence we find Mr. Stewart receiving a standing in Presbytery, not as the result of constitutional or inherent right, but by special and specious stipulation! According to usage rightly governing banking establishments which will not allow its transactions with private parties to be made public without their consent, Mr. Stewart held control of certain evidence considered very important by Mr. Lawson, which was to be found in the books of the Summerside Bank. Mr. Stewart, knowing that this evidence was sought for by Mr. Lawson, and that he was master of the situation, came before the Presbytery offering Mr. Lawson access to the desired evidence, if the Presbytery would allow him the privilege of examining witnesses and addressing the court at the close of the trial. These conditions were acceded to both by the Presbytery and Mr. Lawson; and henceforth Mr. Stewart was "virtually, if not technically," a party against, indeed the prosecutor of, Mr. Lawson before that court. Mr. Lawson, very unguardedly, we think, allowed Mr. Stewart to enter upon the duties of his new office before the evidence sought for was obtained, and the fact is undeniable, that to this day, he remains without it; denied of rights purchased by the foregoing stipulations and sanctioned by the Presbytery! Even if this arrangement were constitutional and proper before the Presbytery, it could be so only on the ground of the mutual consent of all parties. There can be no other plea of justification. But after his experience, just referred to in this matter, we cannot suppose that Mr. Lawson would be so incautious or precipitate as to repeat before the Commission his blunder committed before the Presbytery; he would surely see to it that Mr. Stewart would have furnished the evidence from the Summerside Bank, but which is still withheld, before he would consent that Mr. Stewart should appear before the Commission in the same capacity that he had gained before the Presbytery. It was not because Mr. Stewart was on trial as much as Mr. Lawson before the Presbytery, or because of the stipulations distinctly made and accepted, that Mr. Stewart gained the position he did in the lower court. He got all he stipulated for; Mr. Lawson has not. And yet Mr. Stewart and the Patriot complain of injustice. Had, according to the terms of agreement, the evidence from the Summerside Bank been laid on the table of the Commission, Mr. Stewart and the Patriot might talk of rights, but till that is done all this outcry about injustice, &c., is simply impertinent bravado; perchance, to hide from the public the knowledge of the fact of which Mr. Stewart and some of his friends must be conscious—that Mr. Stewart got privileges which he had no right to gain, and could be only gained by a patent, a violent breach of the constitution of the church.

The law of libel is clearly defined in the Books of Procedure in the courts of the Presbyterian Church. There are, we find, two methods. One by private individuals and one by the Presbytery itself on the ground of what is called a *clama famosa*, or general report. When the private party is the prosecutor in a libel suit, he must undertake to conduct his case before the Presbytery as judges. He is the sole prosecutor; the Presbytery, in no sense, is a party to the prosecution. Again, when the Presbytery, on the ground of a *fama*, are the prosecutors, no private party can be introduced as "virtually" or "technically" as a party. These two methods cannot be mixed together, and a compound or hybrid affair got up, which is neither the one or the other. It makes no matter how much Mr. Stewart's name may have been mixed up in this trial. The Presbytery ought to do its own work *within itself*; or not being able to do this, say so, and ceasing to act, call upon the private party who could conduct the trial on that line of action, to do so. This course is so clearly the constitutional one, that we do not hesitate to write as we have done, and to assert farther that Mr. Lawson's consent to allow Mr. Stewart to act as a party did not make this novel arrangement constitutional. We may not know much of Presbyterian order but we write our conviction, when we say that the action of Presbytery in giving Mr. Stewart the status he had

before that court is an unprecedented event. The commission knew their ground and kept it safe. For this, our self-constituted authority of Presbyterian church order, abuses them in unmeasured terms. How long will this be tamely submitted to? If Mr. Stewart thinks that the Commission or Presbytery have not done him justice, his course is clear: let him libel Mr. Lawson in his own name, and conduct his suit himself. This is his constitutional remedy. But to seek to have himself mixed up with the Presbytery, as a party in the Presbytery, and thus making the Presbytery a party with him in a libel suit against a minister or any other party, is simply a disgrace, as we look at the matter to all concerned. We are glad that the commission knew what to do, and fearlessly did what was right.

The Meeting of Presbytery.

The Presbytery of P. E. Island met in Prince Street Church on the 29th inst., when Mr. John McLeod delivered his trial discourse for ordination, and was examined in Greek, Hebrew, Church History and Theology. All these exercises were cordially sustained, and his ordination appointed to take place on the 30th inst., in Strathalbyn, at 11 o'clock, a.m.

The Presbytery accordingly met in Strathalbyn on the 30th inst., when the Rev. S. C. Gunn delivered an able and appropriate sermon on Ps. XLVIII. 12-15. Rev. Wm. Grant narrated the steps previously taken in connection with the call, and put to Mr. McLeod the formula of questions asked on such occasions. Rev. K. McLennan leading in prayer, Mr. McLeod was, "by the laying on of the hands of the Holy Ministry and induced into the pastoral charge of the congregation of Strathalbyn." Mr. McLeod having received the right hand of fellowship, was earnestly and eloquently addressed by Rev. N. McKay on the solemn and important duties of his office. Mr. Grant then addressed the congregation in Gaelic, and Mr. Frame in English, on their duties, arising out of the relationship just formed between them and their Pastor. Both of these addresses were of a high order and produced a deep impression upon the large and deeply interested congregation who had assembled to witness the solemn and interesting services of the day. Mr. McLeod having been introduced to the session as their future Moderator and his name added to the roll, the congregation welcomed him in the time-honored way as they were retiring from the church.

The Presbytery accepted Rev. John McDonald's resignation of the pastoral charge, of Dundas, and appointed Rev. Mr. Gunn to preach in and declare said congregation vacant on the 11th September. Mr. McDonald to supply his place in St. Peter's.

Rev. N. McKay reported that he had met, according to appointment, with three sections of Richmond Bay congregation, intimated to them their pastor's resignation, and cited them to appear for their interests at this meeting of Presbytery—that Lot 14 had appointed Messrs. D. McIntosh and James McArthur, and Lot 11 had requested him (Mr. McKay) to represent their interests before Presbytery, but that Lot 16 had taken no action in the matter. Mr. McKay, the only representative from the congregation present, was heard; when, after deliberation it was unanimously agreed to accept Mr. Crawford's resignation of Richmond Bay congregation, the same to take effect on and after 11th of September. Rev. Mr. Crawford expressed his concurrence in this act of Presbytery. Rev. Mr. Carr was appointed to preach in Tyne Valley and Sheep River on the 18th September, and Rev. J. M. McLeod to preach in Lot 16, Lot 14, and Lot 11 on the same day, and intimate to them the above decision of Presbytery, and declare the congregation vacant.

Rev. Messrs. MacLennan and McKay reported that they had deferred, to the best of their ability, before the Synod's Commission, the action of Presbytery in the "Lawson Libel Case"—that the decision of Presbytery on the first count had been sustained; that Lawson's appeal on the second count had been sustained; though he had failed to prove his charges against Mr. Stewart; that the charges in the third count had been set aside by the Commission as not containing sufficient ground for libel, although he (Mr. Lawson) had published malicious slanders and written wicked parodies on Scripture in his paper for political purposes; that the finding of the Presbytery on the whole case had been set aside and the milder sentence of censure substituted. The Presbytery's representatives further reported that they had appealed to the General Assembly from the last three findings of the Commission, and submitted their reasons of appeal. On motion, the Presbytery agreed to record their satisfaction with the general conduct of their representatives and their thanks for the able manner in which they had conducted the case entrusted to their care, and instructed them to prosecute the case before the General Assembly. The Presbytery expressed regret that their representatives had not appealed from the finding of the Commission on the second count, and instructed them to take the necessary steps to have this decision also reversed if possible, before the supreme courts of the Church.—Com.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

Sir.—Having come in possession of a clipping from the EXAMINER of the 28th April last, containing a problem by W. E. M. I resolved to furnish you with an answer, but finding the solution very long and tedious, as the result of my endeavours I submit you the following for inspection:—

Every year a hundred dollar bond will produce \$4. This sum will be at your disposal; so also will the interest of it; therefore it will be as lucrative to you as the same sum at compound interest. You will have this sum at each succeeding year bearing compound interest, as above, until the end of the term. The rate of interest will be 3 1/2 p.c.—high interest you desire;—viz, you will leave \$4 bearing compound interest at 3 1/2 p.c. for 29 years, the same for 28 years—27, and so on. The last sum of \$4 will bear no interest. Having summed up these several amounts, add the result to \$100. This latter is the amount you will be supposed to have received at the end of the term (30 years). Find the sum which will amount to this in 30 years at 3 1/2 p.c. simple interest, and I think you will have the answer.

A Warning Letter.

Last week's Halifax Wesleyan contained a letter written by a minister now resident in Minnesota, who in 1879, left Cumberland, Nova Scotia, for Southern Kansas. It is a letter fitted to do much good in the way of warning its readers in the Maritime Provinces against being lured to misery on the arid sand flats of Kansas. It warns the eastern friends of its writer, especially against moving to the western portion of Nebraska and Kansas, where people have on the brink of starvation for a year or two, owing to the almost total failure of the crops, and where many persons, comparatively wealthy when they first took up their abode there, have been reduced to utter poverty. The writer prefers Minnesota to Kansas, but even there he finds that immigrants are being lured in some cases on quite inferior soil. Referring to the deceptive influences at work to promote the settlement of the country, it says:—

"Railroad men, land speculators, etc., cover up the disadvantages by their continual puffing and exaggerating on the good side of the question. They have an axe to grind, and it is not right that we should be overpersuaded to bluster our hands in turning for them and then endure the consequences while they look on delighting in having outwitted us, as well as in the spoils they have won in the act."

Numbers have been enticed by such puffing to leave comfortable homes to go farther and fare worse than they were ever likely to fare in their own country—to turn grindstones for scheming axe-grinders on western deserts and swamps.—News.

Senator Boyd on a Bad Man.

Senator Boyd, in one of the speeches delivered by him at the Ministerial meetings in Nova Scotia, gave a graphic description of a very bad man, who decries his country, lies about the conditions of settlement in the North West, injures his countrymen in Ireland by disuading them from coming to Canada for homes, and boldly asserts that no more people are employed in Canadian factories now than before the adoption of the National Policy. He told the story of the man who said he skinned his horse, covered him with sheepskins and black-berry bushes, and gathered wool and black-berries for the family from his back every year as long as he lived. This man, said Mr. Boyd, was awarded a prize as the champion liar, but he would not have got it if the author of the statement that the number of hands employed in Canadian factories have not increased had been among the competitors. Mr. Boyd said he described one of these bad men to a Boston man, and asked what would be done with him in the United States. The answer was, "we would hang him, and if we were to do so we would drown him." "We don't treat them in that way," said the Senator, "we put some of them in offices of trust, and occasionally make one of them speaker of the House of Commons, and give him a fat printing contract in the bargain." The Senator will be soundly attacked, of course, by former opponents of this kind of man who have become his allies by jumping the fence in company with Sir Albert Smith—who once voted him a liar and a slanderer—but he can stand it.—Times.

Fresh Trouble in Tunis.

ARAB INSURGENTS MARCHING UPON SUSAN—INTENSE EXCITEMENT IN THE CITY. Tunis advices of the 26th state that great excitement prevails in the towns and villages in the vicinity of Susa, owing to the proximity of the Arabs. Reports of pillaging have been received from the entire neighborhood. The governor has prohibited armed Arabs from entering Susa. Several thousand Arabs are reported within 45 kilometers of Tunis, and others are ten kilometers from Hammanet, where a French detachment is encamped, which General Logerot ordered to withdraw in the direction of Tunis. It is reported that the French Minister has been summoned to Paris to confer with the Government to concert measures for securing order in Tunis. It is stated that the tribesmen and villagers are planning an attack on Susa. It is reported that the Tunisian insurgents who advanced upon Gabes have been defeated with heavy loss. A large number of Ah Ben Khatifa's followers abandoned him after the battle. The gates of Susa have been shut, and the governor has ordered the civilians to order them on guard for service on the walls. Three French battalions have embarked at Toulon for Africa with artillery.
